I am a retired Special Agent/Criminal Investigator, currently working on various business projects and consulting on topics related to my professional background. My education includes a BS degree in Business Administration and a MA in International Security Affairs.

# Minutes of the Annual Parish Assembly St. Mary Armenian Apostolic Church, Washington DC February 18, 2024

#### **Opening:**

The Parish Assembly started at 12:31 PM. **Der Hovsep Karapetyan** opened the meeting with a prayer.

#### **Verification of Quorum:**

The Nominating Committee verified the presence of 62 dues-paying members; therefore, a quorum was confirmed.

#### **Election of Chairman and Secretary of the Day:**

**Mark Krikorian** presented the ballot for the officers of the day. Nominations from the floor were sought. No new nominations were put forth for the chairman or the secretary of the day.

The ballots were distributed for voting.

Mark Krikorian announced the winners. The chairperson of the day was Avedis Seferian, and the secretary of the day was Beverly Sivaslian.

**Avedis Seferian** addressed the assembly. He spoke to the Assembly about the idea of peace and how it is only possible when communities gather together, debate, and engage in respectful discourse. He expressed how grateful he was for our participation in this process.

#### **Adoption of Agenda:**

**Raffi Karahisar** asked if we could have printed copies of the booklet sent to parishioners' homes since electronic copies are not conducive to taking notes. It was decided that the booklet would continue to be sent out electronically, but parishioners could either request that a hard copy be sent to them or pick one up from church on the Sunday before the next Parish Assembly.

**Zaven Kalayjian** pointed out that Old Business was not included in the agenda, but it was decided that Old Business would be discussed before New Business.

Jack Bournazian made a motion to adopt the agenda, as it was presented. The motion was seconded by Zaven Kalayjian and passed unanimously.

#### **Approval of the Minutes of the 2023 Parish Assembly:**

Comments or corrections to the 2023 Parish Assembly Minutes were requested.

Sean McClure moved to adopt the minutes. Aline Guiragossian seconded the motion, and it was unanimously approved.

#### **Nominating Committee Report and Floor Nominations:**

Mark Krikorian reviewed the ballot.

The names of the nine candidates running for Parish Council were read. Additional nominations were sought. **Onnik Sivaslian** was nominated from the floor, and he accepted the nomination. His name was added to the ballot. Five seats will be voted for. Each of the Parish Council candidates who were present at the meeting were invited to speak in support of their nomination.

The five candidates for the Nominating Committee were read. Additional nominations were sought, but no additional nominations were put forth. Three seats will be voted for.

The two candidates for the Auditing Committee were read. Additional nominations were sought. No additional nominations were put forth. One seat will be voted for.

The two candidates for the Investment Committee were read. Additional nominations were sought, but no additional nominations were put forth. One seat will be voted for.

The two candidates for the WED Scholarship Committee were read. Additional nominations were sought, but no additional nominations were put forth. One seat will be voted for.

The nominating committee retired to produce the ballots that would include the new nominations.

#### Pastor's Report:

Der Hovsep Karapetyan presented the Pastor's Report. He spoke of the fact that the parish had a number of difficulties, but also a number of triumphs. He gave thanks to God for all of our blessings. He shared that we celebrated 65 Badaraks, had 26 baptisms, 11 weddings, and 160 requiem services. As a community, we have a social media presence and reach 2,600 people via our Facebook page and YouTube channel. He expressed his appreciation for all of the tireless efforts of our church organizations and our Parish Council. He acknowledged that this year was a difficult one with the loss of Artsakh, but that we should seek solace in the Lord and in the connection with our community. He then asked for questions. Hratch Semerjian asked if there was any plan for the Primate to visit our parish. Der Hayr shared that the Primate should be visiting us in December for the Anniversary of the church. At that time, he will also ordain our altar servers to the rank of deacon.

#### **Parish Council Report:**

**Shoghig Sahakyan** shared that the Parish Council led many activities but noted that volunteers are needed to assist with church activities. She also encouraged people to donate money or ask for donations to the church in honor of birthdays and anniversaries. She thanked the Parish Council members for their hard work and encouraged the new generation to get involved.

#### **Vote on the Ballot:**

The Nominating Committee distributed the ballots. **Avedis** thanked the Nominating Committee (**Zaven Kalayjian**, **Becky Bagdasarian**, and **Mark Krikorian**) for their work. They then retired to count the votes. **Raffi Karahisar** was asked to stand in as a member of the Auditing Committee for the verification of the ballots.

#### **Operating Fund Report:**

Jack Guiragossian presented the Operating Fund Report and stated that it was a challenging year. Unbudgeted funds

were spent to repair HVAC issues. The speakers and the lighting in the sanctuary were updated. Additionally, last year was a 53-week year, so payroll was a little over the normal budget due to that. Jack mentioned that it was a record year for the two food festival profits. There were no questions regarding the Operating Fund Report. **Mark Krikorian** moved to accept the Operating Fund Report. The motion was seconded by **Hratch Semerjian** and passed unanimously.

#### Pastor's Memorandum of Understanding (MOU):

**Jack Guiragossian** shared that during the last Parish Assembly, Sean McClure made a motion to simplify the MOU, and he worked with Jack to make that happen this year. **Hratch Semerjian** pointed out that the line items don't add up properly with the new way of presenting the MOU. He suggested that all additional stipend compensation should be placed in the "Additional Parish Stipend" line item so that the numbers will add up to the correct total in the future. Jack said that he would be able to do that for future documents.

