Epilogue

Howard Thurman references what he calls The Life Working Paper. "The working paper of the individual is made up of a creative synthesis of what the [individual] is in all [their] parts and how [the individual] reacts to the living process ...



"Wherever there appears in human history a personality whose story is available and whose reach extends far, in all directions, the question of [their] working paper is as crucial as is the significance of [their] life. We want to know what were the lines along which [the individual] decided to live [their] life. How did [the individual] relate...to the central issues of [the] time? What were the questions which [they] had to answer? Was [the individual] under some necessity to give a universal character to [their] most private experience?

"Our attention is called to such a figure because of the impact which [their] life makes upon human history. For what is human history but [an individual's] working paper as [they] ride[] high to life caught often in the swirling eddies of tremendous impersonal forces set in motion by vast impulses out of the womb of the Eternal. When a solitary individual is able to mingle [their] strength with forces of history and emerge with a name, a character, a personality, it is no ordinary achievement... It means that against the background of anonymity [they] emerge articulate and particular.

"Such a figure was Jesus of Nazareth. To some he is the grand prototype of all the distilled longing of mankind for fulfillment, for wholeness, for perfection. To some he is the Eternal Presence hovering over all the myriad needs of humanity, yielding healing for the sick of body and soul, giving a lift to those whom weariness has overtaken in the long march, and calling out hidden purposes of destiny which are the common heritage. To some he is more than a presence, he is the God fact, the Divine Moment in human sin and human misery. To still others he is a man who found the answer to life's riddle, and out of profound gratitude he becomes the Man most worthy of honor and praise. For such his answer becomes humanity's answer and his life the common claim. In him the miracle of the working paper is writ large, for what he did all [] may do. Thus interpreted, he belongs to no age, no race, no creed. When [individuals] look into his face, they see etched the glory of their own possibilities, and their hearts whisper, "Thank you and thank God!"

Procession with Gifts and Basket

Offertory Song - The Lord is My Shepherd (R; V1; R; V2; R; V3: R)

Prayer over the Gifts

Blessed are You, God of all creation. Through your goodness we have this bread to offer, which earth has given, and human hands have made. It will become for us the Bread of Life. **All: Blessed be God forever.**

Blessed are You, God of all creation. Through your goodness we have this wine to offer, fruit of the vine and work of human hands. It will become our spiritual drink. **All: Blessed be God forever.**

By the mystery of this water and wine +, may we share in the divinity of Christ, who humbled himself to share in our humanity. **All: Blessed be God forever.**

Creating God, we ask you to receive us and to be pleased with the sacrifice we offer you with humble and contrite hearts.

O God, wash away my iniquity and ambivalence. Cleanse me from my sin.



Pray, my beloved siblings, that our sacrifice may be acceptable to God.

All: May God accept the sacrifice at your hands for the praise and glory of God's name for our good and the good of all God's creation.

Jesus, you invite us to this table with you. Calling us, you fill us to overflowing again and again. By your grace, we are your people of the Light, Bringers of the Good News.

Grant us, O Christ, what these gifts of bread and wine signify: that shedding our illusions, we fill up with you until finally we are filled only with you. **All: Amen**

Eucharistic Prayer

Christ is with you. **All: And also with you.**

Open your hearts. **All: We open them up to God.**

Let us give thanks to God. **All: It is right to give God thanks and praise.**

It is indeed right, for you are our Creator, and Creator of all worlds, continuing to create. We and all creation live and evolve with you.

All that is spectacular, all that is plain, have their origin in you; all that is lovely, all who are loving, point to you as their fulfillment.

And grateful for the world we know and the universe beyond our understanding, we particularly praise you for coming to earth and entering human time through Jesus.

For the life of Jesus informs our living --

his compassion which contradicts our prejudices and generalities,
his disturbing presence,
his innocent suffering,



his fearless dying,
his rising to life-breathing compassion and forgiveness --
We praise you, eternal God and worship the Christ.
Joyfully now we join our voices praising you with the entire Cosmos:

Holy - (Mass of St MM)

Flowing from the Love visible to and invisible in all creation, send your Holy Spirit upon us and upon these gifts of bread and wine. Bless them + and make them holy as You blessed them at the hands of Jesus, your Beloved. May they become living signs of Christ's enduring Love.

Before Jesus was given up to death, a death he freely accepted Jesus took the bread and gave You thanks. He broke the bread and gave it to his disciples, saying:

All: Take this all of you, and eat it: This is my Body which will be given up for you.

When supper was ended, he took the cup, again he gave you thanks and praise, handing the cup to his disciples, saying:

All: Take this, all of you, and drink from it. This is the cup of my Blood, the Blood of the new and everlasting covenant. It will be shed for you and for all so that sins may be forgiven. Do this in memory of me.

Let us proclaim the mystery of our faith.

Memorial Acclamation - (Mass of St MM)



O Holy Mystery, Light of Love, we celebrate the life, death, Resurrection and Ascension of Jesus our Christ, and all that Christ continues to do. Together with all your servants, people of every faith and no faith, may we become what you long for us to be: reflections of You and co-healers of our world.

Remember, O Loving God, all those who have died, particularly Betty Lou Smith. Welcome them into your all-embracing presence in union with Mary, mother of the world, Mary of Magdala, Francis of Assisi, and Oscar Romero.
