### The Season of Creation: Theme for 2025: Peace with Creation

The Season of Creation is the annual Christian celebration to pray and respond together to the cry of Creation. The "Celebration" begins I September, the World Day of Prayer for Creation or Feast of Creation, and ends 4 October, the Feast of Saint Francis of Assisi.

#### The Theme for 2025: Peace with Creation

The theme for Season of Creation this year is Peace with Creation.

Our Biblical text for this year is Isaiah 32:14-18.

#### War on Creation

The prophet Isaiah pictured the desolated Creation without peace because of the lack of justice and the broken relationship between God and humankind. This description of devastated cities and wastelands eloquently stresses the fact that human destructive behaviours have a negative impact on the Earth.

## Our hope: Creation will find peace when justice is restored

There is still hope and the expectation for a peaceful Earth. To hope in a biblical context does not mean to stand still and quiet, but to act, pray, change and reconcile with Creation and the Creator in unity, metanoia (repentance) and solidarity.

### The Symbol for 2025: the Garden of Peace

The symbol is characterized by a dove carrying an olive branch bringing life to "the garden of peace". In the Biblical story of the flood, the dove plays the role of the blessed messenger: The dove sent out by Noah returns to the ark with a fresh olive branch in its beak, signalling that the flood is receding. As the flood story begins with a situation where "the earth is filled with violence" (Genesis 6:13), the return of the dove with the olive branch came to be known as a sign of new peace.

### The advocacy focus for 2025 - Debt relief

This year the Season of Creation is calling for action to address the huge costs of climate change and ecological destruction which are being faced by the most vulnerable people.

There can be no peace without justice, and one of the biggest injustices facing our world today is the huge level of debt owed by poor and vulnerable countries to rich countries, suffering the worst impacts of climate change, even though they have done the least to cause it.

Join us as we will hit the trail to celebrate the Eucharist in nature. Holy Hikes is an eco-Ministry of The Episcopal Church that is committed to rebuilding Communion between all of God's Creation. It's founder and director, Fr. Justin Cannon says, "I feel closest to God in nature and also in the Holy Eucharist. Through Holy Hikes people across the country are bringing these two together in profound ways." We will hike rain or shine. All are welcome; carpooling will be available.

## **Organ Project - Phase 1 Announcement**

On behalf of the Vestry and the Organ Committee, I am pleased to announce that St. Paul's has entered into a contract with the R.A, Colby Organ Co. of Johnson City, Tennessee for the first phase of our organ restoration and rebuilding project.

This initial phase will involve retrofitting the organ console in the gallery to be a three-manual digital organ utilizing Walker Digital components. The console will be moved at the end of September. We anticipate this first phase work will be completed by Easter. This step is similar to what many other parishes in the Episcopal Church have done, namely, The Cathedral Church of St. John the Divine, St. Thomas, 5th Avenue, and Trinity Wall Street (all in NYC), as well as the National Cathedral in Washington, DC. The digital components being incorporated in this phase will enable us to move forward on an overall pipe organ restoration and can be sold or retained and reprogrammed for use in our instrument.

We will then move into the next phases of our restoration project which will include a national search for an organist/choirmaster and procuring proposals from several companies for a full restoration of our historic pipe organ, especially, the Hope-Jones solo and pedal divisions. As most organ companies have a several year waiting time, this will allow us to focus on a capital campaign and grant writing to raise needed funds for the full restoration and rebuilding project.

Though now based in Tennessee, the Colbys are not strangers to Buffalo; their roots are here in Western New York. Robert Colby and two business partners founded the Delaware Organ Company in Tonawanda, NY, a forerunner of what is now the Colby Organ Co. They have also done extensive work at Westminster Presbyterian Church on Delaware Ave., Buffalo. Of the work done there, Garrett Martin, Organist and Director, noted:

"The Colby team approached our instrument with extraordinary care and artistic sensitivity. Their enhancements honored the character of the original pipework while bringing color and vitality to its voice. The new consoles are beautifully crafted and equipped with 21st-century technology and functionality, opening up fresh possibilities for performance and profoundly enriching our worship."

Other recent projects undertaken by the Colby company include: Trinity Episcopal Cathedral, Miami, FL; United States Naval Academy, Annapolis, MD; Moody Bible Institute, Chicago, IL; Coral Ridge Presbyterian, Fort Lauderdale, FL; Cathedral Church of St. Luke, Orlando, FL; St. Luke's Episcopal Church, Salisbury, NC. Corinth Reformed Church, Hickory, NC; St. John's Episcopal Cathedral, Jacksonville, FL; and the Castro Theater, San Francisco, CA.

I, the Vestry, organ committee, and music committee of St. Paul's look forward to the work ahead and are deeply committed to the very finest restoration of our historic pipe organ. Music is integral to Anglican/Episcopal liturgy and worship. It is our goal to have an organ befitting our cathedral - a national historic landmark, and one that will enhance our liturgy and music as we seek to worship God and lift our voices in praise and thanksgiving in this beloved sacred space.

# August 31, 2025 – Pentecost 12 (C) New Episcopal Community Grants

New Episcopal Community grant applications are open for dioceses and mission developers who are envisioning, planning, or growing new worshipping communities and missional enterprises throughout the church. **The deadline to apply is Sept. 23**, with grantees announced after the Executive Council meeting in late October.

The following types of grants are available:

**Discernment Grants:** Up to \$5,000 to fund the discernment season of a New Episcopal Community. Funds may be used for sending the potential point leader to a gifts assessment retreat, coaching, training, demographic studies, micro-experiments, visits to similar types of ministries, and more.

**Seed Grants:** Up to \$30,000 to fund the initial stages of a New Episcopal Community's launch. A seed grant recipient is typically in the first and/or second year of its life cycle. A seed grant application has a strong and realistic ministry plan, the beginnings of a core team, and support from its local diocese.

**Growth Grants:** Up to \$30,000 to help fund approximately the second and third years of a New Episcopal Community.

**Harvest Grants:** Up to \$40,000 to help fund the later stages of a New Episcopal Community's launch (approximately years three to six).
