Liturgy of the Word

1st Reading - An excerpt from Jesus and Women, by Elizabeth A. Johnson — Lector David Cloyd

For two thousand years almost all Christian theology has been done by men. After the Second Vatican Council opened the study of theology to laypersons in the Church, many women began to be educated in this field.

Theology in women's hands has discovered Jesus Christ as compassionate friend, liberator from burdens, consoling friend in sorrows, and ally of women's strivings. The blessing that women find in their relationship with Jesus is not simply private and spiritual, though it is certainly that. It affects their lives in public and social domains, inspiring the struggle for liberation from

structures of domination in every dimension of life.

In Christ's name, society and Church are called to conversion of hearts, minds, and structures so that the reign of God may take firmer hold in this world. This is a challenging view. But the liberating words have already been spoken: "Woman, you are set free from your ailment. Stand up."

The Second Reading - from The Meaning of Mary Magdalene, by Cynthia Bourgeault, and The Truth, by Macrina Wiederkehr - Lector Cindy Cloyd

Mary Magdalene is seen as "first among the apostles" not simply in a chronological sense (because she was the first on the scene at the resurrection) but in a more fundamental way: because she gets the message.

Of all the disciples, she is the only one who fully understands what Jesus is teaching and can reproduce it in her own life. Her position of leadership is earned, and it is specifically validated by Jesus himself.
