# Scrip Fundraising is Powerful Tool

If you've been to a PTO event this year, chances are you've seen or heard something about the Scrip program. The concept is simple. Schools purchase gift cards from participating retailers at a discount. Then, parents purchase the gift cards from the school at face value. The school keeps the difference in price, and parents spend the Scrip gift cards at the retailer where it's worth the full face value.

The Scrip program offers "profit sharing" to participating families. After a family earns \$100 profit for the school, the additional profits earned is split 50/50 between the family and the school. The profit is given back to the family in the form of a check.

Currently, we have 93 Corpus Christi families enrolled in Scrip. The



program raises anywhere from \$10,000 to \$12,000 each year.

Scrip orders can be placed any weekday, and will be filled from inventory that is in stock. If there is not any inventory in stock, the order


will be processed the following Monday. Orders are filled on Wednesdays and can either be sent home to parents in their child's daily folder, or you can stop by the Scrip office to pick up your order during set hours.

# Understanding Learning Differences



Learning difficulties are more common than many people think. Increasing awareness among parents and educators can help a student with learning differences thrive academically and socially.

Students with dyslexia, ADHD and other kinds of learning issues are as smart as their peers. In fact, some believe they display exceptional strengths that can enrich all our lives. Without the right support, many fall behind academically and struggle socially.

Signs that your child may have a learning problem include:

- Reads at lower level than peers
- Has difficulty understanding math concepts
- Has bad handwriting
- Often loses homework
- Has trouble sitting still
- Doesn't want to go to school
- Has a hard time making friends

If your child displays any of these signs you should first make an appointment to discuss your concerns with their teacher. The teacher will give you insight on how your child is performing compared to other kids their age, and point you in the right direction to seek additional help. In order to qualify for some resources, specific evaluations are required. The teacher, with the help of resource teachers, will be able to guide you through the correct process so that your child receives adequate help.

If your child has been diagnosed with a learning disorder, it is important that you have your child reevaluated every three years. This will enable you to show that your child has displayed consistent learning difficulties and ensure they receive proper assistance throughout their entire education.

# Parents Urged to Monitor Internet Activity

It's safe to assume that nearly every child at CCS has access to the Internet. Although Internet affords our children valuable information and entertainment, it also exposes them to certain dangers. Paul Weathersby, a Senior Forensic Examiner for the FBI, presented on those risks at our Q3 PTO meeting, and shared information on how to protect your children.

Educating your children on the risks associated with using the Internet is paramount when establishing online safety. You must understand those risks in order to be able to communicate them effectively. You can go to the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children for specific information on the

risks and benefits. Weathersby stressed that it is important to maintain an open dialogue with children so that they feel comfortable talking to their parents about information they find on the Internet that makes them feel scared or uncomfortable.

Once you know the risks and benefits, you can begin to set guidelines for using the Internet. Clear rules help children understand what might be a dangerous situation. An example of a clear rule would be, "Don't provide personal information such as full name and address."

Kids don't always follow rules, even when they are clear. Therefore, Weathersby also recommends the use of filtering technology

like Disney Circle. With Internet filters, Parents can set up various filters to block material according to their family's preferences. This technology is not perfect, so Weathersby recommends unscheduled checks of your children's devices. This could consist of simply walking by and asking your child to show you their device, and should also include checking the browser history to see what websites they are visiting.

If your child encounters offensive material or risky situations on the Internet, you should first document all the activity. Then, report it to your local law enforcement or the local FBI office so that they can properly investigate the incident.
