WHAT IS LITURGICAL LIVING?

While we are quick to think of "culture" in terms of customs and traditions of our home countries or those of our ancestors, we don't often think of our Catholic faith as a "culture." But in reality, a culture is essentially a *lived* faith. Now more than ever, we need to reclaim our Catholic culture. And while being a member of a parish and school that embodies this culture is essential, we also need to embody this culture in our *domestic* churches--that is, in our homes.

LENT!

The liturgical season of Lent begins with Ash Wednesday on March 5. The word "Lent" comes from the Old English word "lencten" meaning "lengthening." It is a time when the days and plants begin to "lenghten" or "grow." And as the liturgical seasons of the Church coincide with the seasons of the year, it is a time for us to "grow" in our faith as well. What is **LENT?**



Some ideas for living this liturgical season in your home:

- Get started with this <u>free Lent activity pack</u> from the little rose shop or this <u>My Little Lent</u> pack (from one of our very own St. Anthony's moms!)
- **<u>Bury the Alleluia</u>**-the Church does not say "Alleluia for the entire season of Lent! Begin the tradition of having your children "bury the alleluia" and then dig it up on Easter.
- **Decorate** your home for Lent by simplifying your decorations. Incorporate purple- the liturgical color of Lent- and discuss what this color represents. Display Lenten artwork (we love <u>these seasonal art cards</u>.) Try waiting until Lent is over to put up those bunnies and Easter decorations!
- Have your children count the days of Lent with <u>this lenten</u> <u>calendar</u>.
- Keep a jar of **sacrifice beans.** When your children sacrifice something or do a good deed, have them place a bean in the jar. Then have them turn into jelly beans on Easter!
- Most importantly, try to use this season to pray as a family and dive deeper into the beauty and traditions of our faith--however that looks for your family.
