

## **Not-so-Common Loons Birdathon 2022**

In our sixth year of birdathoning, the Not-so-Common Loons covered 120+ miles in Western North Carolina during 15 hours of continuous birding. We worked from our successful 2021 route and ended up observing 125 species of birds on 11 May 2022.

The team, consisting of Casey Girard, John Koon, and Jay Wherley started out before sunrise in the Sandy Mush Gamelands along Bear Creek Road. The expected Eastern Whip-poor-wills were calling consistently. Casey soon picked out an unexpected Black-billed Cuckoo calling. As the sun rose we finally picked out a Yellow-breasted Chat vocalizing in the distance. By the time we left this location we had tallied 33 species – Good Start!

In the next-door Norco tract, we were greeted by a pair of American Kestrels sharing a meal. We could not find a single Blue-winged Warbler – possibly due to habitat changes there? John did pick out a drumming Ruffed Grouse, and we also got a few warblers and singing Blue Grosbeak.

On the drive to Beaver Lake Bird Sanctuary the Jarrett Farm Road provided Grasshopper Sparrow and Eastern Meadowlarks. Heading past the water treatment plant (Purple Martin colonies) Casey called out a perched hawk – Broad-winged! Many species were single observations for the day including this one. Ingles provided not only a bathroom stop – but the needed House Sparrow.

On to the Blue Ridge Parkway – with a relatively quick pickup of Cerulean Warbler just before Ox Creek Road. Most of the other high altitude birds fell into place – such as Least Flycatcher at Craggy Gardens Picnic area, Golden-crowned Kinglets at Walker Knob, and Peregrine Falcon near 128 intersection. At Bald Knob Ridge trailhead we had our first setback of the day, missing Brown Creeper and Winter Wren. We also repeated our annual miss of Red Crossbill.

On Curtis Creek Road we picked up our targets of Swainsons Warbler, Acadian Flycatcher, and Louisiana Warbler – though LOWA did not show until the very bottom of the road on the way out – phew!

The fields of Owen Park provided Bobolink and Jay found a Northern Waterthrush on the river trail. No Common Yellowthroat yet? We started to worry about this species.

We skipped Biltmore and headed straight to Lake Julian – picking up the “lock” Double-crested Cormorants and Egyptian Geese. On to Henderson County...

In Westfieldt park we finally had our Common Yellowthroat for the day, and the nesting Cliff Swallows. Could we score any birds at Hooper Lane? Yes – but only one new species, that being Savannah Sparrows.

I have to set the scene a bit for our next stop at Mills River Park. For some reason, we seem to pick up an unexpected species here most years. In the past we have had Least Sandpiper (2021) and Semipalmated Plover (2018) in pretty much the same exact location. After getting the expected Willow Flycatchers and Eurasian Collared Doves – John spotted this years bird-of-the-day: Scissor-tailed Flycatcher – in that same exact location! Not only a first bird-a-thon record, but a first Henderson County record.

Now sitting at 124 species, it didn't seem like we could crack our 2021 number of 127 species. We managed a flyover Wood Duck while searching for more species and that made our final total 125 species. Next years target again will be 130.

Main misses for the day were Palm Warbler, Winter Wren, Brown Creeper, and Osprey.
