Francis of Assisi loved all creatures, and he wrote a Canticle of the Creatures, an ode to God's living things. "All praise to you, Oh Lord, for all these brother and sister creatures."

In appreciation for the animals who have blessed our lives, UUCGT will honor them with a special, Blessing of the Animals Service. The younger sibling of an accomplished and independent sister with intellectual disabilities, Renée believes in advocacy and that every voice should be heard and valued.

Renée has worked with various local non-profits such as SEEDS, United Way, PEACE Ranch and the Benzie Area Shores District Library helping to create meaningful programming that benefits the community. Renée was the choir director for Trinity Lutheran Church and the Frankfort High School Glee Club and continues to teach voice in her home studio. She is also a board member of Arts for All, a local non-profit that empowers people of all abilities through accessible arts and culture opportunities while advocating for inclusive community engagement. In April 2019, MUUSJN sent an action alert that protested two bills that would penalize local government for not cooperating with ICE or border patrol agents. Those bills did not get adopted. However, anti-immigrant lawmakers are again trying to include this in Michigan's budget. Local units of government would have financial penalties for standing for immigrants rights.

Please call or email Governor Gretchen Whitmer, 517-373-3400 to urge her to veto this anti-immigrant/anti-local government provision in our state budget.

How do you feel about the many issues of immigration?



Where do you draw the line? Should they be allowed into our country? What if they are sick and their only chance for recovery lies here with some of our advanced medical services? What if while applying to stay here one gets sick, for example has appendicitis? Should we do that emergency surgery? Should they be separated at the border? Should they be allowed to join family already settled here? What if they have a skill which a university or corporation wants? We all came from somewhere else at one time, if not us, our parents or grandparents, someone. Did we originally enter legally? What should we do now?

Our national administration has always had a Homeland Security. Their jobs change to fit the occasion. Now we have added them with ICE, Immigration and Customs Enforcement. ICE was created after the 9/11 terrorist attack. Under all administrations since then, they were involved with securing our borders and removing people who were suspicious or somehow not desirable. They seem more active at this time, and we all have become more aware. Their tactics seem unjust and cruel to many of us!

Some municipalities have voted themselves to be sanctuary cities. A sanctuary is a safe place for an immigrant, safe from being picked up and deported by ICE. Some churches have been successful as sanctuaries, keeping people or families hidden from ICE. This is more difficult now due to changing rules. ICE can now enter a church for example, and search for persons hiding. Sometimes they have a warrant and sometimes, now, they don't need one so that safety is no longer a guarantee. There is also a large fine imposed on such a church. If a community itself is a sanctuary, the national administration is imposing losses of certain funding and other means of punishing the community.

In Michigan the legislature is considering a new set of bills. These bills would encourage someone, anyone, who is suspicious of the local police or government not cooperating with ICE agents, to report them. The Attorney General has the obligation then to try the reluctant agent(s) and fine them. The accuser also gets an award for reporting suspicious activity. Sound like any horrors of a recent past? It does to me, being afraid of neighbors reporting you.

These new laws in the legislature demand that local police and any official involved, cooperate with ICE when asked by reporting on and detaining individuals. In the last few years that was not mandatory, but was up to the officials' discretion. Not only do some cities and officials disagree with the deportation procedures, it also puts tremendous pressure on the local police.

Local police's primary duty is safety and helping our local inhabitants. But if they have to be spies and must report everything, can they be trusted when needed? This mandatory reporting and cooperation with ICE, puts a wedge between the local police and many communities, especially Hispanic communities. It makes ordinary every day police work more difficult. Trust is lost. Judges, prosecutors, and police officials find that enforcing ICE rules, makes it harder to protect local communities.

Board Report



Our UUCGT board met September 18, 2019 at 7:00 pm in the sanctuary. The meeting was attended by Tom Darnton, Rev. Cathy Harrington, Karl Keinath, Judy Myers, Mary Anne Rivers and Pat Light. Mike McDonald was traveling and Barb Termaat was ill. Price Watts and Dave Halsted were also present at the beginning of the meeting to give us a report.

Pat Light read the opening Words; the board shared reading the Board Covenant. The agenda was set and the consent agenda passed. One item removed from the consent agenda for discussion was a resolution proposing that UUCGT renew its application to be recognized as a Welcoming Congregation and that this be placed on the November agenda for action.

Dave Halsted and Price Watts presented an interim report of the Facilities Committee work being done on security systems. These systems are aimed at safety for people attending services or meetings, not as building protection. They had 3-4 estimates. Tom Darnton, chairing the meeting in Mike's absence, asked them to form a Task Force (or involve the Safe Congregations Team) to decide which estimate or system they might recommend and bring it back to the Board. Price reminded the Board this would be a Capital Improvement so there would not be a budget change request.

We discussed the John Ort Award which had first been presented in 2017. There has been no further work done to incorporate this award into the UUCGT culture. Rev. Cathy has begun research into the history of the award and will present a report to the board at the October meeting. There was consensus that this award could be an appropriate part of our annual Thanksgiving Feast and that we should try to have a recipient identified in time for the 2019 gathering.

The board approved the terms and language for a contract with our new Music Director.

We reviewed the existing policy regarding the Benzie satellite and discussed how that has actually been applied. Several ideas and suggestions discussed. Judy Myers has been invited to attend the Benzie meetings; she will review this policy with the group and share our thinking with the UU Benzie board in a couple weeks.

Rev. Cathy reported that she has been working at building her networking and her understanding of the present state of the congregation. She has met with the Social Justice team. She's been working with the Sunday Services Committee and VE to plan for holiday services, one at the State Theater and one in the UUCGT sanctuary. The State Theater service will have a focus on immigration issues; planning is being assisted by the Social Justice Committee. The service in the sanctuary will be Christmas Eve. The community service may be at a separate location or on a date other than Christmas Eve due to scheduling issues at the State.

Rev. Cathy also reported on the establishment of a Transition Team to support her interim ministry work. There are differences of opinion within the UUA establishment about whether a board member should, or should not, be a part of that team. After considering the various arguments, the board decided to continue with Tom Darnton being a member of the Transition Team. Kat Norman has also agreed to serve. Two more members are being sought to serve on the team.