Alex Madajian asked about the information shared under the Vacation section. It states that the ACYOA will pay for lodging and expenses for the clergy to attend the ACYOA Assembly. He was not aware of this policy and wanted it to be removed from this report since he would rather use ACYOA funds to allow their own members to attend the conference. Jack explained that this has been included for many years, and the ACYOA has never been called upon to pay for these expenses. However, this is the reason that each of the parish organizations are asked to contribute to the operating budget, and this is where reimbursement for clergy travel comes from. Alex brought up a motion to strike the last sentence from the last paragraph in subsection B of the MOU. Discussion followed, debating the need to include this sentence. The following motion was put forth: The Parish shall provide allowances for lodging and expenses for attendance at Parish Council-approved events. Hratch Semerjian moved to accept the motion, and Aline Guiragossian seconded it. There was one opposition vote, and the motion passed. It was then noted that Subsection A, Item 5 should read that the Car Allowance for 2024 (instead of 2025) is based on 20,000 miles annually.

Hratch Semerjian moved to accept the MOU. The motion was seconded by Aline Guiragossian and passed unanimously.

#### 2024 Budget

The floor was opened for questions/comments on the 2024 Budget. **Jack Guiragossian** explained that the budget is higher than in the past (above the usual \$300,000 range) due mainly to line item 3 in the Expense Account Category. This is higher than normal because we are budgeting for the repainting of the sanctuary over the upcoming year if everything goes well. **Dean Shahinian** asked for some clarification about what would be repainted in the sanctuary. Jack clarified that it would just be a refurbishment. **Hratch Semerjian** asked if we would be getting the traditional Armenian writing added over the altar. Der Hayr stated that we would like to get cut-out letters for that rather than have it painted. He said that this would be something that they would discuss in a future Parish Council meeting. Jack said that since we will have to rent scaffolding to complete the painting of the sanctuary, it would be a good time to add the writing.

Catherine Kapikian asked for further clarification about how the interest from the endowment fund would be used. Jack reiterated the plan that the interest (once the fund is built up to the \$6M mark) would then take the pressure off the food festivals to pay the operating costs of the church. This way, food festivals can be about sharing our traditions instead of being a money-making endeavor. At this point, the endowment fund is at \$190,000, so we need to continue to build that up. Jack also shared that collectively, we received 13% interest on our investments this year. Lucy Murad asked for an explanation about Long Term Assets, and Jack provided this explanation. There was a short discussion about the 63-acre plot of land in New Jersey that was gifted to the church, and Jack shared that we are renting it out to hunters as this was seen as the best use of that forested land. A stipulation of the gift of this land is that we must hold onto it for two years. The rental to the hunters allows the Parish Council to look at all their options over that two-year period and decide what is best.

**Hratch Semerjian** made a motion to accept the 2024 Budget. It was seconded by **Harry Derderian** and passed unanimously.

#### Other Treasury Reports (Restricted Funds and ACEF):

**Zaven Kalayjian** asked for clarification on the Youth Education Fund. Jack explained that \$13,200 gets funneled through us by the Raymond Davis Templar Foundation to help support nine low-income student's Christian education in Jerusalem. He also explained where the other money went for that line item. The question was also asked about who the contact was for the Saghmosavank's sister parish, and Der Hayr shared that the distribution is usually made through the Aragatsodn Diocese.

**Sarine Zenian** moved to approve the Other Treasury Reports. **Rick Nishanian** seconded, and the reports were unanimously approved. Avedis thanked Jack for all of his work on these reports.

#### **Organizational Reports:**

Nadya Chubukian raised the question of why the Gift Shop Income Report was put together in a way where various organizational events were listed under income and also under expenses. Shoghig Sahakian explained that this is the way the accounting has been done since these organizations utilize the Gift Store Square account to collect money. It is then disbursed to the various organizations afterward. Nadya then asked if there could be a better accounting of the things that were sold in the gift shop. For instance, she would like to have it broken down into different categories such as Sunday Sales, Sales During the Spring Food Festival, Sales During a Women's Guild Event, etc. Sarine Zenian then asked for a breakdown of what was sold in the bookstore and how much the parish made from the sale of each category type (books, gifts, alcohol). Jack Guiragossian weighed in that this could not be accomplished with the current volunteer man-hours. He stated that we could set things up to account for the sale of different items but that it would take a while to set it up at the beginning and that many people stop by the gift shop to donate things to be sold and keeping up with that inventory would take time as well. Sean McClure shared that while it isn't legally required to have the inventory and sales tracking, it is something that we should do. He also stated that it is very important to separate the income/budget statements from any inventory statements. Onnik Sivaslian stated that it is important to have an accurate inventory in case we need to ask for insurance money for the items. Shoghig stated that they have receipts from the purchase of the items to be sold, and that should be enough for the insurance company. Additionally, she said that the income and expense totals should be enough information to report on the sales in the gift store. A lively discussion then ensued about the need to keep better records of what is sold in the bookstore as well as whether we, as a parish, should be selling hard alcohol in our gift shop. It was suggested that this is a question that should be studied by a task force and should be voted on by the members at a future Parish Assembly. Artur Sivaslian shared that checks and balances should be applied to every church organization. This was one of the things that the Auditing Committee commented on this year when reviewing the financial reports. There is a need to apply more standard financial practices to the church organizations – not just in the gift store – that would apply to everybody. Sean shared that he is working on creating financial best-practices to apply to non-profit organizations that everyone in our church organizations will be trained to use. Avedis emphasized that all people involved in these organizations are volunteers, and we appreciate their efforts. However, we should apply those best-practices nevertheless. Sarine asked whether the Diocese has particular rules as to whether hard liquor can be sold in church gift shops and also suggested that the church as a whole should be able to discuss and vote on whether hard liquor (as opposed to wine and beer) should be sold in our gift shop. Der Hayr said that he is not aware of any guidelines on what can or can't be sold in a church gift store. Mark Krikorian supported the fact that it is a major policy decision as to whether to sell spirits, and it is an issue that should be voted on - either through a future Parish Assembly or through the Parish Council. Zaven **Kalayjian** supported Mark's assertation but strongly urged that the Parish Assembly should be the forum to decide on an issue such as this. Avedis suggested that the newly elected Parish Council should take up the question first and decide whether to bring it to a vote in front of next year's Parish Assembly. Hratch Semerjian made a motion that the new Parish Council should look into 1) the legality of allowing the gift shop to sell liquor and 2) the religious/moral appropriateness of selling liquor in a church gift shop and make a recommendation to the next Parish Assembly. Avedis tabled this discussion until we reach New Business. Becky Bagdasarian shared that Nadya Sivaslian's name was left off of the 2023 School Report. She wanted it acknowledged that Nadya taught 6<sup>th</sup> grade religion during the 2022-2023 school year.

