LITURGY OF THE WORD

First Reading— A Reading from the First Book of Samuel 3:1-10, 19 Lector Lynne Barnes

Hannah's child, Samuel, was ministering to the Holy One under Eli. The word of God was rare in those days. Visions were not widespread. One night, Eli, whose eyesight had begun to grow dim so that he could not see, was lying down in his usual place. The lamp of God had not yet gone out, and Samuel was lying down in the Tabernacle of God, where the Ark of the Covenant was. Then God called, "Samuel! Samuel!" who responded, "Here I am!" Samuel ran to Eli, and said, "You called me? Here I am." But Eli said, "I did not call you. Go back to bed." So, Samuel went and lay down. God called again, "Samuel!" Samuel got up and went to Eli, and said, "You called me. Here I am." But Eli said, "I did not call, my child. Go back to bed." Now Samuel did not yet know God, and the word of God had not yet been revealed to him. God called Samuel again, a third time. He got up and went to Eli, and said, "You called me. Here I am." Then Eli perceived that God was calling Samuel. Therefore, Eli said to Samuel, "Go. Lie down. If you hear God's voice again, say, 'Speak, Holy One. Your servant is

listening.” So, Samuel went and lay down in his place.

Then God came and stood there, calling as before, “Samuel! Samuel!” And Samuel said, “Speak. Your servant is listening.” As Samuel grew up, God was with him and let none of Samuel’s words fall to the ground.

Excerpt from Martin Luther King Jr's speech "I've Been to the Mountaintop." Dr. King delivered this last speech the day before he was assassinated.

When I got to Memphis, some began to talk about the threats that were out. What would happen to me? Well, I don't know what will happen now. We've got some difficult days ahead. But it doesn't matter with me now. Because I've been to the mountaintop. And I don't mind. Like anybody, I would like to live a long life. Longevity has its place. But I'm not concerned about that now. I just want to do God's will. And He's allowed me to go up to the mountain. And I've looked over. And I've seen the promised land. I may not get there with you. But I want you to know tonight, that we, as a people, will get to the promised land. And I'm happy tonight. I'm not worried about anything. I'm not fearing any man. Mine eyes have seen the glory of the coming of the Lord.

A Proclamation of the Gospel attributed to John 1:35-49

My siblings in Christ,

John the Baptizer was standing with two of his disciples, and as he watched Jesus walk by, he exclaimed, “Look, the Lamb of God!” The two disciples heard this, and they followed Jesus. When Jesus turned and saw them following, he asked them, “What are you looking for?” They replied, “Rabbi” (which translated means Teacher), “where are you staying?” Jesus said to them, “Come and see!” They went and saw where he was staying, and they remained with him that day. It was about four o'clock in the afternoon.

One of the two who heard John speak and followed Jesus was Andrew, Simon Peter's brother. The first thing Andrew did was to find his brother and say to him, “We have found the Messiah” (which translated means “Anointed One” or “the Christ”). He brought Simon to Jesus, who looked at him and said, “You are Simon, son of John. You are to be called Cephas (which is translated, Peter).

The next day Jesus decided to go to Galilee. He found Philip and said to him, “Follow me.” Now Philip was from Bethsaida, the city of Andrew and Peter. Philip found Nathanael and said to him, “We have found the one about whom Moses in the Law and the Prophets wrote: Jesus, son of Joseph, from Nazareth!” Nathanael said to him, “Nazareth? Can anything good come out of Nazareth?” Philip said to him, “Come and see.”

When Jesus saw Nathanael coming toward him, he said of him, “Here is truly an Israelite in whom there is no deceit.” Nathanael asked, “How do you know me?” Jesus answered, “I saw you under the fig tree before Philip called you.” Nathanael replied, “Rabbi, you are one born of God! You are the Servant Leader of Israel!”

Prayer over the Gifts

Pray my siblings in Christ, that our sacrifice may be acceptable to God, our Mother and Father.

