

## Reflection from Rev. Cathy



This month we will focus on resilience, what is it and how can we practice more resilience in our lives? Rev. Scott Taylor explains his understanding of resilience as, "Ultimately, resilience is learning from your past rather than resenting it." I like this explanation, but I would add that there is also something more immediate to resilience. For me, it meant moving forward when I didn't know where I was going or if I would make it. It meant trusting in something that I couldn't understand or even articulate, as the Nicaraguan's say, "You you're your way by walking."

This month's small group packet will be sent to all members and friends of UUCGT. You are invited to explore the resources provided to learn about how resilience has shaped your life and learn how to call it forth when things get challenging. The resources in the Soul Matters Small Group packets include quotes, readings, book recommendations, articles, videos, movies, and spiritual exercises. For example, the first exercise is called, List 'Em and Share 'Em. Make your list, reflect on it, and then share it with someone close to you to get their insights. Are these true? What am I missing? Perhaps you might pick up a journal to record your monthly experience with the exercises. Here's a preview:

Carve out some time to make a list of your TOP FIVE resiliency practices and habits. For instance, here some from the lists of our Soul Matters facilitators:

- Getting eight hours of sleep
- Meditating 3 mornings a week
- Starting family dinners with a gratitude prayer
- Watching The Daily Show
- Getting daily exercise
- Make sure there is a veggie on every plate I eat (And make sure my hands stay out of potato chip bags!)
- Spending time with animals
- Make my bed
- Creating external order – organizing the junk draw, cleaning the fridge, redesigning the workbench in the garage
- Participating in on-line Sabbath program

**After you list your top 5, think about them more deeply using these questions:**

- Which resiliency practice/habit is "saving" you right now?
- Which one have you let slide and need to start doing more of again?
- Which one was given to you by someone else?
- Which one did you discover on your own?
- Which do you need to pass on to someone in your life?

I hope this preview of the Soul Matters Monthly Journal has sparked your interest!

There are four exercise options for each month's theme, and you choose the one that most appeals to you or do them all! If you are interested in joining a small group to travel this inspirational journey with others watch for details about small groups coming in the near future.




### Endowment Fund Good News

At its January 15 meeting, the Endowment Committee voted to distribute income from dividends of \$2100.00 to UUCGT. These funds will be distributed equally for:

a) outreach into the community; b) for the wider mission of UUism; and c) for the physical plant. For the 2019 calendar year the Vanguard Endowment Fund portfolio increased over \$42,000 to \$120,467 for the following reasons:

- Increased contributions to the Fund of over \$17,000 with a generous memorial gift, an insurance policy, and many, many gifts of memorial donations from UUCGT members
- Increase dividends of over \$2,400 from Vanguard
- Growth in the stock market

We, on the Endowment Committee, are heartened by the Fund growth and thank members for their gifts. We remind you that bequests, gifts from IRA funds, as well as memorials, will assure the financial stability of UUCGT in the years to come.

Program Council met on January 12 with 10 members present as others involved with VE were not able to attend.

Several successful special events were reported on and discussed. Over 120 adults and children attended the Thanksgiving Feast at Twin Lakes Gilbert Lodge on November 24 and left full of joy and food. The Winter Solstice celebration December 21 was attended by over 60 individuals and families including a lot of new people.

The Christmas Eve candlelight service and reception December 24 were also well attended. Donations of over \$1000 were received for the special Social Justice charity needs. Committees reported their activities are moving forward, however many (such as Congregational Care) are in need of new leadership volunteers.

## Social Justice

Go to The Old Town Playhouse to see the play Indecent & to the State Theatre to see Just Mercy

I hope that many of you have the opportunity to attend two exciting and important events. The Old Town Playhouse is staging the play, Indecent, and the State Theatre is showing Just Mercy.

**Just Mercy** is set in Alabama where systemic racism is entrenched. A known innocent man spends years on death row because the white judicial system must have someone to blame for a white person's death. Unfortunately, it is a very true story. The author of the book is a young African –American attorney insistent on exposing the truth and following it through to justice. This book and movie is moving, pertinent and horribly true! Wednesday evening February 5, the Human Rights Commission is sponsoring it at the State Theatre, and the ACLU will have a display table. Hope you can see it.

