No. 10 Brunswick High trounces McIntosh County Academy

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In their first road game of the season, the Pirates (2-0) were able to make the most of their Class A-Public opponent on Friday night. Brunswick High was able to jump out to a 14-0 lead midway through the first quarter thanks to the dynamic duo of Chuckabee Hill and Ree Simmons, and it rode the momentum to a 42-0 victory over McIntosh County Academy. Hill and Simmons blitzed their way through the Buccaneer's defense and into the open field towards the

end zone. At the half, the two had combined for 127 of the team's 129 rushing yards. However, McIntosh County Academy (0-1-1) was able to keep fighting through the end of the first half. With seven minutes to go until halftime, the Buccaneers marched down the field and inside the red zone thanks to the trio of JaReese Campbell, Austin Crosby, and Deondray Bacon. But once the Buccaneers reached the red zone, the Brunswick defense flipped a switch and made sure they held McIntosh scoreless. Outside linebacker Lionel Twitty could be heard

yelling to his defense to maintain the shutout. They did just that as linebacker Devin Smith sacked quarterback Will Philmore for a loss of 12 yards and pushed the Buccaneers further from the end zone. Brunswick's defense would hold true to form and force a turnover on downs. "We played pretty tough in the first half," said MCA head coach Bradley Warren. "The speed of the game is what we are looking for. It's going to help us when we go into single a ball. Having to play at that tempo we just ran out of gas tonight after halftime."

With two seconds left in the half, Brunswick quarterback Jeffrey Wayne had his deep ball picked off by Monte Stokes. In the second half, a new offense showed up for the Pirates. "We had some rust in the first half, we had some things that we needed to get right," said Brunswick head coach Sean Pender. "We made a couple of adjustments and it worked in our favor, we were just out of rhythm in the first half. Defensively played well the entire game. Offensively we were just out

Frederica shifts back into gear

In the team's first game of the season, the Knights proved that 16 graduating seniors wasn't going to stop the 2020 GISA Class 3A runners-pp from playing dominant football. An unfortunate chain of events led to Frederica's first turnover when quarterback Thomas Veal's pass bounced off of his receiver's helmet and into the hands of the defensive backs. Valwood was able to capitalize off the turnover and put six points on the board. From then on, it was all Frederica Academy. The Knights would go on to score the next 27 straight points by capitalizing off of four Valwood turnovers. Making up for his previous error, Veal connected with wide receiver Bryce Reilly for one of the four Knights touchdowns. The three other touchdowns came from star running back Jordan Triplett through the course of the night. With only 21 players suited up to play for Frederica, head coach Brandon Derrick was happy with his player's performance and knew that playing at home to start the season was huge for his players. "(The) kids have gotten better and better every week," Derrick said. "They stayed in the means of what we asked for." Some of the Knights never stepped off the field, but that didn't affect the team at all, as they rode the momentum of the crowd and defensive performance to the 27-6 victory. Next week, the Knights will travel to Savannah to take on the Calvary Day Cavaliers for their first road test of the season.

Camden runs wild in win against Glynn

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Camden swerved right, turned left, punched it straight up the middle, and drove out of Glynn County Stadium with a 46-21 victory over Glynn Academy on Friday. The Wildcats ran up 469 yards rushing and 543 yards of total offense against the Terrors, a majority of which came in a second half that saw Camden score touchdowns on four of its six possessions. Back running the wing-T with the return of longtime head coach Jeff Herron, the Wildcats carved up a Red Terror defense down a couple of linemen. With young, inexperience players stepping into larger roles, Glynn didn't have the necessary eye discipline to plug up the run. "We're just undisciplined right now defensively at spots, and that hurt us," said Terrors head coach Rocky

Glynn Academy kicked off its cross country season with a couple of second-place finishes at the Ware County meet Thursday in Waycross. Charley Podlesny and Lexi Alberson led the way for the Terrors' girls, running a 23:06 and 24:24 respectively to help the team place second out of eight competitors. Podlesny's time was the

fifth-best overall, while Alberson finished 10th among the girls. Also scoring for Glynn was Abigail Winford (25:25), Channing Orendorf (26:04) and Lily Henry (26:41). The Glynn Academy boys finished second out of a field of 11 teams with Parker Sams and Jack Roberts each earning top 10 times. Sams placed fifth overall with a time of 18.31,

and Roberts came in seventh among the boys at 18:49. Griffin Lee (19:31), Max Wakeland (19:50), and Cole Albright (19:56) also competed for the Terrors. The next competition for Glynn Academy cross country will take place at the Roberts Tate Jekyll invitational on Sept. 4. A week later, the Terrors will take part in the Carrolton Orthopedic Invitational on Sept. 11.

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
