### **The Lessons**

A Reading from Romans

[7:15-25a]

I do not understand my own actions. For I do not do what I want, but I do the very thing I hate. Now if I do what I do not want, I agree that the law is good. But in fact it is no longer I that do it, but sin that dwells within me. For I know that nothing good dwells within me, that is, in my flesh. I can will what is right, but I cannot do it. For I do not do the good I want, but the evil I do not want is what I do. Now if I do what I do not want, it is no longer I that do it, but sin that dwells within me.

So I find it to be a law that when I want to do what is good, evil lies close at hand. For I delight in the law of God in my inmost self, but I see in my members another law at war with the law of my mind, making me captive to the law of sin that dwells in my members. Wretched man that I am! Who will rescue me from this body of death? Thanks be to God through Jesus Christ our Lord!

#### **Musical Notes**

It is the Fourth of July weekend, so this morning the music is of Americana.

George K. Jackson (1745-1823) was born in England and came to America in 1796. He settled in New York where he became the organist of St. George’s Chapel. Relocating to Boston in 1812, he became quite active in the musical life there as an organist, editor, and composer. He was the organist for the Handel and Haydn Society. (There is still a Boston Handel and Haydn Society – or at least there was until Covid-19 came along.) The “Adagio” was written in memory of George Washington.

John Knowles Paine (1839-1906) was the first American born composer to achieve fame for large-scale orchestral music and was the senior member of a group of composers known as the Boston Six – Amy Beach, Arthur Foote, Edward MacDowell, George Chadwick, and Horatio Parker. As a young man, Paine studied organ and composition with Hermann Kotzschmar in Maine. (There is a very fine municipal organ in the town hall of Portland, Maine, called the Kotzschmar organ. It has recently been restored, and an organ recital series

takes place there every summer.) Paine went to Europe to study organ and composition in Berlin. He settled in Boston in 1861 and was appointed Harvard's first university organist and choirmaster. He remained in that position for the next 43 years and did much composing in various forms during that time.

Commissioned by the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra under Eugene Goossens, the "Fanfare for the Common Man" by Aaron Copland (1900-1990) has become a classic heard under many circumstances – sporting events, advertisements, movies, television programs, and even as the wake-up call on various flights of the space shuttles. And in church!

The version that I play from is a transcription by Dorothy Papadakos, for many years the organist at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine. Dorothy gave this transcription to Pam Strachan, a parishioner here (now deceased), and Pam passed it on to me. When I play the opening theme and fire up that big trumpet stop (the *trompette en chamade*) on the back wall of the church, I think it does get your attention. We can chat more about that thing another time.
