

Business and public priorities for the province

Alberta Perspectives survey one – Key research findings

- The ACC engaged the Strategic Counsel to develop a market research program to conduct regular surveys of chamber members and the public on priorities for Alberta.
- The first survey took place between May 28 and June 16, 2019 following the 2019 provincial election and the chamber network's Vote Prosperity campaign of business priorities for the Alberta government.
- 734 responses from chamber members were received from chambers that sent a survey link to their members.
- 834 responses from members of the public were received, a statistically relevant sample.
- The large number of responses received provides the ACC with an authoritative representation of business and public views on priorities for the province.
- The following document organizes key research using the Vote Prosperity campaign's pillar priorities. It also reports government actions to address the chamber network's recommendations for a stronger Alberta.

ACC RECOMMENDATIONS FOR A COMPETITIVE ALBERTA

STRENGTHENING BUSINESS COMPETITIVENESS

- Implement "layered cost" assessment on all policies
- Provide a reasonable time to consult and implement new policies
- Minimize risks to the economy while reducing GHG emissions
- Protect the interests of both employers and workers



- Reduce barriers to interprovincial trade, procurement and labour mobility
- Diversify and expand tidewater access for Alberta energy
- Increase export capacity with tradecorridor investments
- Use more publicprivate partnerships for infrastructure projects



- Ensure K-12 education connects learning to real- world skills and endeavours
- Reform healthcare to reduce costs and improve outcomes
- Develop a new predictable and sustainable funding formula for municipalities
- Encourage regional infrastructure planning focused on economic impacts



- Balance the budget
- Eliminate operational spending growth
- Conduct a full servicelevel review and publicly report outcomes
- Consult broadly on all options to stabilize government revenues







Most respondents believe the business community has an important role in the province's future.




Role of business community in moving the province forward

- ✓ Launched a constitutional challenge to Bill C-69 ("No More Pipelines" bill)

 and jobs




Preferred options for achieving better health care outcomes and containing costs

Preferred options for delivering better education outcomes and/or containing costs




Q28. How acceptable or not are the following options for delivering better education outcomes and/or containing education costs?