**Avedis** then asked for a motion to accept the Organizational Reports, which was made by **Hratch Semerjian** and seconded by **Sarine Zenian**. The motion passed unanimously.

#### **Diocesan Delegates' Report:**

Zaven Kalayjian came forward to report back about two issues that were brought forth to the Diocese from our last Parish Assembly. He said that there were some presentations about the restructuring of the Christian Education department. Yeretzgin Jennifer had expressed concerns last year about succession planning and the output of Christian religious education materials. They said that they are getting things in order in that department. There is now an online Youth and Family Ministry page with materials for various ages. Dean Shahinian asked if there would be a full-time person in charge of Christian Religious Education. Zaven said that he would ask. He also said that he would be meeting with both the Parish Council and arrange to have a meeting for the whole parish a month before the Diocesan Assembly. Zaven also spoke about the proposal our Parish Assembly put forth last year regarding insuring the Gorky Art Collection. Since 1991, the insurance question has been up in the air. While there was a lot of discussion

around this issue, the Diocesan Assembly kicked the question back to the Diocesan Council to look into the insurability and the amount to insure the art. Our delegates will bring up this question again at the next meeting to ask for follow-up on this issue.

Alex Madajian asked for further information on the Social and Racial Justice/Good Samaritan Ministry. Zaven stated that very little information was shared about this program. He will follow up at the next meeting by asking for additional information. Additional information was also sought about the Growing in Faith Initiative. Der Hayr believes that this is a new initiative, so there is not a lot of information to share about it at this point. Hratch Semerjian asked why Zaven attended the Diocesan Assembly when he was not elected to the position. It was shared that Eric Ashbahian resigned due to family obligations, and Zaven was the elected alternate who replaced him. Sean McClure shared that he spoke last year about the new Stewardship program, and he asked if there was any update to that plan. Zaven shared that a packet was supposed to be shared with parishes, but that has not yet been produced. Der Hayr shared that other parishes that used a stewardship plan had issues with how to implement the new plan and how to count the voting membership of the parish fairly. The Stewardship Committee on the Diocesan level is trying to work through and resolve all of the various issues so that they can give us concrete direction. Avedis noted that Der Hayr was voted to the Diocesan Council this year. Sarine Zenian shared a little more information about the Social and Racial Justice/Good Samaritan Ministry, which included the names of the two individuals who are in charge of this program, but it is just in its beginning stages.

**Anna Seferian** then moved to accept the Diocesan Delegates' report. **Hratch Semerjian** seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

#### **Audit Committee:**

**Artur Sivaslian** stated that the treasurer reports from the various organizations all were acceptable, with some suggestions for improvements. As discussed earlier, Sean will be developing more structured checks and balances for all organizations in the parish.

**Artur Sivaslian** moved to accept the Audit Committee report. **Mark Krikorian** seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

#### **Investment Committee:**

**Mike Sahakian** shared the progress of the investment funds. The portfolio earned about a 13% return since it was a strong year for stocks. He encouraged future donations to the endowment fund.

Aline Guiragossian moved to accept the report and received a second from Hratch Semerjian. The motion passed unanimously.

#### **Announcement of Election Results:**

The results of the election were announced by **Mark Krikorian** of the Nominating Committee. 57 ballots were counted during the election.

The candidates elected to the Parish Council are Sean McClure, Rick Nishanian, Artur Sivaslian, Onnik Sivaslian, and Harout Tchekrekdjian. The alternate is Shoghig Sahakian.

The candidates elected to the Nominating Committee are **Zaven Kalayjian**, **Mark Krikorian**, and **Lucy Murad**. The alternate is **Ani Derderian**.

The candidate elected to the Auditing Committee is **Anna Seferian**. The alternate is **Vladimir Shekoyan**. However, Vladimir will be on the committee since the current member, **Artur Sivaslian**, will have to resign in order to take his place on the Parish Council

The candidate elected to the Investment Committee is **David Sayian**. The alternate is **John Assadourian**.

The candidate elected to the WED Scholarship Committee is **Bagrat Bayburtian**. The alternate is **Dale Turza**.