On other pertinent issues for today, Indecent, by Paula Vogel, cannot easily be summarized. The play is two plays, one inside the other. The famous Jewish playwright Sholem Asch, wrote God of Vengeance about a Jewish brothel. The father in the play runs a brothel, and he and his wife have a lovely daughter. They plan a wedding to a Rabbi for the daughter, but she falls in love with one of the prostitutes and resists marriage. The play we see is about the actors in that play, first in their native Poland, then throughout Europe, and eventually in America. The play written in 1907 had one impact, but what is the impact in post Holocaust America and translated into English from the original Yiddish?

In Europe the God of Vengeance makes tours over the years as the Yiddish play is accepted and lauded. The version is unchanged and the dancing and singing wildly acclaimed. We see visions of this as the play spans the years in "blinks." The play itself is fractured, showing it moving from town to town, just as in Jewish history, Jews have lived a fractured life, always having to move from place to place. With the pressure from Pogroms, the writer and players move to America. They wait in long lines at Immigration. They are looking for freedom, acceptance.

Once in America, the play is enacted in New York and continues in Yiddish. There is pressure as the players adjust to America to produce it in English. It gets translated, and then there is pressure to revise it. The lesbian love scenes get removed, but under duress and ambivalent reactions. The writer does not read it. He does not read English.

But does changing the play make it acceptable? As in today's world, is homosexuality acceptable? Removing a part, hiding the truth, does that make it acceptable? Can changing reality, pretending, make it, oneself, acceptable? What does it do to the self, perception of oneself as an actor or a person? And is true love through homosexual expression acceptable?

Does its flamboyant celebration of the Jewish life make it acceptable? It is a flagrant expression of true love, albeit between two women, and love of life - is that acceptable? The music and dance throughout the play is symbolic of the desire to enjoy and celebrate life. Can that expression of Jewish life be acceptable?

The players get arrested for indecent expression and put in jail. The writer is despondent. They are eventually freed and decide to return "home." Again there are long lines for immigration. Once away and back in Europe, they all put on their yellow stars of David as Nazism prevails. Where is free expression? They thought in America, but it was not here. In Europe? It is not there either. Where?

# Board Report



## UU Board Meeting Summary for January

The UUCGT Board of Trustees met on Wednesday, January 15. Following are key items from the meeting:

- We formed a Task Force to review our rental policies and make recommendations for changes on those policies. Mary Anne Rivers, Karl Keinath, Susan Sherman and Price Watts will make up the task force.
- We had an extensive discussion on our method of Governance and how our policies say one thing and our practice is different. Tom Darnton will draft a proposed wording change for our policies regarding governance for further discussion. We feel that we need to work through this issue so that Settled Minister Candidates will understand how we operate.

- We voted in favor of developing a proposed By-law change to change terminology from “senior spiritual leader” back to “Minister”.
- Passed a motion to incorporate the “Benzie Satellite Congregation Operating Policies” into our Policy Manual. Judy Myers is acting as our liaison with the Benzie Satellite Congregation.
- Jolynn Paige has been contracted to update our webpage. We will be using a UUA template and Rev. Cathy will be providing input.
- Rev. Cathy reported on a number of upcoming activities including the session on Sunday, January 19 to introduce the Ministerial Search Process, the kickoff of the 2020-2021 Pledge Campaign on February 9 and the start of small groups in early March.

- The Board agreed on a process for developing the six month appraisal required during the Interim Process.
- In closed session the Board voted unanimously and enthusiastically to extend Rev. Cathy’s contract through August 2021. Please note that this is a required step for Congregations served by an Interim Minister.

We plan to share highlights from our monthly Board meetings throughout the year. You can also find the minutes of Board meetings on our website. Our Board meetings are open meetings and you are welcome to attend. Our next meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, February 19 at 7:00 pm in the Sanctuary.
