In other words, if passed, the regions would dissolve, and we would have one director per state going to at least 50 directors for YAF. We won't know the outcome of the proposed governance till the votes are in, but this would make it easier for each state to be represented instead of putting the responsibility of representing multiple states on the shoulders of one person. For Michigan, nothing much should change since the position is already single state. Stay tuned for more later on this.

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Second, the YAF Advocacy Group that I am part of held its first webinar of 2021 on May 21st and it was a great learning experience to say the least. The panelists covered many topics within the 90-minute session about what it means to be a Citizen Architect.
