Holiday Traditions

It's getting cold so we all know what that means. It's the holiday season! So that means Christmas, Kwanzaa, and Hanukkah are coming up. In this article we will give you a brief history and how we celebrate it. So let's jump right in!

Christmas

Christmas is an annual celebration of Jesus' birthday and a coming together with family and friends. The celebration takes place on the 24th (Christmas Eve) and the 25th of December (Christmas Day). You can have a Christmas tree which presents have been put underneath for you. You tell jokes, stories and games. Games such as the white elephant game, snowball fights, board games and much more. It wouldn't be Christmas without having a feast. These feasts typically consist of biscochitos, turkey, prime rib, pumpkin pie, enchiladas, mashed potatoes, red chile, monkey bread, and posole.

Kwanzaa

Kwanzaa is a weeklong celebration that honors African heritage in African-American culture. Kwanzaa is the coming together of family and friends. There is a candle called the

Kinara with seven branches: three are red, three are green and one is black. Kwanzaa lasts seven days from December 26th to January 1st. Some traditions are lighting the candle, reflecting on the principles of the day, preparing and sharing foods, honoring ancestors, and sharing talents. Kwanzaa, like Christmas, is often celebrated with a feast.

Hanukkah is a coming together of family and friends. It is much like Kwanzaa. There is a menorah with 9 branches. The colors can be any color but are usually blue. Hanukkah lasts eight days and eight nights. Hanukkah celebrates the rededication of the Second Temple of Jerusalem after it was taken by the Greeks in 2nd century BCE, but then retaken by the Maccabees (Jewish warriors). This

year Hanukkah will be celebrated from December 18th to December 26th. You can celebrate Hanukkah by lighting the menorah (which candles are held upon) or you can celebrate by having a present for each eight days so eight presents in total.