All: May our God accept the sacrifice at our hands, for the praise and glory of God's name, for our good and the good of all God's creation.

Eucharistic Prayer

The peace of our God be with you all.

All: And also with you.

Let us open up our hearts.

All: We open them up to God.

Let us give thanks to our Loving God.

All: It is right to give God thanks and praise.



It is right and just God, Our Parent, loving Source and Destiny of all life.

We praise you and thank you through Jesus, the Christ. He is your faithful servant, our brother, who brings peace to our broken world through his new commandment of love and his confrontation with the powers of evil and injustice. Through his self-emptying love, he transforms our swords into plowshares, our hostility into reconciliation, our alienation into community, and our hatred into forgiveness of our enemies.

The Spirit of the Nonviolent Christ is at work when understanding puts an end to strife, when hatred is overcome by compassion, when vengeance gives way to forgiveness. For the gift of this transforming love, we never cease to thank and praise you. We join with all the choirs of heaven and with all the earth to proclaim your glory:

Holy Holy Holy

Blessed are you compassionate and faithful God. We do well always and everywhere to give you thanks.

You have no need of our praise, yet our desire to thank you is itself your gift. With loving tenderness, you have gathered your people and filled us with a longing for peace that would last and for justice that would never fail.

Through countless generations, your people hungered for the bread of freedom. From them you raised up Jesus, the Living Bread, in whom ancient hungers were satisfied.

Jesus is the Word that brings liberation from injustice and violence. Jesus is the hand you stretch out to the sick, the poor and the oppressed. Jesus is the way that leads to peace.

On the night before he went forth to his life-giving death, rejecting violence, loving his enemies, and praying for his persecutors, he gave his disciples a

new commandment: 'Love one another. As I have loved you, so you also should love one another.'

With a love stronger than death, he opened his arms wide and surrendered his Spirit in suffering service.

Loving God, send your Spirit to heal our lives and to make holy these gifts of bread and wine, that they may become the +Body and Blood of Jesus, the Christ.

While he was at supper on the night before he laid down his life for us all, He took bread in his hands and gave you thanks and praise. He broke the bread and gave it to his disciples, saying:

**All: Take this, all of you, and eat it.
This is my body, which will be given up for you.**

At the end of the meal, he took the chalice. Again, he praised you for your goodness and gave it to his disciples, saying:

**All: Take this all of you, and drink from it.
This is the cup of my blood. The blood of the new and everlasting covenant. It will be shed for you and for all so that sins may be forgiven. Do this in memory of me.**

Let us proclaim the mystery of faith.

Memorial Acclamation When We Eat...

Loving God, with gratitude we call to mind the passion of your Son, Jesus. We remember his suffering at the hands of a broken humanity, filled with the spirit of violence and enmity. We remember that he endured his torture and crucifixion with a love free of retaliation, revenge, and retribution. We celebrate that you raised him on the third day as your vindication of his love for his siblings in the human community and for all of creation.



Therefore, we ask you, God, to accept us, together with your Son. Fill us with his Spirit through our sharing in this meal.

May his Spirit of peace take away all that divides us. May this same Holy Spirit keep us always in communion with our Bishops Pablo and Kae together with all our siblings in Christ, living and deceased. We especially remember Sharon Lee Six, mother of Michael Six.

Loving God, make your church throughout the world a sign of unity and an instrument of your peace. You have gathered us here around the table of your Son, in fellowship with Mary, the Mother of God, with Joseph, her spouse, with St. Mary of Magdala and all the saints.

In that new creation where the fullness of your peace will be revealed, gather people of every race, language, religion, and way of life to share in the one eternal banquet with Jesus our Christ.

Together now, we say...

All: Through Christ, with Christ, in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, for all glory and honor is yours self-emptying/life-giving God, forever and ever. AMEN

The Prayer of Jesus

Lamb of God (Sung)
