



Reverend Danielle Di Bona has served Unitarian Universalism for 30 years. She is an ordained minister who is currently serving as Developmental Minister for Pastoral Care and Covenant Groups at First Parish in Cambridge, MA. Additionally, Rev. Di Bona serves as the Palliative Care chaplain at South Shore Hospital in Weymouth, MA.

She has served as a member of the UU Nominating Committee and on the Unitarian Universalist Women's Federation board. She is the former President and Vice President of the **Diverse and Revolutionary Unitarian Universalist Multicultural**

Ministries (DRUMM), and continues to serve DRUUMM as Chaplain. Danielle identifies as bi-racial. Her father was born in Italy and came to the United States when he was 7. Her mother was Wampanoag, a tribe that has lived on the south shore of Massachusetts for thousands of years.

Rev. Di Bona was elected to the Board of the Church of the Larger Fellowship at General Assembly. She has also been serving as a Chaplain to the UUA Board of Trustees.



Leslie "Mac" MacFayden is a Brooklyn born & raised activist, and a first generation American of Jamaican ancestry. She founded the Ferguson Response Tumblr to connect nationwide efforts supporting the important racial justice movement started in Ferguson, MO. She has since expanded her work to provide support for Black organizers working to create lasting social change.

Projects include the "Movement for Black Lives Convening," "Women's Freedom Conference & #MLKSitIn," and the "A Wrinkle In Time Challenge." She

attended Northwestern University, Medill School of Journalism, and is a founding member of the Black Lives of UU Organizing Collective. In 2016, along with fellow activist Marissa Jenae Johnson, Leslie founded **Safety Pin Box**, a monthly subscription box for white people striving to be allies in the fight for Black Liberation. She was recently named to Essence Magazine's list of 100 Woke Women, and is BlogHer's 2017 Voice of the Year of Impact.



Sandra Tamari is an organizer with the St. Louis Palestine Solidarity Committee, and co-chair of **the US Campaign For Palestinian Rights'** steering committee. Since the murder of Mike Brown in Ferguson, she has focused on joint liberation among Palestinians, black Americans, and other communities of color. Tamari has a Master's in Arab studies from Georgetown University, and has worked with Palestinian communities in the West Bank, Gaza, Jordan, and Lebanon.
