



Secular and Religious Holidays in April

April is here, and it's the first full month of Spring. A large number of traditional holidays – indoor and outdoor, secular and religious – take place during this time. That there are many outdoor celebrations during April reflects the desire to get outdoors and enjoy not only the fresh spring air but also the warmer temperatures in parts of the world beyond sunny Southern California. Here, I will list and briefly explain some of these holidays – along with some suggestions on how to enjoy them right here in our own neighborhood.

FRIDAY, APRIL 1: This is the old-but-still-fun American tradition known as "April Fools' Day." I really can't say anything more because you might think I am spoofing you, which I am not doing because this is an article to be taken seriously in its truthfulness!



his people that they had leave quickly so there was no time to allow the bread to rise. The tradition of eating the unleavened flatbread, known as matzo and retelling the story of the Exodus continues every year. Matzo symbolizes both freedom and humility to the Jewish people who eventually fled to the land of Israel. FRIDAY, APRIL 15: Good Friday is when Christians commemorate the crucifixion and death of Jesus Christ. The word "good" may seem counterintuitive, since the day is typically viewed as a solemn one, often observed with fasting and somber processions. Why, then, is it called "Good Friday"? Probably because "good" used to mean "holy," rather than the modern sense of the word as something positive. The troubles of Good Friday (to the Christian believer) are soon overcome by the Resurrection of Jesus just two days later. To the best of this writer's

knowledge, there are no Good Friday services in the Bluff Heights area, but Easter services will be held at most of the churches in the next listing.



SUNDAY, APRIL 17: Easter Sunday is when Christians celebrate the Resurrection (raising from the dead) of Jesus Christ, who was crucified two days before the "First Easter" by the Roman occupiers of the biblical land of Palestine, whose capital was Jerusalem, where the Jews worshipped at the temple there until its destruction by the Romans in 70 CE. Sunrise services are common in the Christian community, and Easter Sunday services are among the most-attended events of the Christian year. FRIDAY, APRIL 22: The first Earth Day took place on April 22, 1970, and was established as an answer to the disastrous Santa Barbara oil spill of 1969. It is an annual event to demonstrate support for the protection of the environment. It now includes a wide range of community events coordinated globally by www.earthday.org, which includes over a billion participants in at least 193 countries. The city of Long Beach is not having one central event this year because of COVID concerns, but there will be city-sponsored events at city libraries on April 19 (Main Library), April 22 (Burnett Library), and April 23 (Michelle Obama Library). FRIDAY, APRIL 29: Arbor Day is a holiday that celebrates nature and encourages people to plant trees, which many communities do, often along with organized collection and disposal of litter. At 9:00 am on the 29th there will be a gathering at the Sievers home at 3020 E. Vista to plant at least 50 trees, including a very special one honoring the memory of Dottie Frazier, who passed away recently at the age of 99 1/2 and was featured in the last BHNA newsletter.
