

THE EPISTLE

Hebrews 11:1-3, 8-16

Reader A reading from the Letter to the Hebrews.

Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen. Indeed, by faith our ancestors received approval. By faith we understand that the worlds were prepared by the word of God, so that what is seen was made from things that are not visible.

By faith Abraham obeyed when he was called to set out for a place that he was to receive as an inheritance; and he set out, not knowing where he was going. By faith he stayed for a time in the land he had been promised, as in a foreign land, living in tents, as did Isaac and Jacob, who were heirs with him of the same promise. For he looked forward to the city that has foundations, whose architect and builder is God. By faith he received power of procreation, even though he was too old s— and Sarah herself was barren— because he considered him faithful who had promised. Therefore from one person, and this one as good as dead, descendants were born, "as many as the stars of heaven and as the innumerable grains of sand by the seashore."

All of these died in faith without having received the promises, but from a distance they saw and greeted them. They confessed that they were strangers and foreigners on the earth, for people who speak in this way make it clear that they are seeking a homeland. If they had been thinking of the land that they had left behind, they would have had opportunity to return. But as it is, they desire a better country, that is, a heavenly one. Therefore God is not ashamed to be called their God; indeed, he has prepared a city for them.

THE GOSPEL Luke 12:32-40







FREE LITTLE LIBRARY OPENED AT ST. PHILIP'S CHURCH

Many of us probably take for granted that we can purchase or otherwise access reading materials, and find in them stories and people with whom we can readily identify. The search is more complicated for people of color, especially children. How many of your first reading experiences "starred" a principal character who was not white? Things are turning around now, and our Episcopalian partners at St. Philip's just opened a free little library outside the Fernhill Avenue entrance in July. Offerings feature a colorful cast of authors and characters, in books for children through adults. The installation was the main event of this year's Love Rising community outreach, and will welcome ongoing support as they encourage literacy and love for reading. Report from the Organ Committee

For those of you who have worshipped at St. Paul's Cathedral at 10:15 on Sundays since July 6 (either in person or on YouTube), you'll know that the singing has been accompanied by piano rather than by the organ.

Issues of weather, specifically the humidity, has caused ciphers on the organ. A cipher is a pipe which keeps sounding, even when the key is not being depressed, or when a pipe sounds without any key being depressed. Actually, the Cathedral pipe organ has been having cipher problems for many, many months.

The organ overall is in dreadful condition. Not even a third of it is in playable condition. This is primarily a result of inferior work that was done on the Cathedral organ a couple years ago, which is not to professional industry standards. The cost of repairing and/or replacing much of the work will be extremely time consuming, and quite expensive.

This past March, the Dean gathered together an Organ Committee to try to address the problems. The committee includes:

Canon Craig Dressler (Canon for Ministry Development & Transition in the Diocese of Northwestern Pennsylvania) who holds a Bachelor of Music in organ performance from Westminster College.

Patricia Hills (Interim Choir Director and Chair of the Cathedral Music Committee) who in addition to singing at the Cathedral and with many local choral ensembles, is a vocal music teacher at Windemere Blvd. School in the Amherst Central School District.

The Rev. Canon Earle King, a retired priest who attends the Cathedral and who holds degrees in organ performance from the Eastman School of Music and the University of Oklahoma.

The Very Rev. Rebecca Barnes, (Dean of St. Paul's) who holds a Master of Music degree in classical vocal performance from the Manhattan School of Music and was a professional church musician in NYC for 27 years. She also oversaw the upgrade of the organ at her previous parish in PA.

The Organ Committee has met a number of times since March and has two nationally renowned consultants assisting them, one of whom is an authority on Hope Jones, the pipework in our Gallery.

Due to the current state of the organ, and because the current ciphers are making the organ unusable, the Committee feels the need to act quickly. We have been in conversation with several organ companies and are working on what will be a multistage project that will take several years.

In the short term, the Committee believes that the best solution is to acquire a high-quality digital organ. This itself will probably take 6-8 months. This step is in keeping with what other major churches, i.e. The Cathedral of St. John the Divine (NYC), Trinity Wall Street, and the National Cathedral (DC) have done. This would give the Cathedral the time to engage in the many years' long process of fundraising and installing a new pipe organ, which would include the restoration of at least some of the current pipe organ, especially the historic Hope Jones pipework.

At this point, we have bids from two builders for a digital organ and will be presenting a recommendation to the Vestry at their upcoming August meeting.

The other "plus" of fairly quickly acquiring a digital organ is that the Cathedral would be in a much better position to hire an Organist / Choirmaster. Trying to call a new Organist/Choirmaster with only a barely functioning pipe organ would be practically impossible. Furthermore, the presence of a new Organist / Choirmaster would mean the Cathedral would have, on staff, someone to help the Cathedral move toward a new pipe organ with much greater skill and ease.

We look forward to sharing more information with you as it becomes available. We thank you for your support and prayers as we continue in this critically important work.

tiful sanctuary, and to the work that we as a congregation are doing.