#### **Old/New Business:**

#### **First New Business:**

**Hratch Semerjian** made a motion earlier that the new Parish Council should look into 1) the legality of allowing the gift shop to sell alcohol/hard liquor and 2) the religious/moral appropriateness of selling alcohol/hard liquor in a church gift shop within 60 days of them assuming their new offices and make a recommendation to the next Parish Assembly. A quorum call was made and it was determined that there were not enough members present to be able to vote on and pass motions. Therefore, anything from this point on in the proceedings would just be instructional recommendations

to the Parish Council rather than motions that were voted on. **Mark Krikorian** seconded the motion (recommendation). The recommendation passed with five objections.

#### **First Old Business:**

Zaven Kalayjian asked the Parish Council to update the Assembly on the status of the TV monitor in the small hallway. He explained that last year, a proposal was put forward that did not pass, but the Parish Council would commit to forming a committee to work on getting the TV monitor up and running. Shoghig Sahakian shared that a new monitor was purchased since the previous one was older and did not have the proper capabilities that we needed (it was determined that a SMART TV was needed). That new monitor was installed, but it now needs to be set up. She mentioned that Anna Seferian volunteered to be on the committee, so the next step would be for her to get committee members together and set up the new monitor. She also shared that anything that will be shown on the monitor needs to be cleared by Der Hayr or the presiding priest. The idea would be to have the bulletin and any announcements shown on the monitor. Zaven shared that despite him bringing forth that proposal last year, he was not asked to be on the committee nor consulted about any part of the process. Based on this, he was concerned about how the church was operating and questioned whether or not we were actively encouraging others to share their time and talents for the glory and edification of the Church. At this point, individuals were identified as possible additions to this committee: Anna Seferian, Becky Bagdasarian, Greg Kumkumian, Greg Manoukian, with the addition of Zaven Kalayjian. Der Hayr brought up that the TV monitor should be used to display photos and videos of events in the church. It could also be used to broadcast the Badarak to the people who stay in the small hall during services.

#### **Second New Business:**

**Nadya Chubukian** asked about the status of church security. **Avedis** stated that there was some recent training with regard to health and safety. He reminded the Assembly about the contribution from parishioners last year of an AED device and several first aid kits. **Anna Seferian** said that they are looking into emergency training for the parish – not only on things like exit locations, but also what to do in the event of exigencies like an active shooter. She shared that there should be some training events this year, and she will be able to report on those initiatives next year.

Dean Shahinian then moved to adjourn the meeting. Zaven Kalayjian seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

The meeting adjourned at 3:02 PM, and Der Hayr thanked Avedis Seferian for his leadership as Chairman of the Assembly. He also thanked Shoghig Sahakian for her leadership as the Parish Council Chairlady over the past several years. He also thanked John Assadourian, who is stepping down this year from the Parish Council. He then congratulated everyone who was elected this session. He ended the proceedings with a prayer.

The following report is a detailed account of the milestones, initiatives, and events that have shaped our parish life in 2024.

#### 1. Sacraments & Services – 2024

As the pastor of St. Mary Armenian Church, I remained committed to performing sacraments and services that support the spiritual and pastoral needs of our community. Throughout 2024, I celebrated 54 Badaraks, fostering communal worship. Additionally, I participated in and conducted 42 ministry meetings, ensuring the effective leadership and organization of our parish life. The sacramental life of our church was active, with 19 baptisms and confirmations, 3 engagements, and 7 weddings. In times of sorrow, I provided pastoral care through 13 funerals and 131 requiem (Hokehankist) services, offering prayers for the departed and comfort to their loved ones. Beyond the church walls, my pastoral outreach included 18 home blessings and 38 visitations, providing spiritual support and guidance to our parishioners in their homes. Additionally, I conducted 34 pre-marital and baptismal counseling sessions, preparing individuals and families for these sacred sacraments.

#### 2. Celebrations, Liturgical Life and Worship

- New Year's Eve Celebration: Participated in the joyous welcome of 2024 with the Armenian community at the Bethesda North Marriott Hotel.
- Feast of Nativity and Theophany (January 5-6): Celebrated these significant feasts with Scriptural readings by Shnorhali School students, emphasizing the revelation and baptism of Christ.
- Holy Week and Easter Sunday (March 24-31): Led services for Palm Sunday, the Feast of the Resurrection, and the installation of ACYOA members. Delivered sermons and blessings for parishioners and children.
- Lenten Services and Reflections (February-March): Conducted six themed Lenten Services focused on "Be My Witnesses," incorporating prayers, meditations, and discussions.
- Feast of Assumption of the Holy Mother of God (August 18): Led the Divine Liturgy and Blessing of the Grapes, marking the name day of St. Mary Church.
- Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross (September 15): Celebrated this major feast, including the Antastan Service, blessing the four corners of the world.
- Blessing of Muron and Rededication of Holy Etchmiadzin (September October) Journeyed to Armenia to participate in the historic events of Muron Blessings and Rededication of Holy Etchmiadzin
- Feast of the Discovery of the Holy Cross (October 27): Presided over services and led the Badarak, emphasizing the spiritual legacy of Queen Helena.

- Traveled to NY to participate in the ordination Service of Dr. Jesse Arlen.
- Traveled to High Point for the dedication of the new Holy Archangel Church.

#### 3. Youth Engagement and Shnorhali School Programs

- **Bible Readings by Shnorhali Students:** Guided students in exploring the spiritual meaning of Nativity and Theophany and Easter.

#### **2024 Diocesan Delegates Report**

The 122nd Diocesan Assembly of the Armenian Church of America (Eastern) was on May 2 - 4, 2024, in Springfield, Massachusetts hosted by St. Mark Armenian Church. The theme of the assembly was "Be My Witnesses" (Acts 1:8). It was attended by delegates Onnik Sivaslian and Zaven Kalayjian. Sadly, Sarine Zenian could not attend due to being ill with Covid.

