Mike has worked in several capacities for our congregation, including finance committee, stewardship chair, coordinator of our involvement with Safe Harbor, and most recently as president of the board during transitional times.

**Tom Darnton**, is currently vice-president of our Board of Trustees.

Tom is a practicing attorney, a boat and boating lover, and has a long history of involvement in Unitarian Universalism.

This team has many combined years of experience with the UUCGT and a skillset that covers knowledge of UUA guidelines & budget issues as well as negotiations.

The initial task of the Negotiating Team is to **draft a proposed contract by late November**.

Items to be included are compensation, benefits, work schedule, vacations, and housing. In the spring, the team will negotiate details with the selected candidate.

Cathy for review after which any necessary changes will be made before sending it to **Christine Purcell**, our UUA Transitions Coach, for her review and, again, potential changes made.

At our September meeting the Board began a discussion of stewardship.

What does it mean to be responsible stewards of this congregation, especially during these months of pandemic?

As is true for many congregations, our level of individual giving has dropped off in the absence of being able to meet in person in our beautiful building. We are also missing the income from renting our space to outside groups. How can we move forward to inspire the generosity of our congregation to meet our financial needs? Our brainstorming session yielded many useful ideas. Here are a few:

- Person to person phone canvassing could be an effective way to connect with members and friends. At some point in the future we may be able to meet in person one-on-one or in small groups.
- Service auctions can be a very effective way to raise funds, but the pandemic is a substantial obstacle. With creativity we might be able to do it virtually. We also discussed pairing with local businesses where we would get a percent of purchases generated by the congregation.
- You should expect to be hearing from the members of the board during upcoming services about why giving is important to each of us. We'd also like to hear from those of you who have increased your pledges this year, or plan to increase your pledges next year. Why is this congregation important to you? What inspires your generosity?
- As we look to the post pandemic future we are excited about the idea of bringing the public into our space for live concerts, lectures, readings and other income-generating events.
- Stewardship is an integral part of our congregation. It enables us to fulfill our covenant to uphold our principles and our mission. We will continue to explore creative solutions and we welcome any and all ideas.

- Did he/she have a favorite author or enjoy certain types of books?

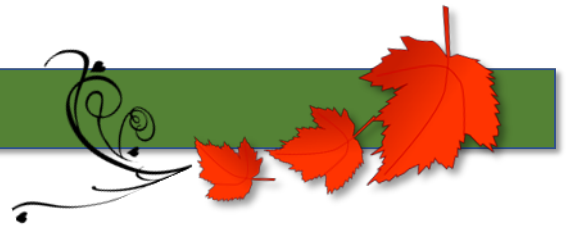

## GREEN SANCTUARY



### Barb Stamiris gives us an update on Line 5

What issues do you feel our church should be on top of to do what is necessary to change them? Please let me know. Misty Sheehan [mistysheehan11@gmail.com](mailto:mistysheehan11@gmail.com).

**Barb Stamiris** is first to be writing a series of articles on issues regarding our environment:

- **Line 5** in the Straits of Mackinac was granted an Easement in 1953 to use the public bottomlands if operated "with the due care of a reasonably prudent person for the safety and welfare of all." Canadian owner Enbridge has breached the Easement many times and was fined \$6.7 million for repeated safety violations by the EPA in June, 2020.
- It cost Enbridge \$1.2 billion to clean up 25 miles of the Kalamazoo river when **line 6B ruptured** in 2010; the largest land-based oil spill in U.S. history (1). At the same rate it would cost \$24 billion to clean up 500 miles of Great Lakes shoreline if line 5 failed. In July 2020, Enbridge refused to supply the proof of insurance requested by Michigan.
- **Line 5 is 15 years older** than line 6B. Even Enbridge acknowledges it needs to be replaced, so proposes building a new Line 5 in a tunnel. When 95% of line 5 oil is coming from and returning to Canada, it makes no sense for Michigan to risk the Great Lakes by owning a tunnel leased to Enbridge for 99 years as proposed.
- The U.P. Energy Task Force studies completed in April 2020 show that Michigan can deliver needed propane to the U.P. **without line 5**. A well planned decommissioning removes the threat of a sudden loss of propane should line 5 fail.
- Enbridge is pushing the tunnel plan to Governor Whitmer, the Legislature, and counties across the state in their Moving Michigan Campaign backed by an alliance of big oil - Exxon, Shell, Chevron and more.
- Enbridge says a tunnel "will make a safe line even safer" yet the old line will still operate while a tunnel is bored below, **making Line 5 less safe** during construction (5). Two tunnel work accidents have already impacted Line 5: one when a borehole collapsed in Sept. 2019, the other when tug cables damaged it causing one leg to be shutdown from 6/20 to 9/20.
- Line 5, now **67**, was intended to last **50 years**. A tunnel would extend that to 75 years or more. In poor condition today, Line 5 cannot operate safely for another decade while a tunnel is permitted, litigated, or built.
- Enbridge wants to maintain the Straits of Mackinac shortcut to east coast markets, their most profitable but not their only route east. A tunnel serves Enbridge not Michigan. It represents a long term cost with very little benefit to Michigan.

