When they had washed her, they laid her in a room upstairs. Since Lydda was near Joppa, the disciples, who heard that Peter was there, sent two men to him with the request, "Please come to us without delay." So Peter got up and went with them; and when he arrived, they took him to the room upstairs. All the widows stood beside him, weeping and showing tunics and other clothing that Dorcas had made while she was with them. Peter put all of them outside, and then he knelt down and prayed. He turned to the body and said, "Tabitha, get up." Then she opened her eyes, and seeing Peter, she sat up. He gave her his hand and helped her up. Then calling the saints and widows, he showed her to be alive. This became known throughout Joppa, and many believed in the Lord. Meanwhile he stayed in Joppa for some time with a certain Simon, a tanner.

A Letter from the Presidents of the Standing Committees of WNY and NWPA

Dear Friends in Christ,

As the Presidents of the Standing Committees of the Dioceses of Western New York and Northwestern Pennsylvania, we write to share an update on the status of our Episcopal Partnership.

After a season of prayerful discernment, during which we listened to many voices across our dioceses, the May 3rd Joint Special Convention did not vote to extend the nature of our Partnership by electing a bishop diocesan together.

The Diocese of Northwestern Pennsylvania voted not to approve the resolution to begin the process of electing a bishop diocesan in partnership with the Diocese of Western New York. The vote tally was Clerical Order: 3–25; Lay Order: 11–43.

The Diocese of Western New York voted not to approve the resolution to begin the process of electing a bishop diocesan in partnership with the Diocese of Northwestern Pennsylvania. The vote tally was Clerical Order: 14–36; Lay Order: 45–68.

This decision was made carefully and faithfully, with a deep love for the Church and a commitment to what is best for the mission and ministry of each diocese. The Partnership Evaluation, Lenten Study and multiple in-person and Zoom listening and information sessions about the Special Convention provided invaluable assistance to our individual and collective discernment.

We want to say clearly: this decision does not erase the many ways God has blessed our shared life. Over the past 6 years, we have discovered the strength that comes from walking together, learning from each other, bearing witness together, and offering the world a witness of hope and collaboration. We give thanks for every relationship formed, every ministry strengthened and every new possibility glimpsed through our partnership. We will remain one in the Spirit even as we move forward as two dioceses.

The Standing Committees of each diocese will now begin the work of discerning next steps in securing its own episcopal oversight. Working with our Diocesan Councils, we hope to realign staff and administrative resources to serve each diocese separately—effective on or before July 1st. We are also making plans to celebrate what we have accomplished together in Partnership at a gathering on Thursday, June 19th. More information about this will be forthcoming. We ask for your prayers in the days ahead – prayers for our dioceses, for our leaders, for our congregations, and most of all, for the Spirit's continued guidance as we move forward. We trust that the God who has carried us thus far will continue to lead us into new chapters of ministry, filled with hope and new life.

From the Dean's Desk:

Last Friday, the Cathedral received an emergency request to temporarily offer space to the Code Blue Shelter. While Code Blue officially ended on April 30, the shelter wrote a proposal to continue services as they are caring for many of our neighbors, some who quite vulnerable. The need for the shelter to continue uninterrupted was vital due to a critical shortage of shelter space and affordable housing in Buffalo. Following a discussion with our senior warden, I emailed by Vestry and after a day of discussion back and forth, we moved forward to open our space for this purpose. An announcement was made to the congregation at both services last Sunday, May 4th.

The shelter that is run by Sylvia's House in cooperation with the Western New York Coalition for the Homeless and is a temporary 24 hour shelter. They will be renting space from us in the Walker Room and adjacent areas while they work towards moving into a permanent facility in the next few weeks. The shelter is staffed by 2-3 people at all times and there are professional security services on site at all times.

I realize that this will interrupt the normal flow of our common life here at St. Paul's, particularly on Sunday mornings, but it is a gracious act of living into the Gospel. On Sundays the coffee hour host, and those assisting, will bring refreshments to the narthex, or other designated location while the shelter is in operation. We will need to share restroom facilities; if needed, there is a small restroom in the sacristy hallway (please see a clergy person or altar guild member, for assistance).

I thank you for your anticipated flexibility as we host our guests remembering always Jesus' words, "What you did for the least of these, you did unto me."

