Apolytikion for the Resurrection (Tone 4)

Having learned the joyful message of the Resurrection from the angel the women disciples of the Lord cast from them their parental condemnation. And proudly broke the news to the Disciples, saying: Death hath been spoiled; Christ God is risen, granting the world Great Mercy.

Apolytikion of the Persian Martyrs (Tone 2)

Blessed is the earth that drank your blood, O prizewinners of the Lord, and holy are the tabernacles that received your spirits; for in the stadium ye triumphed over the enemy, and ye proclaimed Christ with boldness. Beseech Him, we pray, since He is good, to save our souls.

Apolytikion for our Patron, Michael the Archangel (Tone 2)

O ye foremost of the heavenly hosts, we beseech thee, though we are unworthy, pray that we may be encompassed with a shadow of thine unearthly glory; preserving us who kneel and cry endlessly: Deliver us from oppression since ye are the prince of the highest powers.

Kontakion for the Theotokos (Tone 2)

O protection of Christians that cannot be put to shame, mediation unto the Creator most constant, O despise not the suppliant voices of those who have sinned; but be thou quick, O good one, to come unto our aid, who in faith cry unto thee: Hasten to intercession, and speed thou to make supplication, thou who dost ever protect, O Theotokos, them that honor thee.

Daily Readings

THE EPISTLE (for the Twenty-first Sunday after Pentecost)

O Lord, how magnified are Thy works. In wisdom has Thou made them all. Bless the Lord, O my soul.

The Reading from the First Epistle of St. Paul to the Galatians (6:16-20)

Brethren, you know that a man is not justified by works of the Law but through faith in Jesus Christ. Even we have believed in Christ Jesus, in order to be justified by faith in Christ, and not by works of the Law, because by works of the Law shall no one be justified. But if, in our endeavor to be justified in Christ, we ourselves were found to be sinners, is Christ then an agent of sin? Certainly not! But if I build up again those things which I tore down, then I prove myself a transgressor. For I through the Law died to the Law, that I might live to God. I have been crucified with Christ; it is no longer I who live, but Christ Who lives in me; and the life I now live by faith in the Son of God, Who loved me and gave Himself for me.

THE GOSPEL (for the Fifth Sunday of Luke)

The Reading of the Holy Gospel is according to St. Luke (16:19-31)

The Lord said, "There was a rich man, who was clothed in purple and fine linen and who feasted sumptuously every day. And at his gate lay a poor man named Lazarus, full of sores, who desired to be fed with what fell from the rich man's table; moreover the dogs came and licked The poor man died and was carried by the angels to Abraham's bosom. The rich man also died and was buried; and in Hades. being in torment, he lifted up his eyes, and saw Abraham far off and Lazarus in his bosom. And he called out, 'Father Abraham, have mercy upon me, and send Lazarus to dip the end of his finger in water and cool my tongue; for I am in anguish in this flame.' But Abraham said, 'Son, remember that you in your lifetime received your good things, and Lazarus in like manner evil things; but now he is comforted here, and you are in anguish. And besides all this, between us and you a great chasm has been fixed, in order that those who would pass from here to you may not be able, and none may cross from there to us.' And he said, Then I beg you, father, to send him to my father's house, for I have five brothers, so that he may warn them, lest they also come into this place of torment.' But Abraham said, 'They have Moses and the prophets; let them hear them.' And he said, 'No, father Abraham; but if someone goes to them from the dead, they will repent.' He said to him, 'If they do not hear Moses and the prophets, neither will they be convinced if someone should rise from the dead."

The Synaxarion

On November 2 in the Holy Orthodox Church we commemorate the contest of the holy Martyrs Akindinos, Pegasios, Anempodistos, Aphthonios, Elpidophoros and their companions of Persia.

Verses

The fire slew Akindinos; as for the others: some were slain with fire, others by beheading. On the second, to Aphthonios and the others come fire, sword and contest.

The first three men were servants at the court of King Sapor in 355, but secretly served Jesus Christ. The king gave them over to harsh torture which they endured courageously and prayerfully. Angels and Christ Himself appeared to them. When one of the torturers, Aphthonios, saw that boiling lead did no harm to the martyrs, he believed in Christ. He was then immediately beheaded. Then the king commanded that his three servants be sewn into goat-skins and thrown into the sea. Aphthonios appeared from the other world with three shining angels, took the martyrs to dry land and set them free. Elpidophoros was a courtier. When he revealed that he was a Christian and denounced the king, the king beheaded Elpidophoros along with about 7,000 other Christians. Then the three martyrs named earlier were thrown into a burning furnace, along with 28 soldiers and the king's mother, who had also come to faith in Christ. By the intercessions of Thy Saints, O Christ God, have mercy upon us. Amen.

A Note Regarding Holy Communion

Since we understand Communion to mean that we have all things in common, sharing an identical Faith, only those who are members of the Orthodox Church and who have prepared themselves through prayer, fasting and recent Confession may participate in Holy Communion. (We invite all, however, to partake of the blessed bread which is distributed at the dismissal.) Please see the Pastor for inquiries on how to become a member.

Holy Bread and memorial wheat* is also being offered by the Rabadi family with prayers for the repose of the servant of God, Nour Ayoub (+2 November, 2006) and their departed family members. Memory eternal.

