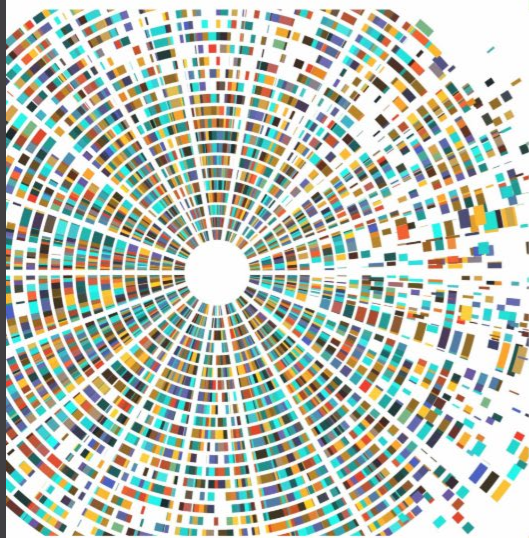



It's hard to believe that autumn is already upon us! I'm pleased to report that the fall semester is well underway; student and faculty engagement is high, and plans are underway for retreats to take place during graduation week to support our collaborative endeavors.

- Feedback is still coming in for this year's Residential Conference (held virtually) and Residential Learning Experience (held in person for our clinical programs). Early reviews indicate they were a success! After Activity Reviews (AAR) will help inform our January RC/RLEs,

even as we continue our (re)visioning efforts for the RC in AY 2024.

- At the most recent community update meeting, we celebrated Federal Work Study students receiving recognition from their departments for their many contributions and accomplishments. Appreciation to Dean Don Moss for facilitating the nomination and recognition processes. Also recognized were new members of our faculty and staff along with those changing roles within the institution. All are detailed later in the newsletter.
- Our RC (re)Visioning efforts have truly been a community effort. Over the past five months, more than 20 members of our faculty and staff have been facilitating input sessions across a variety of settings. Dr. Walker Ladd analyzed all of the input data to aid in the development of a vision statement for the RC along with the identification of student, faculty, and staff concerns to be addressed when creating potential RC models. Dr. Marina Smirnova translated those results into a set of models presented at the Community Update meeting on September 22nd. Reactions will be used to inform one community model to be finalized by October 31st for implementation next AY. Shouts out to Julia Sondej and Val Smith for their help in organizing the meetings and to Ray Bailey for managing the breakout rooms as well as the Saybrook Community Forum in Canvas, where all the data lives.
- Congratulations to students and faculty whose knowledge, talent, and efforts are making a difference in the world. Please read through the college sections to learn about the many accomplishments of our amazing faculty and students. You'll find stories such as, Dr. O'Dell Johnson's appointment as a LEAP scholar investigator by the Justice Community Opioid Innovation Network, MBM doctoral student, Leneé Cook-Braxton, leading over 200 producers through a mindful meditation at the 6th Annual Women in Production Summit, and Transformative Social Change PhD student, Suraj Budathoki's, recent visit to the White