#### The Primate mentioned three important concerns for the Diocese:

- (a) The declining attendance and declining numbers overall for the Diocese and parishes. This is a crucial issue for our church but not a unique problem for the Armenian church alone. It hurts to see our sanctuaries empty.
- (b) The lack of volunteers and the difficulty of finding people to take up leadership positions in the church; and
- (c) Youth participation in the church. The need to build a strategy of making the church a relevant part of life for the younger generation and for their parents and families.

#### UPDATE FROM THE LEGATE AND ECUMENICAL DIRECTOR

Archbishop Aykazian (Diocesan Legate) thanked the Primate and the Diocesan Council for inviting young observers to the Assembly. He hopes that next year they will be voting members at the Assembly.

Vicken Srpazan is the Vice Moderator of the World Council of Churches. In that capacity he travels around the world and sees the suffering of human beings throughout the world. Vicken Srpazan along with other religious leaders work to assist refugees and improve the conditions in which they are suffering. Armenians may know of the problems with Artsakh but people around the world need to be informed and made aware of the daily tragedy and strife that our people are attempting to survive. Vicken Srpazan commented that there are Christian groups around the world that are supporting Armenia in words and deeds. Vicken Srpazan told the Assembly that Christians are the most persecuted people today.

#### **Diocesan Council Actions and Highlights**

The Diocesan Council (DC) held 15 meetings in 2023 (5 in person, 10 by Zoom) as well as several Executive (Divan) meetings through the year.

The DC embarked on 2 major programs during 2023 including the 125th Anniversary celebration of the establishment of the Diocese in 1898 and the Cathedral renovation project.

The Primate appointed clergy for the Liturgical Committee who will review our sacraments and provide various translations that will be helpful to bring and keep our faithful in church. The Sacred Music Council will also be part of this committee.

DC started the task of inclusion in the Gorky Foundation's Catalogue Raisonné of the artist's work for the Diocese's 55 pieces of Gorky art collection as well as an update of the fair market value by Aileen Agopian.

Diocesan Fine arts appraisal was completed. The last appraisal was ~40 years ago.

Diocesan Camps sessions were held in person during summer of 2023.

The DC formed various working committees including GIFT (Growing in Faith Together) Implementation Committee, GIFT Evaluation Committee, Development/Fundraising Committee, Treasurer's Committee, Parish Council Chair Network Committee, Public Relations and Social Media Committee, Young Adults Committee.

The DC approved updated guidelines for minimum honorarium for visiting Primates, bishops, clergy, homilists and deacons.

As recognition for the valuable contribution of the clergy of the Diocese, the Clergy Retirement Program continued to be rolled out with 2023 as the first-year matching contributions were made. All parishes were participating except for 3.

The Primate's GIFT program (Growing in Faith Together) continued to be utilized to implement programs within the Diocese and parishes that include Worship, Education, Witness, Service and Common Life.

Treasurer proposed an algorithm to correct differences in clergy benefits based on regional CPI (Consumer Prince Index). Will be presented to the Clergy Compensation Committee.

DC unanimously approved the Primate's request to amend bylaws to add a position on the parish council called "Ministries Liaison" to emphasize the importance of ministries work in the function of a PC. The bylaw revision has been submitted for consideration by the Diocesan Assembly. As a preliminary step, early in 2023, our Primate sent a letter to clergy and parish councils asking them to select such a person for this year.

Kavookjian Hall renovations including new lighting and sound system were accomplished by December 2023, expected to significantly increase hall rental income.

Total Diocese 2024 Budget is \$4,808,700 increased \$60,750 than last.

#### **CONSTRUCTION UPDATE**

Richard Papalian reported that Phase I of the renovations should be substantially completed by the end of July. Phase I is the roof and dome work which for a variety of reasons was amended to include the façade restoration. They are approximately \$500,000.00 under budget. Phase I and Phase II were approved. The façade restoration, architectural lighting as well as other smaller items, with a cost of \$2.5 million, was added as Phase I(b) and will be completed by the end of November 2024.

- Phase I: Roof and dome repairs \$5,000,000
- Phase II: Mechanical improvements and completion of exterior façade restoration \$8,000,000
- Phase 3: Interior code, program and damage improvements \$11,000,000
- Phase 4: Plaza replacement and sidewalk repairs \$4,000,000

To complete the project is \$28 million dollars. The Fundraising campaign was launched last year with an anticipated renovation completion date in 2028.

#### 2023 Dues to Stewardship Pilot Program Report

2023 marked the end of the 4th year of the Dues to Stewardship Pilot Program. Dues to Stewardship program is not a replacement of membership but an addition.

For those parishes who are participating, the results continue to be good overall. Two new parishes, St. John The Baptist in Greenfield, WI and Holy Martyrs in Bayside, NY, joined the Pilot Program in 2023. One parish, St. Sarkis in Charlotte, NC, left the program while they deal with some internal issues.

Total dues paid members from all parishes (excluding Mission Parishes) has dropped lowest number (6,864 Adults and 216 Juniors) from previous years.

# Update on matters related to the collection of the works of Arshile Gorky owned by the Diocese on deposit at the Calouste Gulbenkian Foundation in Lisbon, Portugal

Insurance: DC have obtained insurance coverage for the collection that offers coverage at all times: when the works are in storage, on exhibit or in transit. This coverage went into effect in March 2024 and will be reviewed and renewed annually. The amount of coverage is \$17.15 Million.

