Manipulative technologies, such as smartphones, are engineered to be addictive and distracting. There is nothing wrong with you because you respond to a stimulus in a predictable way. This is human nature. Your brain doesn't care if the stimulus is a pill that you swallow or a video you watch. The reasons why people enjoy social media and short form videos is not a mystery. The real mystery is why people are not tuned in constantly. Perhaps it is a miracle that God preserves even a sliver of our attention in this overconnected world.


We know technology use is subtle and silently damages our relationship with God. Our phones are the first thing we reach for in the morning and the last thing we set down before we sleep. Our first fruits are being laid at the altar of Meta. We are constantly distracted, notified, and begged to swipe through endless content; it is exhausting and unsatisfying.

When God spoke to Elijah, the prophet was not in the strong wind, the earthquake, or the fire. Elijah was in the light, silent sound. (1 Kings 19:11-12) This is how God speaks to most of us. If we are constantly in the noise, consumed with videos and posts, we will not hear God's voice in the silence. We will not stand firm when called for a purpose or in the face of temptation.

GOD'S DESIRE AND OUR RESPONSE



Sacred Scripture is all about God's immense love for us and is most perfectly revealed through Christ's sacrifice on the cross. "In this way the love of God was revealed to us: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might have life through Him." (1 John 4:9) God repeatedly extends the invitation, yet it remains our responsibility to respond. "Behold, I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door, I will enter his house and dine with him, and he with me." (Revelation 3:20)
