Shalom, Shalom!

Thanksgiving, the idea and the holiday, are both on my mind. We know that giving thanks is a very religious value and is most certainly a Jewish value. I submit that giving thanks and expressing gratitude are among the most, if not the most, of all human and religious values. Such expressions appear on almost on every page of

our siddur. Of course, the recent holiday of Sukkot is our own institutionalized Thanksgiving. However, as Americans who enjoy America's freedom and blessings, we, as Jews, have an additional, albeit secular holiday to express our gratitude.

In my family, we always looked forward to Thanksgiving with great anticipation. Family members from far and wide would make their way to one central location on Long Island and for one day, catch up on each other's lives. Although many family members have passed on, we still try to gather each year pausing to remember them as we celebrate our family and give thanks for all that we have.

One of our sages Rabbi Meir taught that in gratitude one should recite a hundred blessings every day. Even on the most ordinary and uneventful of days, there are countless occasions for expressions of gratitude. Beyond those of home, family, food and shelter, there are so many gifts that call forth a blessing. There are moments and sights that could and should be sanctified with a *bracha*, with a blessing. These may include the magic of a melody that captures the heart, an idea that exalts the mind, a stately tree that excites the imagination, a formation of migrating birds, a rainfall that refreshes, a congenial conversation, autumn leaves, the reawakening of nature every spring, the sudden appearance of a magical rainbow and the freedom to which we awaken every day. These and so many others are gifts and moments to treasure. Indeed, the quality of our lives is reflected by the things that move us to recite a *bracha*. To celebrate Thanksgiving is to celebrate life.


Written by "At The Well"...Cheshvan: Faith. Follow through. Grounding. Spiritual Energy of Cheshvan: Feel the Let-Down Last month, we honored ourselves, our humanity, and our



closeness to the Divine. Jewish teachings suggest that over the last month we ascended to receive life's gifts and take

full advantage of elevated states and experiences. Together, we created a month's worth of energy that was deep, powerful, honest, emotional, and joyous. And now... well, now, we have Cheshvan, the only month in the entire Hebrew calendar with no holidays. Building on the stillness of this month, there's even a tradition of foregoing celebrations such as weddings during Cheshvan. In essence, this month gives us room to experience the fullness of the let-down. Feel the Let-Down We all know that let-down feeling. At some point, transcendent highs turn to lows. They always go together. You spend a weekend visiting your best friends, laughing, connecting, being together... and then the weekend ends. You go home, back to the grind, and acutely feel the absence of that camaraderie and love. This phenomenon was probably familiar to early Jews returning from Jerusalem after making sacrifices at the Temple, and for our ancestors returning from spiritual pilgrimages to visit their Rebbes. When that spiritual high was over and the people journeyed home, it would have felt like a shock, a time of mourning, or at least a little slump as they waded back into the "muck" of everyday life. Our Hebrew calendar is thoughtfully designed. After an ecstatic Tishrei, Cheshvan asks us to land. We're invited to use this month as a spiritual tool to bring ourselves back down, planting our feet firmly on the earth. Follow Your Intentions. Cheshvan is when the real work begins. On Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, we made promises to do better this year. In Cheshvan, we honor those intentions and take the first steps toward making them real. This month, allow yourself space to notice any resistance you have to making the improvements you promised you'd make, and resistance you have to change in general. We must go beyond ourselves to be who we want to be. It's important to stay clear and awake to your intentions during this time. Step forward even if you can't see clearly where exactly you're going — that's faith. And be generous with yourself as you gauge your progress. It's Worth It. In Judaism, we believe every person and every moment has a chance to become holy. We believe what we do, and experience can change the fabric of our lives and the world. Our work while on Earth is to elevate ourselves and bring goodness to our time while alive. Our job is to manifest love, justice, peace, and joy, and to know that what we say and how we act matters. This month, have faith, and keep moving toward the light.

From Our Temple Treasurer

Two Ways to Make a Tax-Free Contributions to Temple Beth El

Starting in 2019 the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act increased the standard Federal income tax deduction such that more than 90 percent of taxpayers now take the standard deduction. The 2022 standard deduction is \$13,850 for single filers and \$27,700 for those filing married filing jointly. Add \$1500 for singles and \$3000 for married filing jointly for those over sixty-five.

That means your contributions to the Temple along with major medical and other deductible expenses would have to exceed these amounts to have an impact on your tax bill.

However, there are at least two ways to make a significant contribution to the Temple and save money on your taxes:

- 1. Set up a Charitable Remainder Trust with the Temple as the charitable beneficiary.
- 2. For those over the age of seventy-two with a traditional IRA, pay the required minimum distribution (RMD) directly from the IRA to the Temple.

The Charitable Remainder Trust must be set up by an attorney. It is an irrevocable trust. The donor transfers cash or assets to the trust. In addition to a qualified charity (such as the Temple) there must be one or more living individuals who will receive income from the trust for a specific number of years or for life. At the end of the term the remainder of the trust passes to the charitable organization.

Making changes in your RMD distribution is much easier. Simply inform the bank or broker that you want either a fixed amount or a percentage to go to the synagogue. The end of year statement (1099-R) will never show that amount and you can still take the standard deduction.

These paragraphs are for your general information only. It is <u>not</u> tax advice. I urge you to consult with a qualified income tax professional before making any changes.

Tax Planning and High Holiday Giving

If you have appreciated stock in any publicly traded company, you can donate the stock to Temple Beth El. You may be able to deduct the current market value from your 2021 taxable income as a Schedule A deduction without paying capital gains tax. The Temple can then sell the stock and use the funds to continue our good work.

Tax year 2021 appears to be the last year that most taxpayers can take up to a charitable cash contribution to a non-profit organization (such as Temple Beth El) directly from adjusted gross income. This "above the line" deduction is limited to \$300 for taxpayers filing as single, head of household, qualified widow(er)s, and married filing separately. Taxpayers filing joint returns are limited to \$600.

As in all things tax-related, there are exceptions and additional rules. Each person's situation is unique. Please check with your tax preparer to be sure. These are general suggestions only based on publicly available information.

An Easy Way to Donate to TBE

Most of use have a dish where we collect coins that fell into our pockets or purses. Please consider donating them to the Temple's "Pushki Fund." One hundred percent of the coins donated will go to the Temple's general fund and help us fund on-going operations. We will acknowledge your donation by letter and, if you itemize deductions, you can use the amount to lower your tax bill. Just put the coins into a sturdy plastic bag along with a note with your name and address. Leave the bag on the Temple's desk in the office the next time you come to services. We'll take it from there.