Market Value Appraisal: An up-to-date appraisal of the collection is underway, being conducted pro bono by an art market expert who is a member of the Diocesan community.

#### **PROPOSALS**

 Proposal - the change in terminology from Chairman to Chairperson. Discussion erupted in the assembly about the linguistic choice with comments about gender neutrality.
 A motion to table the proposal until next year Proposal - to Allow Hybrid Participation in Diocesan Assemblies by St Mesrob – Racine WI.
 The vote on the proposal was not carried.

#### Some other matters relevant to St. Mary

- 1. Our Parish asked about Sunday School resources the Christian Education Ministry is releasing Sunday School materials. The Ministry also recommended Vem as a good resource for Christian Education.
  - a) The Delegation will give feedback from St. Mary's experience with these resources having used them for the Sunday School Curriculum.
- 2. Social Justice Committee: No update again this year due to business of Emily Terjimanian. No plans of what it will do in the future.
- 3. Regarding the Theme of "Witnessing for the Armenian Church": After the break-out discussions I considered two challenges facing our Church. I think any outreach or witnessing has to address these two challenges:
  - a) The First: Do we have a convincing case for Christianity among the other worldviews and philosophies in the world, such as scientism, materialism, modernism, critical theory, etc. Our Church must have a coherent *apologia* for all these ideologies.
  - b) The Second: Even if we convince someone to be a Christian, do we have a good case for them to be an *Armenian Christian?* Other Churches might be closer, have more resources, worship in English. The Armenian Church must have a good reason why Armenians should come to the Armenian Church.

#### **Board Of Stewards Year Report - 2024**

#### 2024 - St. Mary Food Festivals Report

The Parish Council sponsored two food festivals in 2024, following the usual pattern established since 2011:

- 1) The Spring Food Festival was held from May 17<sup>th</sup> through May 19<sup>th</sup>, consisting of three lunches (Friday, Saturday and Sunday), and two dinners (Friday and Saturday);
- 2) The Fall Food Festival was held from October 4<sup>th</sup> through October 6<sup>th</sup>, consisting of three lunches (Friday, Saturday and Sunday), and two dinners (Friday and Saturday) although preparations and sales commenced somewhat earlier in both cases, due to the "pre-Bazaar on-line orders" that have become the norm since the start of the pandemic.

The net income for the Spring and Fall Festivals, described in more detail elsewhere in this report, amounted to \$52,197 and \$47,632 respectively, for a total of \$99,830 for the year, just short of 100K, an all-time record.

Let us keep in mind that none of this would have been possible without the financial and physical support from our immediate and at-large community, the business sponsorships, the income from the vendors, the tremendous contributions from the Women's Guild, and the relentless labor of love from all our volunteers. Thank you again for your support, as the raised funds go long ways in meeting the operational needs of our church.

#### Shnorhali School Annual Report 2024-2025 Academic Year

#### WHO WE ARE

Shnorhali School, part of St. Mary Church, is dedicated to nurturing a love for God, pride in the Armenian language, and a deep connection to our national identity and culture. Our mission is to teach Armenian language

and culture, helping students and families live authentic Armenian Christian lives and actively contribute to the community. The school offers two core curriculums: one focused on Christian Education and the other on Armenian Language and Culture, providing K-12 students with an excellent opportunity to explore their Armenian Christian heritage.

#### **2024-2025 OVERVIEW:**

The 2024-2025 academic year at Shnorhali School began on August 27th, marking the start of another year of enriching education for the children of our Armenian community. The Principal and staff welcomed students with the Day of Knowledge and Education celebrations. As per tradition, the first day of school involved evaluating students' knowledge in Armenian language, history, and culture.

#### **ACADEMICS:**

Shnorhali School's academic curriculum is specifically designed to meet the needs of our community, offering both Eastern and Western Armenian, Armenian History, and Religion for grades K-8. For grades 9-12, students take religion classes and can earn community service hours. The school uses a structured Armenian curriculum, ensuring each grade level masters specific materials before progressing. All students take a placement test to determine the best level for their education, with discussions held if the test results do not align with their public school grade.

Teachers develop weekly lesson plans and cultural segments to engage students with Armenian artists, composers, poets, heroes, and scientists. The academic year is divided into four quarters, with tests at the end of each quarter, followed by report cards and parent-teacher meetings. The school also offers a Junior Kindergarten class for 4-year-olds and a Conversational Armenian class for students who want to improve their spoken Armenian skills. In addition to Armenian Language and Culture, the school offers 30-minute rotating lessons on **History** and **Music**. Under the guidance of Mr. Haykaram Nahapetyan, students are learning about important events from Armenia's past, while Ms. Armine Khachatryan introduces them to Armenia's folk music, composers, and songwriters.

Shnorhali School also offers a **Patarag Education** program, designed to teach the structure and content of our Holy Liturgy. This program includes instruction from experts on the liturgy and the interpretations of key days and celebrations in the Armenian faith. Additionally, the school provides a **Conversational Armenian** class, offering students the opportunity to build fluency in the language while practicing verbal communication with a native Armenian speaker.

#### Shnorhali School Alumni Engagement

Shnorhali School is proud of its active alumni and young volunteers who enhance the school's educational environment. Currently, 25 alumni volunteers contribute by assisting teachers, organizing events, and helping with activities. Shnorhali School is also a Certified Organization, allowing students and alumni to earn the prestigious Presidential Volunteer Service Award, recognizing their dedication to the school and community. This year, alumni introduced two exciting after-school clubs:

- Armenian Culture and Fine Art Club: Led by Kristina Khrimian, Yeva Grigoryan, and Taguhi Gomtsyan,
  this club offers students opportunities to explore Armenian culture through interactive activities, dances, songs,
  and presentations.
- Chess Club: Led by Aren and Arman Grigoryan, the Chess Club helps students develop critical thinking and problem-solving skills while exploring strategies and tactics.
  - These clubs, alongside the dedicated volunteers, create a dynamic and engaging environment for students to learn and grow.

