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## Introduction to Living Donor Kidney Transplant

- Living donor kidney transplant is the gold standard treatment for endstage kidney disease with <u>superior outcomes</u> when compared with both deceased donor kidney transplant and dialysis.
- Yet, racioethnic disparities exist...

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	Persistent Disparities
	Black patients receive living donor kidney transplant less frequently than White patients, despite higher prevalence of renal failure in Black individuals compared with other racial or ethnic groups.
	<ul> <li>Black patients are less likely to be referred (preemptively and following initiation of dialysis) for kidney transplant evaluation than White patients.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Once evaluated, Black patients are less likely than White patients to be added to the kidney transplant waiting list.<sup>24</sup></li> </ul>
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## **Contributing Factors**

- Patient-level: Misunderstanding, negative attitudes, low awareness, fewer suitable living donors, medical and financial barriers.
- Community-level: Healthcare access, educations, housing, economic stability.
- Structural/systemic-level: Transplant center-specific practices and policies are underexplored.







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- Outreach to minoritized communities for education.
- Participation in assistance and paired-exchange programs (NKR, OPTN/UNOS).
- Expand donor support (rebates for income loss and travel).
- Broaden desensitization and exchange program use.
- Mitigate bias, eliminate unnecessary race-based criteria (eGFR, APOL1).
- Use social risk data to support, not restrict, patient access.

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## **Moving Toward Equity in Living Donation**

- Disparities in living donor kidney transplant are enduring and multifaceted.
- Health equity must be incorporated into reporting and payment structures.
- Transplant providers and centers must proactively address barriers.

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### Eligibility Criteria

- Medical, surgical and psychological evaluation for donors
- Key eligibility factors (age, health status, psychological readiness)
- National guidelines and institutional policies

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### **Evaluation Process**

- Initial Screening and Tests: Blood Typing, Tissue Matching, Organ Function
- Psychosocial Assessment
- Team Approach: Nephrologists, Surgeons, Coordinators, Pharmacists, Psychologists, Living Donor Advocates, Social Workers, Case Managers, Nutritionists/Dieticians



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## Informed Consent and Education



- Ensuring donor understands all risks, benefits, and alternatives
- Sessions on what to expect throughout the process
- Advocacy for donor autonom

### The Operation

- Surgical Techniques: Laparoscopic versus Open Approach
- Hospital stay and recovery process
- Risks and expected outcomes for donors and recipients





## Post-Operative Care

- Mental health and psychological support
- Ongoing communication between care teams and donors

## Practical Approaches for Social Workers and All Team Members

- Active listening and validation of donor/recipient fears
- Consistent, clear information for all parties
- · Facilitating peer support and sharing stories







### Patients as Advocates

- Emphasize the recipient's role in seeking donors
- Guidance on starting donor conversations with family/friends
- Use of social media and outreach community networks
