


Response: Your love is better than wine.

Second Reading Matt Chavez, Lector

Our God Is Marching On, from a speech by Martin Luther King, Jr. March 25, 1965 in Montgomery, Alabama.

My people, my people, listen. The battle is in our hands. The battle is in our hands. . . all over the United States. I know there is a cry today. . . we see it in numerous editorials: "When will Martin Luther King, [the Southern Christian Leadership Conference], [the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee], and all of these civil rights agitators and all of the white clergymen and labor leaders and students and others get out of our community and let. . . [us] return to normalcy?"



But I have a message that I would like to leave with [you]. . . this evening. That is exactly what we don't want, and we will not allow it to happen, for we know that it was normalcy in Marion that led to the brutal murder of Jimmy Lee Jackson. It was normalcy in Birmingham that led to the murder on Sunday morning of four beautiful, unoffending, innocent girls. It was normalcy on Highway 80 that led state troopers to use tear gas and horses and Billy clubs against unarmed human beings who were simply marching for justice. It was normalcy by a cafe in Selma, Alabama, that led to the brutal beating of Reverend James Reeb.

It is normalcy all over our country which leaves the Negro perishing on a lonely island of poverty in the midst of [a] vast ocean of material prosperity. It is normalcy all over. . . that prevents the Negro from becoming a registered voter. No, we will not. . . return to normalcy.

The only normalcy that we will settle for is the normalcy that recognizes the dignity and worth of all of God's children. The only normalcy that we will settle for is the normalcy that allows judgment to run down like waters, and righteousness like a mighty stream. The only normalcy that we will settle for is the normalcy of brotherhood, the normalcy of true peace, the normalcy of justice.

Gospel Acclamation: Alleluia (Mass of St Mary Magdalene) (V3)

Gospel - Father Michael

May the love of God be with you. All: And also with you. A Proclamation of the Gospel attributed to John (2:1-11a). All: Glory to You, O God.

A wedding took place at Cana of Galilee. The mother of Jesus was there. Jesus and his disciples had also been invited. And the wine ran out. So, Jesus' mother said to him, "They have no wine." Responding, Jesus said, "Mother, what concern of that is ours? My hour has not yet come." His mother said to the wedding servers, "Do whatever he tells you." Now, standing there were six stone water jars, intended to hold water for ritual cleansing: each could hold twenty or



thirty gallons. Jesus said to the servants, "Fill the jars with water," and they filled them to the brim. Continuing, Jesus instructed, "Now draw some out and take it to the head steward of the feast." They did so. When the head steward tasted the water it had turned into wine. Not knowing its source, ('though the servants knew,) the head steward of the feast called to the bride and bridegroom and said, "Everyone serves the good wine first, and then the inferior wine after the guests are well-wined, but you have saved the best wine for last."

This was the first of Jesus' signs.

Homily: "Intimate Connections" by Fr. Michael J. Nicosia


Creed: Our Truth

For our home planet, Mother Earth, that our actions show we love her, are united with her, and are willing to know her, we pray. **All: Loving God, receive our prayers.**


These are the prayers from the sanctuary....we pray, All: Loving God, receive our prayers.

God is with you. All: And also with you.

Lift up your hearts. All: We lift them up to God.

Let us give thanks to the Ground of our unity.

All: It is right to give God thanks and praise.

It is right, and a good and joyful thing, to thank you, God of overflowing blessing, and to praise you through Jesus your Christ.

At Creation's dawning as Holy Wisdom he danced to the tune of love —a love that united all that is to all that is you. At the climax of your song he entered the dance more intimately through flesh and blood, and learned new steps from a mother most perceptive. Spurred to act by her wokeness, he made a couple's joy even more complete.

In wokeness he lived, in wokeness he challenged; and out of a sense of kinship toward all he willing put the self aside that all might live. Honoring his offering you raised him up and in so doing raised up all of his kin—yes, all spirit and matter and flesh and blood—into the dance of love that you promise never ends.

On the night before he suffered Jesus took bread, gave you thanks and praise, broke the bread, and gave it to the disciples saying:

All: Take this, all of you, and eat it. This is my body, which will be given up for you.

When the supper was ended, he took the cup of wine. Again he gave you thanks and praise, gave the cup to the disciples, and said:

All: Take this, all of you, and drink from it. this is the cup of my blood, the blood of the new and everlasting covenant. It will be shed for you and for all, so that sins may be forgiven. Do this, in memory of me.

Let us proclaim the mystery of faith:

Memorial Acclamation: (Mass of St Mary Magdalene)

In memory of his death and resurrection, we offer you, Holy One, this life-giving bread, this saving cup. We thank you for counting us worthy to be your dance partners.

May all of us who share in the body and blood of Christ be brought together in unity by the Holy Spirit. While we ask you to remember all our siblings of many



faiths and spiritual paths, who each bring their own insights and blessings to our world,

remember, too, your Church, united across the miles.

Make us grow in love, together with all who have heard and follow the calling handed down to us from the Apostles. Bless especially our 301 Faith Partners for our unity is a sign of your love's incarnation. Together with our local bishops, Kae, Kym and Meghan, continue to empower all your gifted people for the special ministry given to the Body of Christ. Remember, all those who have died ... Welcome them into your glorious presence with Mary, our Mother, our patron Mary of Magdala,

the couple at Cana, and all those who now enjoy the fullness of your promises in heaven.