#### **Little Stars Afterschool Program For Kindergarteners**

The Little Stars After-School Program, designed for kindergarten students, reinforces lessons learned throughout the day. Led by Knar Brutyan, the program offers educational games and activities that foster retention and enjoyment. This initiative supports the holistic development of our youngest learners.

#### **TIME/PLACE**:

The bell schedules this year includes a special family tradition, where children can participate in the morning Padarag Education service in the sanctuary. The schedule is as follows:

- 9:30-9:55 Special Morning Padarag Education
- 10:00-11:00 Armenian Language Class
- 11:00-12:00 Religion
- 12:00-12:30 Lunch
- 12:30-2:00 Armenian History/Culture and Language
  - 2:00-3:00 After-School Clubs: Armenian Miniature Art, Chess

Senior Kindergarten and Junior Kindergarten classes conclude at noon.

The primary mission of Shnorhali School is to educate students in Armenian language, history, and culture, ensuring that they grow into informed, active members of our community who preserve and celebrate our heritage.

Shnorhali School's religious education program celebrates another successful year, showcasing its positive impact on the Parish community and the children it serves. #### **Shnorhali School's Special Events**

#### **Events From The First Half Of The 2024-2025 Academic Year**

**Day of Knowledge and Education -** On August 27th, St. Mary's Shnorhali Armenian School began the academic year with the Day of Knowledge and Education. Students took assessments in Armenian language, history, and culture, followed by a meet-and-greet for parents, students, and teachers. The day concluded with a Holy Patarag led by Father Hovsep, emphasizing the importance of religion, culture, and heritage in education.

**Back-to-School Fun Event -** On September 22nd, Shnorhali School hosted its Back-to-School Social, bringing together students, parents, and parishioners. The event featured arts, crafts, face painting, a trivia game on Armenian heritage, and a Kochari dance session led by the Armenian Art and Culture Club. Volunteers ensured a lively and memorable afternoon celebrating Armenian culture and community spirit.

**Spiritual Fall Party** - The 1st-3rd grade religion classes held a Spiritual Fall Party centered on 2 Timothy 1:7. Through crafts and discussions, students explored themes of love, power, and self-discipline, learning how faith can help them overcome challenges with kindness and courage.

**Talent Show -** On November 10th, Shnorhali School's annual Talent Show celebrated Saint Nerses Shnorhali through student performances in poetry, music, and dance. A presentation on Saint Nerses' life and cultural contributions opened the event. Highlights included a student art showcase, sports videos, and a traditional Armenian feast, all reflecting the community's deep connection to heritage.

**Acolyte Training Program -** Shnorhali School introduced an Acolyte Training Program led by Der Hovsep and deacons. Boys learn sacred traditions of the Armenian Church, including the role of an Acolyte, Church etiquette, and prayers, preparing them for active participation in Holy Padarak.

**Kindergarten Educational Program -** The school launched a monthly educational program for kindergarteners featuring hands-on activities like clay modeling, birdhouse building, music, and storytelling. These sessions enhance creativity, teamwork, and fine motor skills while deepening Armenian cultural connections.

**Midday Readings** - Students took on the responsibility of reading from the Holy Scriptures during Patarag. Each Sunday, a student shared God's message with parishioners, creating a meaningful experience for both students and their proud families.

**Ordination of Deacons and Subdeacons -** Students attended a special Divine Liturgy presided over by His Grace Bishop Mesrop Parsamyan, witnessing the ordination of deacons and subdeacons. Lina Avetisyan and Nare Melik-Stepanyan were honored for their contributions to the Choir and Handbell Ensemble, inspiring others with their dedication.

**St. Mary's 92nd and Der Hovsep's 20th Anniversary** - Shnorhali School joined parish celebrations for the 92nd anniversary of St. Mary Armenian Church and the 20th anniversary of Der Hovsep Karapetyan's ordination. Students presented Der Hovsep with a book of letters and drawings, expressing gratitude for his spiritual leadership.

Christmas Tree Decoration - On December 1st, Shnorhali students, parents, and volunteers gathered to decorate the Church's Christmas tree, marking the start of the Holy Christmas season. Adorned with crosses, angels, and a nativity scene, the tree symbolized faith, hope, and joy. Christmas Celebrations - On December 22nd, students celebrated Christmas with a joyful event that combined faith, culture, and holiday cheer. #### **Events from the Second Half of the 2023-2024 Academic Year**

Shnorhali School, in collaboration with its dedicated teachers, volunteers, and parents, hosted the following educational and cultural events, enriching our students' connection to their faith, heritage, and community:

Eve of Theophany and Nativity - On January 5, students gathered at St. Mary Armenian Church for the Nativity

and Theophany celebration. Guided by Fr. Hovsep Karapetyan, students explored the dual significance of Christ's birth and baptism. They participated in Scripture readings and prayer, fostering a sense of unity and spiritual reflection.

Students, teachers, and parents collected toys for children undergoing cleft surgeries in developing countries. The initiative embodied the spirit of Lent through compassion and giving.

