The Beatitudes

In this church year (Year A, for those keeping track), our primary gospel is Matthew and today we hear the first part of a signficant section in this gospel, the Sermon on the Mount. Known as the Beatitudes, this introduction lifts up eight blessings and helps us see an emerging priority in Jesus' preaching, emphasizing compassion. Throughout the gospel, Matthew portrays Jesus as a teacher, and it is widely believed that he has organized a collection of Jesus' teachings or sayings into a "sermon," which we hear unfold in chapters 5-7. In this text, Jesus presents what it is like to live in God's reign, following God's ways – beginning with blessings. You'll find a similar passage in Luke 6, part of the Sermon on the Plain.



The Collect of the Day

FIRST READING Micah 6:1-8

Hear what the Lord says: Rise, plead your case before the mountains, and let the hills hear your voice. Hear, you mountains, the controversy of the Lord, and you enduring foundations of the earth; for the Lord has a controversy with his people, and he will contend with Israel.

"O my people, what have I done to you? In what have I wearied you? Answer me! For I brought you up from the land of Egypt, and redeemed you from the house of slavery; and I sent before you Moses, Aaron, and Miriam. O my people, remember now what King Balak of Moab devised, what Balaam son of Beor answered him, and what happened from Shittim to Gilgal, that you may know the saving acts of the Lord."

"With what shall I come before the Lord, and bow myself before God on high? Shall I come before him with burnt-offerings, with calves a year old? Will the Lord be pleased with thousands of rams, with tens of thousands of rivers of oil? Shall I give my firstborn for my transgression, the fruit of my body for the sin of my soul?"

He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you, but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?

After the reading, the Reader may say

PSALM Psalm 15 - read responsively by whole verse

Lord, who may dwell in your tabernacle? Who may abide upon your holy hill? Whoever leads a blameless life and does what is right, who speaks the truth from his heart.

There is no guile upon his tongue; he does no evil to his friend; he does not heap contempt upon his neighbor.

In his sight the wicked is rejected, but he honors those who fear the Lord.

He has sworn to do no wrong and does not take back his word.

He does not give his money in hope of gain, nor does he take a bribe against the innocent.

Whoever does these things shall never be overthrown.

SECOND READING 1 Corinthians 1:18-31

The message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. For it is written, "I will destroy the wisdom of the wise, and the discernment of the discerning I will thwart."

Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, God decided, through the foolishness of our proclamation, to save those who believe. For Jews demand signs and Greeks desire wisdom, but we proclaim Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, but to those who are the called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. For God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength.

Consider your own call, brothers and sisters: not many of you were wise by human standards, not many were powerful, not many were of noble birth. But God chose what >>

is foolish in the world to shame the wise; God chose what is weak in the world to shame the strong; God chose what is low and despised in the world, things that are not, to reduce to nothing things that are, so that no one might boast in the presence of God. He is the source of your life in Christ Jesus, who became for us wisdom from God, and righteousness and sanctification and redemption, in order that, as it is written, "Let the one who boasts, boast in the Lord."



We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in Jesus Christ, the Word made flesh. For in these last days you sent Jesus to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In Christ, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In Christ, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

On the night before he died for us, our Savior Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."



The Breaking of the Bread

The Celebrant breads the consecrated bread. A period of silence is kept, then the People sing (said at 8 a.m.),



The Celebrant says the following Invitation

The Gifts of God for the People of God.

An usher will invite all to a single-file line in the main aisle for communion and you may return to your pew by the side aisles. Anyone needing assistance to receive communion may indicate so to an usher and it will be brought to you at the end. You may receive at the high altar rail (stand or kneel), or at the station at the transept. Receive bread with both hands open and receive the chalice (wine) to drink from the cup, or simply consume the bread only, which we consider full communion. To receive the bread with intinction in the wine by the priest, extend one hand. Gluten-free bread is available at the lower station.

To receive a blessing, indicate your desire by crossing your arms over your heart.