I was at weekly Bible Study this morning with Mother Sarah Rieth, and during check-in, I reported - joyfully - that the cathedral was serving as temporary shelter for "homeless," and referred them to our Facebook page. We are studying the Book of Luke, and our first passage was 6:46 - "[Jesus said] "Why do you call me, Lord, Lord, and do not do what I tell you? I will show you what someone is like who comes to me, hears my words, and acts on them. That one is like a man building a house who digs deeply and laid the foundation on rock; when a flood arose, the river burst against the house but could not shake it, because it had been well built."

The words just jumped out at me, "hears my word, and acts on it." I believe this is what is happening at the cathedral, hearing God's call and acting on it. So when I think of the people temporarily housed amid our foundations, I see them as a gift from God to strengthen my faith foundation, so that I don't crumble when all of the world's troubles come flooding in.

Because I am never far from thinking like a child, I might start singing, "The wise Man Built his House upon a Rock". But I also thought of the birdwoman in Mary Poppins and might start singing, All around the cathedral the saints and apostles look down as she sells her wares, and though you can't see them, you know they are smiling every time someone shows that he cares' I believe we have a very firm foundation, and there's a lot of smiling going on.

On Saturday, April 26, ten intrepid St. Paul's volunteers ventured to the Scajaquada Creek at the foot of Peter Street to participate again this year in the Buffalo Niagara Waterkeeper Annual Spring Sweep. We were among the nearly 1500 volunteers around Western New York who spent a couple of hours that morning cleaning up trash. In all, over 10,000 pounds of trash was collected that day. The aim of the event, according to its organizers, is to "Our collective action is intended to benefit the health and future of the millions of people and species that call the Great Lakes Basin their home." In addition, the data on the types of debris collected is sent to local and federal authorities to aid in conservation actions. Among the bottles, broken glass and papers our team found were car and bicycle tires, assorted clothes and a complete safety glass windshield. Reflections on the Resurrection, Week 4

Easter first happened in a cemetery. Not under the sparkling sunlight of a spring morning. Not in a field of pastel tulips. Not tangled in a prolonged cellophane celebration. Easter happened in a cemetery. Surrounded by death. Incubated by stubborn shadows. Carried in a broken heart. Greeted quite unexpectedly by a woman who no longer dreamed dreams.

Mary Magdalene was a brave, bold woman. But even brave, bold women can be devastated by the shocking violence of this world. And on Easter morning, she was devastated. Though there was breath in her lungs and blood in her heart, in a way, Mary died with Jesus – because violence is never an isolated incident; there is always collateral damage; it spreads like a disease.

But resurrection is contagious, too. And on Easter, Mary came back to life with Jesus. In a cemetery, in the midst of death, there was life. Pulsing with resurrection, Mary was brave enough to see more than emptiness in the empty tomb. She had the courage to be the first citizen of the Easter world to show her resurrection, to walk her tear-stained cheeks into a locked room of downcast disciples, who knew nothing about the empty tomb, who had not yet experienced resurrection life, and testify: “I have seen the Lord!”


It was a stunningly audacious statement given the circumstances. She journeyed to the graveyard to visit a corpse. She found the body missing. Before she ever spoke a word about resurrection, she told a story of grave robbers. And as that bad situation grew worse, she lingered to weep while the guys went home.

But then Easter happened, in a cemetery, where the dying and the burying happen. Because that was where Easter was needed. And it is still needed. In this Good Friday world, in this world in which the dying and the burying happen, in this world in which despair holds a place of prominence, we need a Church that has experienced Easter, and has felt the breath of the Risen Christ. We need Christians who are brave enough and bold enough to show the world their resurrection.

We do not have to settle for a Good Friday world. We do not have to accept the death and violence, the nightmares and the despair. We do not have to resign ourselves to the scourge of war, to the plague of addiction, to shelter-in-place drills in kindergarten classrooms, to partisan discord, to racism and hateful prejudice. Those things are all too real, but they are not the reality God wants for us or for this world.

And that is the miracle of Easter: Easter happens in this world, with these heartaches. Easter happens in the shadow of the cross. It happens in the cemetery. It is watered by tears. It does not deny the reality of pain and death; Easter defies pain and death. It is the sun that scatters the clouds. It is a dream so much truer than any nightmare.

The Easter God is daring us to dream that impossible dream. To believe that impossible dreams can come true. In this world, God is calling us to listen for the voice of the Risen Christ, still whispering resurrection, still speaking forth new life, in this world. Jesus is still telling that ancient and eternal story – a story in which love wins, and life is stronger than death, and hope is never in vain.



This is the story that means to transform your life and spill from your lips. Be brave enough to see more than emptiness in that empty tomb; be daring enough to dream impossible dreams. And then be foolish enough to live as if those dreams will come true.
