Dear Minister Bains:

On behalf of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce and our more than 200,000 member businesses in all regions across the country, I would like to thank you for your continued leadership to help Canadians get through the COVID-19 crisis. As we continue to work our way through the crisis, you can also count on Canada's businesses to help lead the way in economic recovery.

To support the government's commitment to create one million jobs and restore employment numbers to pre-crisis levels, I share with you our updated proposal to help Canadians successfully return to productive employment and to support a resilient and inclusive economic recovery. An initial version of this proposal was first sent to you on May 28, 2020.

Matching Businesses with Talent

Even during this historic economic crisis, many businesses are struggling to hire. As parts of our economy wane and others thrive, we need an accurate picture of where the jobs of the future – and the skills required – will be. Additionally, tens of thousands of workers across Canada whose previous jobs have been destroyed by the pandemic will need help successfully adjusting to the dramatic changes taking place in the marketplace.

While Canada has significant data about the unemployed, we lack information about employer demand. We do not have an accurate picture of current job vacancies, where positions are located, which ones are hardest to fill, or what the hiring forecasts may be. Governments, businesses and educators need current and accurate information if we are to close the gap between the skills available and the needs of employers. To address this gap, we are proposing the launch of an innovative program called **Workforce Supply and Demand Matchup** (WSDM). This program will help businesses address the talent gap, fill much-needed positions more quickly and effectively and, overall, help unemployed Canadians get back to work.



Our matchup program will enable employers to partner with training and employment providers to develop candidates for skilled positions, creating the link between jobs and people. This program will support a more inclusive recovery through detailed labour demand data that will present opportunities to reskill and upskill workers, including people from underrepresented groups, in areas of high demand in the STEM fields, skilled trades and green tech.

Working through employer collaboratives in sectors and communities in every jurisdiction across the country, the program will help Canada effectively rebuild and future-proof workforce planning. After establishing proof of concept with start-up funding and gaining momentum with increased industry participation, the program will become self-sustaining.