Social Justice Action Team

The horrendous terrorist attack at Tops Market on Jefferson Avenue last May reminded us all of the East Side food desert, and of general food insecurity in poor neighborhoods in Buffalo. The Erma Jaeckle Fund at St. Paul's has challenged us to aid Buffalo's hungry people. The Providence Farm Collective in Orchard Park is a refugee-organized initiative to provide access to land for farmers forced from their own countries who now live in Western New York. Farmers from 9 different ethnic communities grow culturally relevant, healthy foods that they donate to regional food pantries, and sell at local farmer's markets and retail outlets. The farm offers employment to displaced farmers, addresses food insecurity in multiple ways, encourages healthy eating, and encourages young people to participate in ancestral traditions. VESTRY/WARDEN NOMINEES

Nominees for Annual Meeting Election – annual meeting after 10:15 a.m. worship today For the election at the annual meeting, the nominees are: Warden, Michael Bonilla (2-year term); Vestry members (all for 3-year terms), Evelyn Smigelsky, Judy Elliott, Su Hadden, and Kim Goodman O'Connell. For delegates to the convention, Reid and Elenora Heffner; alternate delegate, Kathy Reiss. The following persons are leaving Vestry: Jeremy Kinney, Anne Simet, Ellie Hefner, and Peter Snodgrass. Su Hadden is presently completing an unexpired term and is therefore eligible to be elected for a full, 3-year term.

Michael Bonilla – I was received into the Episcopal church in the cathedral in January of 1966. Ever Since this has been my spiritual home. Over the years I have been involved in many aspects of life in this church, including, singing in the choir, serving as an acolyte, serving on the Properties and music committees, and chair several Stewardship campaigns. Over the course of the years, I have served on three different vestries, and have been elected warden twice. I believe my past experience in church leadership is the most valuable thing that I will bring to the next vestry. During this time of transition for the cathedral, strong effective lay leadership is very important as we prepare to enter the search process to call a permanent dean for St. Paul's. I am confident in the leadership abilities of those who will be considered for vestry at our annual meeting, as well as those who will continue to serve on the vestry.

Judy Elliott – I wish to serve on the Vestry again, as a member of the Cathedral. I have served for two terms (6 years) previously, and would like to serve again. I have recently served as leader of the Altar Guild and I am currently the co-leader of Pastoral Care and co-leader of the Garden of Love, and member of the Stewardship Committee. I have a vast amount of knowledge of the church and the diocese, as I have served on many committees over the years. I have a background in church finances as I served as Treasurer of my former parish of St. Simon's for seven years. I believe I could make many contributions and help the Vestry make wise decisions on behalf of the Cathedral. I would like to see the Vestry become more active in outreach to the neighborhood around the Cathedral. There is work to be done, and I believe I can be helpful.

Kim Goodman – The vestry's leadership role must be responsive to the new realities of American economic life and today's society. I believe I have a skill set of imagination, flexibility, and execution follow thru. I have dug in the gardens as a member of the Garden committee, climbed on the roof to fix gutters as a member of the Properties committee and hosted receptions with the Ushers Committee. I was delighted to represent St. Paul's by completing the "Home Again" project for the Buffalo Refugee Program for the Social Justice Action Team. My family and myself have been active members of St. Paul's for over 70 years. I was baptized, confirmed and married at St. Paul's. I believe in and am committed to the future mission of St. Paul's within the Buffalo Community.

Susan (Su) M Hadden – I am currently serving a (Covid) extended one-year unexpired Vestry term and so put my name in consideration to continue to serve on your Vestry for a full 3-year term. A cradle member of the Church of England, and a member of the Episcopal Church since arriving in Buffalo 30 years ago, I have been a member of the Cathedral since soon after my arrival. I've served regularly as a Lector and an occasional usher and coffee host. Most recently I chaired the Dean's search committee and currently serve on the Music Ministry taskforce as we work to re-envision and revitalize the historically wonderful music here at St Paul's. In my "day job," I serve on the Presiding Bishop's staff at the Church Center in New York as the Operations Manager and Executive Assistant to the Chief Operating Officer. As I said in my letter to the congregation during pledge season: "Whilst the last several years have presented us all with many challenges, I feel hopeful that we can begin to look ahead to a new season of renaissance for St. Paul's". Join us in the journey.

Evelyn Smigelsky - My involvement with St. Paul's Cathedral began in 1951 when my parents took my sister and me there for the first time. My sister was four years old, and I was three years old. Now 72 years later, I am still a member of the Cathedral because, quite simply, it is my spiritual home. Whether as a young child or a grown woman, I have always found comfort in the beauty and majesty of the Cathedral. Moreover, Saint Paul's is where many important events in my life including my confirmation and my marriage have taken place. In other words, the Cathedral has been a fundamental part of my life's journey. At this point in time, I believe that it is important for me to give back to the Cathedral through more active involvement in the life of the church. For that reason, I am seeking to be part of the cathedral vestry.