* The offering of wheat (amha) for memorial services is a practice that can be traced back to the middle of the fourth century. In earlier times, bread and wine with olives, cheese or rice were offered in charity, and those who partook of them would pray, "Blessed be his/her memory." The wheat is cooked sometimes with honey or sugar, mixed with figs, raisins, nuts and other sweets. The grain and fruit brought to the commemoration of the dead signifies that the dead will truly rise again from the grave, for both grain, which is sown in the earth, and fruit, which is laid on the earth, decays first and afterwards brings forth abundant ripe, whole fruit. The honey or sugar used with the wheat signifies that after the resurrection of the Orthodox and the righteous, there awaits a joyous and blessed life in the Heavenly Kingdom and not a bitter sorrowful one. The wheat prepared from grain expresses the faith of the living in the resurrection of the dead to a better life, just as that seed, having fallen upon the ground, although undergoing corruption yet grows to attain a better appearance. (See I Corinthians 15:35-57)

Holy Bread is also being offered by the Mitchell and Ayoub families for the nine-year memorial of Gretta Ayoub Cassalnuovo (+30 October) and Emile Ayoub (+15 November). Memory eternal. Prayers are also offered for Michael Mitchell, celebrating his birthday today. May God grant him many years!

Have You Considered Costs Involved at the End of Your Life?

With the typical traditional burial costs beginning at \$9,995, the purchase of a burial plot (\$15,000-\$25,000), and additional fees charged for an interment, it is very possible that the total cost for an Orthodox Funeral is beyond the range of your family, especially when cremation is not allowed for an Orthodox Funeral. Therefore, it is recommended that families consider acquiring a life insurance policy in advance of planning for end-of-life expenses. Various life insurance companies provide funds for a low monthly rate, the earlier one plans to begin a policy in advance. For example, a person at the age of 50, could pay \$18/mo. for a \$25,000 policy. For more information, and to compare rates go on-line to: "Life Insurance Policies." [Note: Life Insurance Policies are most commonly provided for those 85 years of age or younger.]

PASTORAL SERMON The Fifth Sunday of Luke By V. Rev. Timothy Baclig November 2, 2025

The lesson of the Fifth Sunday of Luke is among the lessons that introduce us to the season of Advent, preparing us for the Feast which celebrates the birth of our Lord. It focuses our attention upon the practice of good deeds reminding us of God's love and personal sacrifice by sending His Son into the world.

In our time there is a great deal of attention being given to the subject of wealth and poverty. St. John Chrysostom spoke at length on the subject. His writing is available in English, published by St. Vladimir's Press, entitled: On Wealth and Poverty.

People whose lives are either shaped by wealth or poverty manifest certain attitudes and behavior. Those attitudes and behavior can also be evident among those whose lives move from poverty to wealth and from wealth to poverty. Very often whether or not someone worked to earn his or her wealth, or simply inherited wealth is very telling. For Christian believers, the main virtue in the case of both – and something that is the true test of one's sincerity is humility. Humility as a virtue is the foundation Christian love. It is the basis of a "good confession" and the true motive

of love. Its opposite is: arrogance, selfishness, greed and hatred – all of which we are warned about by our Tradition, beginning with Christ, the Apostles, and the Holy Father's. That warning comes with pointing to consequences.

We also hear in the Gospel our Lord's own warning: "To whom much has been given – much will be required." Money will not buy you everything. Sadly, there are many who are misguided in thinking otherwise.

The parable of *The Rich Man and Lazarus* of today's Gospel lesson is in two parts: 1) the life of the rich man and Lazarus on earth, and 2) their life after death.

The two are contrasted to make the following points: First that there is an eternal perspective to life. That eternal perspective gives us a sobriety with an understanding that in this life there is a spiritual quality of life that is acquired whether a person is wealthy or in poverty

In commenting on the parable St. Gregory the Great speaks of the affects of poverty and riches to the rich man and Lazarus: The fire of poverty cleansed Lazarus of his evil deeds, and the happiness of this passing life rewarded the good deeds of the rich man. Poverty afflicted [Lazarus] and wiped him clean; wealth rewarded the [rich man] and deprived him of everything else.

In a commentary by St. Ambrose we hear: Lazarus was a pauper [one of extreme poverty and lived by charity] in this world, but [was] a rich man before God. . . Yet not all poverty is holy nor is wealth sinful, but as excess dishonors riches, so sanctity commends poverty.

One's eternal destiny, therefore, is something that begins in this life, and our stewardship of material things – whether with abundance or poverty has a direct affect on our spiritual life. The message at the beginning of Great Lent is very similar: What doth it profit a man if he were to gain the whole world and loose his own soul? Just as we were reminded before the Great Lent that insofar as we are merciful to others, so will our Father in heaven be merciful to us; and that doing good to the needy is the same as having done a good deed to the Lord, so at the start of the Fast of the coming season, and at a time of the year when we are commemorate our nations many blessings at Thanksgiving, we are again reminded that merciful kindness, Christian charity, and love are among the spiritual virtues that save us from needless agony and eternal torment.

Prayer

O Lord, our God of love and great mercies, we thank Thee for your goodness in providing for all of our needs. Purify our hearts and minds from all forms of selfishness, neglect, and arrogance. Grant us the vision to see and to understand the meaning of your Gospel message as we gather about your table and anticipate dining in your heavenly kingdom. Forgive us our sins of omission and renew in us the desire to serve others as serving Thee. For Thou art He who came to serve and not to be served, and unto Thee do we ascribe thanksgiving and worship, together with Thy Father who is from everlasting and Thine all-Holy good and life-giving Spirit, now and ever and unto ages of ages.
