friendships through PTA which I will always cherish. I also have five grandchildren – four boys and a girl. The future of their education as well as the education of all children is important to me."

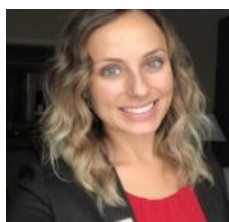

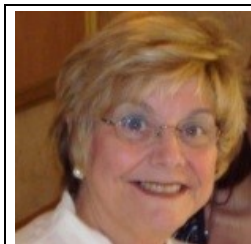

Several advocates from MA PTA attended the National PTA Legislative Conference in Washington, DC in March. They met with our Senators, Representatives and their staff members and discussed issues that impact parents, children and families in Massachusetts and nationally. Specifically, we asked for support of increased funding of Statewide Family Engagement centers; for schools to be included in any comprehensive infrastructure package; and for the improvement of the federal school meal program through the re-authorization of the Child Nutrition Act. Salisbury PTA

I nominate Salisbury PTA to receive the local unit Advocacy award. The advocacy campaigns they have worked on include: In 2015 they met with their principal with the idea and a bundle of information regarding grab and go breakfast. He immediately reached out to the district food and nutrition specialist, Lucinda Ward, who brought the ideas to fruition. In the 2018/2019 SY because of grant funding Lucinda applied for, breakfast was FREE to all students and PTA supported this through PR and also provided the needed funding to update the technology to run it free. Despite cuts to the budget in the 2019/20SY, the grab and go program continues to serve the school community strong. Prior to the program children who came to school after the bell, and went to the cafe for breakfast would be turned away. Each one of these children has their own unique story, maybe there wasn't food to eat, maybe their sock was scratchy, maybe they slept late.....but it all lead to the same point- they needed to eat to start their day. SES PTA felt they needed to find a better solution. Fast forward 5 years and the program is running strong. Children come in, grab the bag of their choice and head to class and eat breakfast while unpacking and doing morning work. The project has shown an even further reach as the food that isn't consumed either goes home for a nutritious choice later (it's all shelf stable) or is added to the classroom's selection of food choices when needed. In the 2018, SES PTA installed a filtered water bottle filling station - so that children would have access to clean drinking water throughout the day.

SES PTA has hosted numerous speakers on various topics. The SES Parent Speaker series was designed on the premise that when parents and educators have shared access to educational experts, they can develop common language and strategies to help children succeed in school and in life. They welcome and invite anyone interested from the community and beyond. The presentations are always free, although they have occasionally asked for an optional pantry donation. Folks from the five surrounding towns attend. Funding for the presentations is allocated within the PTA budget, grant supported or hosted with community groups. Some of the highlights include: Charlie Applestein - "No Such Thing as a Bad Kid"; Elizabeth Englander - Internet safety; Sarah Ward - Executive functioning; Lynn Lyons Anxious Kids, Anxious parents; and Katie Greer-Internet safety.

In response to district funding shortfalls and the need for a voice the SES PTA created We Are Triton. The mission is to unite the district and the communities in support of education and the funding to achieve the District's commitment to develop engaged, successful, responsible, and resilient learners who become well-prepared young adults and contributing citizens. The vision is driven by the unwavering commitment to meeting the needs of all students in their district, through advocacy and partnership with all members of our communities. The SES PTA is steadfast in their commitment to maintain the work of the school district to uphold/maintain a quality educational system as one of our towns' strongest commodities. This advocacy work entails attending and speaking at meetings with our local leaders and school committee. Reaching out to our State leaders via phone calls, emails and social media. These are all great examples of advocacy efforts that support the PTA mission and further our "every child, one voice" moto.

RESOLUTION OF THE MASSACHUSETTS PARENT TEACHER ASSOCIATION (PTA) STOP THE YOUTH VAPING AND E-CIGARETTE EPI

WHEREAS, Big Tobacco companies are using flavors and cheap prices to get kids to use dangerous vaping, JUUL, and e-cigarette products; AND

WHEREAS, E-cigarettes are dangerous and contain nicotine and other harmful chemicals; AND

WHEREAS, Nicotine is bad for you and one Juul pod contains the same amount of nicotine as ONE PACK of cigarettes; AND

WHEREAS, Nicotine is derived from tobacco, is addictive and is a gateway to traditional cigarette use and has immediate short-term negative health impacts with brain development, popcorn lung and leads to cardiovascular issues; AND

WHEREAS, Youth & teen vaping/e-cigarette use is at alarming rates and Massachusetts is the 8th worst state in the country in terms of high school use of electronic cigarettes; AND

WHEREAS, Flavors make it easier for kids to start using tobacco products and now nearly 25% of high schoolers are now using e-cigarettes/vaping/Juul; AND

WHEREAS, Kids are now using these products at a rate that is 6 times higher than adults; AND

WHEREAS, Flavoring is designed to lure kids to vaping products; AND

WHEREAS, Flavors are already banned in cigarettes (with the exemption of mint and menthol); AND

1	Other Members	Other members of the Massachusetts PTA, upon previous registration before the start of the meeting, may attend the annual meeting.
2	Identification	The Massachusetts PTA will need to virtually identify you for admission to the meeting.
3	Voting Member Obtaining the Floor	A voting member of the convention wishing to obtain the floor shall use the hand raise feature on Zoom, and after being recognized by the chair, shall give his, or her name, the name of the local or council which he or she represents, or state board position.
4	Delegate Speaking Limits	A delegate may speak for not more than three minutes in discussion from the floor, or more than twice on the same motion.
5	Name in Nomination	Only one nominating speech, not to exceed two minutes, may be made when placing a <i>Name in Nomination</i> . After nominations have closed, the qualifications of all candidates, stated in a uniform manner, shall be posted on the screen during the meeting.
