WORD

FIRST READING: Genesis 15:1-12, 17-18

God promises a childless and doubting Abram that he will have a child, that his descendants will be as numerous as the stars, and that the land of Canaan will be their inheritance. Abram's trust in God is sealed with a covenant-making ceremony, a sign of God's promise.

¹ After these things the word of the LORD came to Abram in a vision, "Do not be afraid, Abram, I am your shield; your reward shall be very great." ² But Abram said, "O Lord GOD, what will you give me, for I continue childless, and the heir of my house is Eliezer of Damascus?" ³ And Abram said, "You have given me no offspring, and so a slave born in my house is to be my heir." ⁴ But the word of the LORD came to him, "This man shall not be your heir; no one but your very own issue shall be your heir." ⁵ He brought him outside and said, "Look toward heaven and count the stars, if you are able to count them." Then he said to him, "So shall your descendants be." ⁶ And he believed the LORD; and the LORD reckoned it to him as righteousness.

⁷ Then he said to him, "I am the LORD who brought you from Ur of the Chaldeans, to give you this land to possess." ⁸ But he said, "O Lord GOD, how am I to know that I shall possess it?" ⁹ He said to him, "Bring me a heifer three years old, a female goat three years old, a ram three years old, a turtledove, and a young pigeon." ¹⁰ He brought him all these and cut them in two, laying each half over against the other; but he did not cut the birds in two. ¹¹ And when birds of prey came down on the carcasses, Abram drove them away.

¹² As the sun was going down, a deep sleep fell upon Abram, and a deep and terrifying darkness descended upon him.

¹⁷ When the sun had gone down and it was dark, a smoking fire pot and a flaming torch passed between these pieces. ¹⁸ On that day the LORD made a covenant with Abram, saying, “To your descendants I give this land, from the river of Egypt to the great river, the river Euphrates.”

SECOND READING: Philippians 3:17-4:1

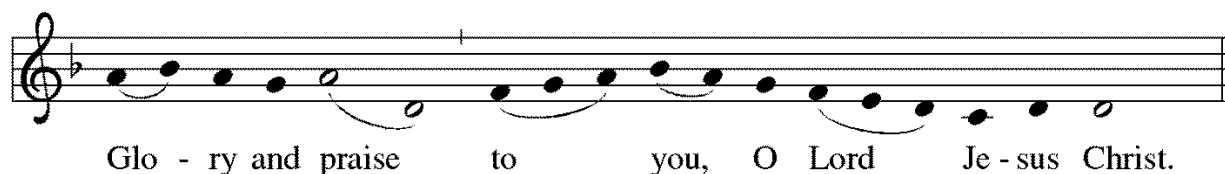

¹⁷ Brothers and sisters, join in imitating me, and observe those who live according to the example you have in us. ¹⁸ For many live as enemies of the cross of Christ; I have often told you of them, and now I tell you even with tears. ¹⁹ Their end is destruction; their god is the belly; and their glory is in their shame; their minds are set on earthly things. ²⁰ But our citizenship is in heaven, and it is from there that we are expecting a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ. ²¹ He will transform the body of our humiliation that it may be conformed to the body of his glory, by the power that also enables him to make all things subject to himself. ^{4:1} Therefore, my brothers and sisters, whom I love and long for, my joy and crown, stand firm in the Lord in this way, my beloved.

People of God at Grace,

Through this season of Lent, I'll be spending some time and energy during the Lenten preaching looking at some of the polarities we experience as people in the world and in this society.

I talked through the distinction between feeding himself and feeding the world on the First Sunday of Lent. During the first midweek service, I took the opportunity to consider how neighbors and strangers interact. Over the upcoming weeks, we'll have the opportunity to consider faith and works, lost and found, rest and growth, righteousness and mercy, and (as we approach Palm Sunday) shouting and silence.

These dichotomies often are understood to be mutually exclusive. However, as Lutheran Christians, we recognize that faith thrives in the grey areas between extremes.

I pray that the Lenten journey we take together as a community is a blessing for you and for your household.

Grace Partner in Ministry

The designated Partner in Ministry (PiM) offering for March 2025 is
The Florence Immigrant & Refugee Rights Project.

Without the right to a public defender, both adults and children in immigration detention appear in court alone without an attorney, where they may be deported back to the unsafe situations they have fled. The Florence Project offers them a lifeline through free legal and social services, and advocacy. Social services include such things as mental health counseling, healthcare support, crisis planning, housing, pregnancy or parenting support, and education. Advocacy includes appeals to the Board of Immigration and various Courts, along with amicus (friend of the court) briefs. Generating and promoting news stories that highlight the plight of immigrants is another part of advocacy. In each of these areas, they collaborate with other national legal service providers and humanitarian organizations. In their report for 2023, they state that they served over 25,000 people from 83 countries, over 17,000 of whom were unaccompanied children. New Beginnings **also has a new request**, which is for us to help them fill their Cowboy's Closet, which is aimed at helping women leaving prison. Most women leave prison with less than \$300 available to them and are often in need of basic times:

- Hygiene products (unopened, unexpired)
