During this season of Lent, we seek peace. Peace for ourselves, those we love, and for our world. This Lent we are particularly saddened by the war we see in the world, especially the stench of war as Russia has invaded Ukraine. As followers of Jesus, we know that we must be the change we wish to see in the world. And we know that our passion for peace requires our active participation.



Tonight, we concentrate on ourselves. We commit to being peacemakers and peacekeepers, making peace with God, and examining with integrity those relationships in our lives which require our attention and peace making. You may be seated for our communal

rite of Reconciliation, and I invite you to open your hands on your lap, almost like a bowl, a posture of openness and readiness to receive God's healing grace.

Eternal Creator,

We sometimes put out the light of Your life in us by our sins, those times where we did not live as you would desire.

We are sorry, and we come to you today, to ask forgiveness. Tonight, we gather, seeking reconciliation and healing. Let us first reflect, and publicly ask for God's forgiveness, for God's healing.

Father Teri

In the quiet of this night, let us become aware of the need for healing within and around us.

What is our need? Maybe we are angry and exhausted by our week. Maybe we are aware of how we have failed to love someone. Maybe we are grieving, lonely, or full of doubt. Maybe we are mindful of the suffering in our neighbors or in the wider world. Longing for life and drawn by God's promise.

"Sometimes we do not have the strength to come to God. We are weak, we are weary, we are afraid. It is then that we are carried by faithful friends or family members. We are carried by others in the arms of hope."

Mother Rosean

"Sometimes there are many barriers between us and God's love: old pains, hurtful memories, deep doubt, fear of rejection. Even the church itself, can seem to crowd us out, to make no room to receive us. But faith finds a way to rearrange the furniture, to make openings where there were none, even to change structures, in order to make clear the path to Jesus."

Father Teri -

"So often we think we need a physical cure when the deepest truth is we need forgiveness, the deepest healing. We need a fresh start in our relationships. We need to be released from the past. We need the mending mercy that brings wholeness and peace."

"Perhaps the most amazing miracle is that after we have been carried by faith into the presence of Jesus, forgiven and set free, we are sent home. We are sent back to our ordinary lives, our neighbors, friends, and family; back to our daily rhythms of waking and sleeping, working and resting, studying and playing."

Mother Rosean-

"Come all you who long for healing, reconciliation, and wholeness for yourself or others. Come and <u>stand</u> and let us turn to our brothers and sisters and ask for healing and forgiveness. I invite you at this time to stand, and please turn and face the person next to you. If there is no one close to you, you can face me and from here I will be your partner in grace.

One Who Brings Freedom, by Joyce Rupp, from Jesus, Friend of My Soul.

A woman was about to be stoned to death for adultery. Before the horrible killing could take place, Jesus arrived to challenge her accusers about their own transgressions. He saw the hypocrisy behind the stones they grasped. Every clenched rock intended to aim at her held the weight of their own sins. How quickly they must have dropped the heaviness in their hands, knowing Jesus accurately named the truth of their callous hearts. When Jesus turned to the woman being accused, he met a fragile human being caught in the net of her weakness and confusion. Instead of hurling harsh words of condemnation at her, Jesus spoke kindly and opened a way out.

He provides this same opportunity for us when we are caught in the mesh of our failings. We are not condemned. We are allowed freedom to mend our ways and start anew. When we activate this quality of Jesus in ourselves, we bring a merciful attitude toward those we prefer to denounce. We acknowledge injustice and other sinfulness, but we also look at the stones in our hearts and words, knowing they bear markers of our own wrongdoings. We allow for the possibility of a fresh start for everyone. Jesus gifted the woman caught in adultery with freedom. He also gives this to us. Surely we can extend the same to others.

THE WORDS OF INSTITUTION

God, You are most Holy. Send your Holy Spirit upon us, and what we do here gathered at tables throughout your world knowing that all tables are Your Table. May we be touched by your Spirit, to Be Communion to one another, and to the world. + Let also your Spirit come upon these gifts of bread and wine to make them holy so that they may become for us the Body and Blood of our brother, Jesus the Christ.

Today, we gather to remember that on the night before he died, Jesus ate with his followers and his friends.