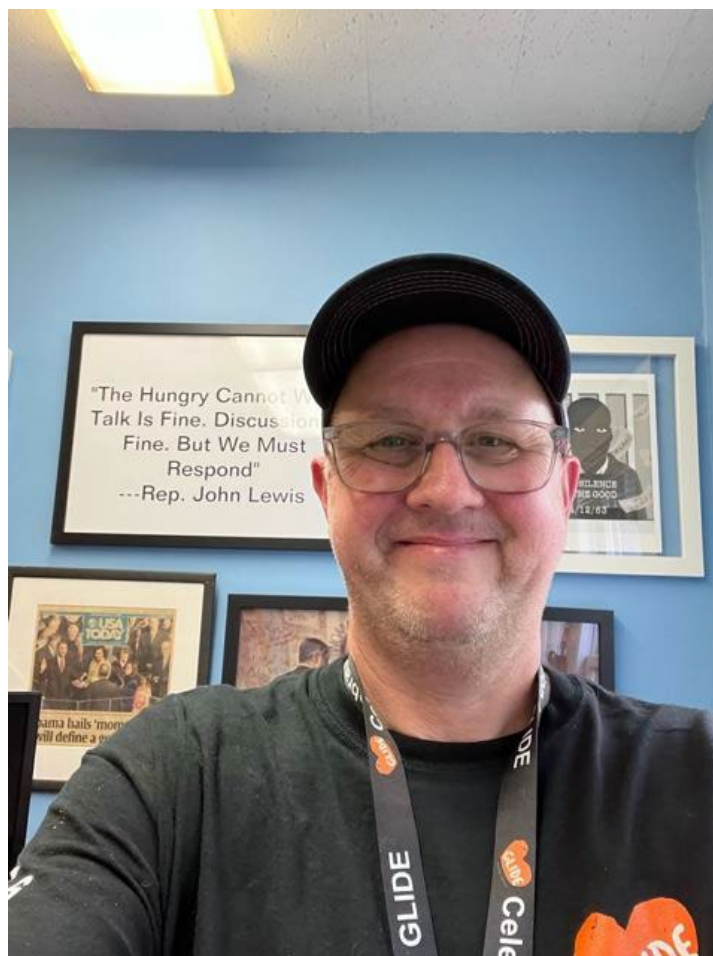

From July 24-27, 2022, TSC PhD student Suraj Budathoki, a founder and Lead Organizer of Peace Initiatives Bhutan (PIB), traveled to Washington, D.C. along with 17 other young Bhutanese American professionals, to call upon Congress and the Biden Administration to help foster peace and reconciliation in Bhutan. The delegates met at the White House with the Director for South Asia Regional Affairs National Security, Brian Luti, Deputy Assistant and Asian American Pacific Islander Liaison to the President, Erika Moritsugu, and the President's Executive Officer, Howard Ou. PIB participants also met with U.S. Senator Bernie Sanders, staff of U.S. Senator Gillibrand, U.S. Senator Brown, U.S. Senator Schumer, House Speaker Pelosi, U.S. Representative Joe Morales, the U.S. Department of State, the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, Congressional Asian Pacific American Caucus (CAPAC), and many others. The delegates promoted messages on building trust and mutual understanding, in hopes of reaching sustainable peace by reconciling the existing differences between the government and its Nepali-speaking citizens. 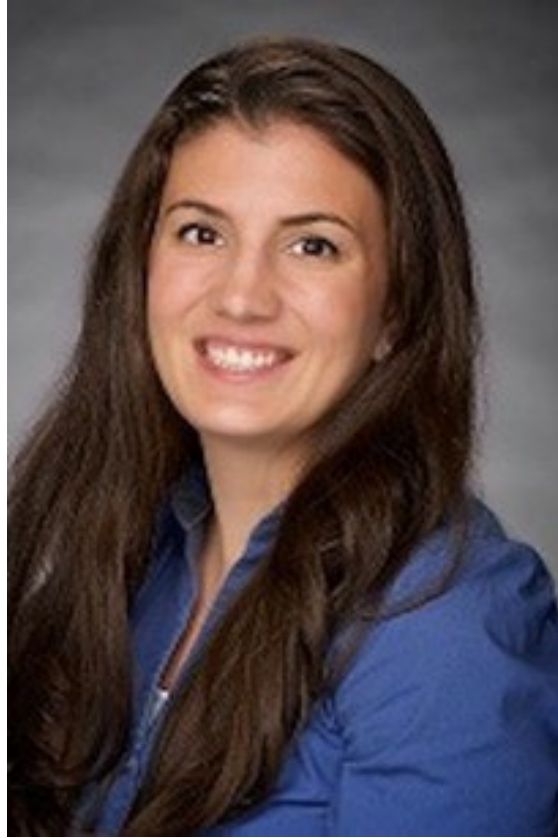

**Dr. O'Dell Johnson, MBM Adjunct Faculty & Alum,
selected as a LEAP Scholar Investigator**



Dr. O'Dell Johnson, Saybrook alumni, was recently selected by JCOIN as a Leap Scholar Investigator Program 2022 - 2024 in their effort to bring together a national network of investigators. JCOIN is the Justice Community Opioid Innovation Network (JCOIN) LEAP Scholars & Investigators Program. During his Ph.D. program, Dr. Johnson worked as a research associate to address the homelessness of 3000 participants who frequent psychiatric centers, hospitals, and jails.

Additionally, he served as the lead investigator for a study aimed at understanding how Fair Chance Hiring (FCH) practices impacting the lives of those who have experienced substance use, crime, incarceration, reentry, and employment in succession. Similarly, he conducted a study to evaluate the efficacy of FCH for recently released Lifers that were hired by SFDPH to manage strategically placed Porta-Potties located in high-crime areas.

His current research interest focuses on justice-impacted college students (JICS) that attend U.S. Historical Black Colleges or Universities under the Second Chance Pell Grant Experiential Sites Initiative who are impacted by substance use disorder (SUD). He plans to examine the efficacy of collegiate recovery programs in the U.S. predominantly White and Black higher education institutions and their impact on SUD, particularly for JICS. Odell's research interests focus on the intersections between criminality, incarceration, reentry, recidivism, and higher education. He obtained a Doctor of Philosophy Psychology at Saybrook, in 2017, a Master's in Transpersonal Psychology with specializations; Gestalt & Spiritual Psychology, in 2012, and a BSc in Theological Science, in 2007 at St. Louis Christian College. Currently, he is a Post-Doctoral Fellow at the University of Arkansas Medical Sciences Faye Boozman College of Public Health focused on health disparities in marginalized communities.

JCOIN's research approach focuses on building strong collaboration with justice and behavioral health partners to study and disseminate evidence-informed interventions to ensure best practices are being used that promote quality care to individuals with opioid use disorder (OUD) in justice settings.

The Leap Program is a 1–2-year education and mentorship program that offers two tracks, an Investigator Track, and Scholar Track. The program aims to advance the capacity and diversity of high-impact research for populations involved with the health and criminal justice systems through specialized training and skill-development curriculums.

Specifically, the goals of the program are to:

- Grow the research workforce with the knowledge and skills needed to conduct ethical, rigorous research including partnering with justice and health agencies to conduct rigorous studies, recruitment and enrollment of subjects, use of informed consent, and problem-solving in a variety of health, community, and justice settings.
- Enlist an array of community, health, and justice leaders to value and implement research findings in practice and to engage in collaborative research teams on the conduct of research.
- Motivate these learners to champion completion of research projects and fidelity of planned projects given the challenges of day-to-day operations.
- Expand and/or develop a pipeline of independent criminal justice and health researchers for the field that can work in multidisciplinary teams.
