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Answer: 1

The credibility of a witness is always a matter to be determined by the jury. O.C.G.A § 24-6-620.

See, *Flowers v. State*, 220 Ga. App. 814 (1996)(improper for expert to testify that child satisfied all five “credibility factors” she looked for in evaluating claims of molestation)

However, expert testimony that is based on scientific knowledge about the physical signs of sexual molestation or interviewing children who make claims of molestation is admissible if it's helpful to the jury in evaluating the child's credibility.