**Easter Eve Celebration -** On March 30, students learned about Easter symbols and traditions through teachings by Fr. Hovsep and Religious Education Coordinator Nicolette Blackwell. Activities included egg decorating and participation in the Holy Liturgy, instilling a deeper connection to the Resurrection's significance.

#### 2024 - WED Fund Scholarship Committee Report

The Willian Ervant Docter (WED) Education Fund was established at St. Mary Armenian Church in 1998 thanks to the generosity of the late parishioner William Docter. Over the years, the Fund has provided financial support to qualified Armenian Americans pursuing studies or training in the US or Canada. Since its inception, the fund has disbursed approximately \$1,128,500 to 529 worthy candidates out of a total of 964 applicants. Individual grants range from \$500 to \$5,000.

Each year, the total amount of scholarship moneys available is based on a percentage (usually 4.5%) of the total value of the WED assets, which are held under the management of the Armenian Church Endowment Fund (ACEF). Of the total dividend amount, 20% is kept by St. Mary for administration of the application process. In 2023, the amount disbursed for scholarships was \$51,250.

For this scholarship cycle, the WED Education Scholarship Committee met on July 14, 2024 to review applications and select awardees. Twenty (20) applications were considered, and eighteen (13) scholarships were given. Scholarships awardees were selected based on high academic promise, financial need, and involvement in the Armenian community.

#### • Of the awards given

- Three (3) were for \$2,000
- Five (5) was for \$4,000
- Five (5) were for \$5,000

#### • Of the applicants:

- Ten (10) were graduate students
- Ten (10) were undergraduates

#### • Of the awardees

- Five (5) were graduate students and eight
  (8) were undergraduates
- Fields of study included: Medicine, Marriage Counseling, Cybersecurity, Pre-Med, Osteopathology, Chemical Engineering, Screenwriting/Directing, and Economics.

This year, the Scholarship Committee consisted of Tamar Sivaslian, Bagrat Bayburtyan, Eric Ashbahian, Mark Krikorian, and Zaven Kalayjian. The scholarship applications review was conducted via an on-line video conference.

The committee did not requested a Repose of the Soul (Hokehankist) service for Mr. William E. Docter this year.

The Committee was ably assisted by the WED Office Manager and St. Mary Secretaries, Ani Armani and Elvina Azaryan, and the St. Mary Treasurer, Mr. Jack Guiragossian.

**November 23 & 24:** The Executive Committee met to package up desserts donated by members for the Thanksgiving Bake Sale. The next day was the bake sale itself, after church.

**December 8:** The Women's Guild provided the appetizers for the lunch celebrating the Ordination of a Deacon and several Sub-Deacons.

All of our members are grateful to Yeretsgin Jennifer for her leadership, both organizationally and spiritually. Despite having a full-time job and many family responsibilities, she always rose to the occasion and had a kind word for all.

# **Auditing Committee Report** For Fiscal Year 2024

#### INTRODUCTION

On behalf of the Auditing Committee, I am pleased to report our members addressed each organization's financial report and provided fair and reasonable audits.

Our three person committee was comprised of Anna Seferian (first year), Vladimir Shekoyan (alternate filling Artur Sivaslian's remaining 2 years), and myself, Gregory Manougian (final, third year).

#### **PROCESS**

Starting in early calendar year 2025, the committee members exchanged ideas on the process, along with guidance from church treasurer, Jack Guiragossian, and Rebecca Bagdasarian. As the "retiring" member, I shared my approach to an audit and recommended format for assessing each organization. We also understood there was a range of complexity -- from the Church Operating Fund to WE Doctor Scholarship to Gift Shop and ACYOA Juniors.

The following church organizations' financial reports (14) were identified to be audited and were divided among the three auditors:

Gregory Manougian - Operating Fund, Restricted Fund, ACEF, WED, and Food Festivals Anna Seferian – Avak Society, Investment (with Lazarian Fund), ACYOA Srs, Choir, Narek Bells Vladimir Shekoyan – Gift Shop, ACYOA Jrs, Women's Guild, Shnorhali School

Each organization to receive a financial audit was expected to provide a summary income and expense report (to also be published in the parish council's annual report), banking transactions and statements, and other documentation that may support the report, i.e. receipts, proposals, correspondence).

Each of the above organizations were audited by the audit committee member assigned, shared with the other committee members, and reported back to the Church treasurer, the respective organization, and copied to the church secretary.

#### **OBSERVATION AND RECOMMENDATIONS**

Commendable financial reports were prepared by the parish council and food festival treasurers comprising complex reports. They were well-organized, easily cross-checked, and reflected sustained attention to detail for

the year.

Smaller, less complicated groups such as Narek Choir and Avak Society were held to minimum standards and all presented auditable records.

A Treasurer's Peer training session should be implemented to all the groups and their Treasurers. Ideally in person, it may be a virtual event to ensure full participation.

Such a training opportunity should occur early in each fiscal year as a "best practice", noting it is just as important for the youngest member organization as it is for the oldest.

If unable to present such a course at one time, it can be done for each organization as part of their regular member meetings, provided with examples of recordkeeping, expectations how members should support and sustain the process, and especially for the respective treasurer.

Such sharing would lead to increased confidence across the parish to indicate there is a necessary level of knowledge and skill being applied to the financial management and, ultimately, the parish's overall financial health.

We strongly advise including the church treasurer, other experienced treasurers and Auditing Committee members, as well. The parish assembly meeting to follow would then be reminded that such training took place.

#### CONCLUSION

All of the audited records from the St. Mary Armenian Apostolic Church organizations were shown to be complete, accurate and free of material misstatements.