Please contact your officials for the shutdown of line 5 and to oppose an unnecessary tunnel to replace it. Committing to another century of oil transport is not only a threat to a warming climate but the economics of oil have shifted. The future belongs to lower cost renewable energy. Governor Whitmer needs to enforce the 1953 Easement and decommission Line 5 immediately in order to protect Michigan interests - the Great Lakes, the drinking water for 40 million, and the Pure Michigan economy.





## These are extraordinary times and require extraordinary thinking...

We are hearing over and over that these times are extraordinary, and it is true. So how do we live in such circumstances - our national integrity at stake, a killer pandemic, and deadly effects from real Climate Change? How do we live? Bury our heads? No! Look for how we have coped in the past? That is an idea.

The Jewish religion has been here for a long time. I'm not going to argue what was here first. One of the first here was *Homo sapiens*, and they tried to create a way to live together and understand the world about them. There were many attempts and much evolution of thoughts and feelings.

Eventually they came to the idea of religion and the idea of a god. Originally it was a god that you made promises to in order to get your way, one that you bargained with. Eventually some developed an idea of a god where you would feel in awe of the immensity of our world, its beauty, and its power. It became a concept where our being as a speck, a small part in a bigger cosmos, seemed to fit our needs and our understandings. We began to accept that maybe, just maybe, we did not know all, and that there is much more.

As we discover ourselves in this larger idea, how do we deal with our feelings, our anxieties, our many unknowns? How can we cope with all that is around us?

It is not easy. It was not then, and it is not now. But mankind developed rituals, ideas, paraphernalia, customs, ways to do things, that could possibly help our sensitivities as we try to understand and manage to cope with life. Many of these rituals, customs are still in use today. Do they help? That depends on you, the individual.

In the Jewish religion, at this time of year, we celebrate the New Year, *Rosh Hashanah*. Then we have the Ten Days of Awe, which culminates in the somber time of *Yom Kippur*, the Day of Atonement. What does all this mean?

**It means that with *Rosh Hashanah* comes deep introspection.**

For ten days we give thanks, we think, we celebrate, and we begin ten days of deep reflection. What have we done this past year? How could we have done it better? What do we want to change, improve? How have our relationships been with our fellow families and friends, and the ones we don't even like? Yes, we relate to them too, how can we do it better? Can we come to a better understanding? A better way of working together? Can we develop respect for those we disagree with and find some common communication? We must try. That is our mandate at this time, at all times.

For those we have wronged, we owe restitution toward a better peace. We try to sincerely apologize. We cannot ask forgiveness until we meet the task head on, reaching out for a better understanding together.

**At the end of our ten days of deep introspection comes the *Day of Atonement, Yom Kippur*.**

This is the day that we ask for forgiveness for our sins. The prayers talk of the Gates Closing, implying we need to hurry to be forgiven. Yes, the tradition says, but the gates are never really closed. We can continue to make amends, to re-create ourselves. How? Tradition states we can do this continually thru repentance (turning inward toward our higher goals and aspirations), prayer (supporting our better selves), and charity (do righteous acts consistent with our higher images, goals).

So as we go through these hard times with the upcoming election, can we find solace and strength in some of the traditions of the past? Many traditions have stood the test of time. Can we speak to those we ideologically differ with in tones of reconciliation and comfort, not with the blame and anger that we are casting aside? Might that help them change as we accept them?

Tradition has me wish you to be inscribed well in the Book of Life. It is not the time of "Happy New Year." That is in January. Remember you can change the Inscriptions with Repentance, Prayer, and Charity. May each of you be inscribed well and continue the hard work especially of charity at this stressful time when many are in need. And may you be inscribed well.

**\*Income for 2020-2021 is less than 2019-2020 due to an accounting change that recognized prepaid pledges for 2020-2021 in the 2019-2020 fiscal year. Approximately \$32,000 in excess income for 2019-2020 is on the balance sheet in our operating account and can be used to offset future losses, should they occur.**

Budgeted income includes the total of all pledged and unpledged donations and miscellaneous income including building rent, etc. "For Those in Need" collections are in addition to Budgeted Income Received and are disbursed quarterly to worthy causes, including Congregational Care, Tuesday Community Lunch and other Community needs outside our congregation. The percentage reflects the portion of the total amount of income or expense budgeted for the fiscal year.

# UU Board Meeting Summary for August



## September 2020 UUCGT Board of Trustees - Summary

- We welcomed Judy Myers back to the Board!
- Our bookkeeper, Glenda, is resigning for health reasons and will help ensure a smooth transition with her replacement. We thank her for her service and wish her improved health!
- The Finance team and Board are working to ensure our fiscal procedures are followed and commitments completed through office transitions.
- We are initiating the conversation seeking fresh ideas for how we communicate, participate and celebrate Stewardship for our congregation. *Your ideas are welcome!*
- Jan Zerbel from the Ministerial Search Team came to the meeting and we all agreed this is a good practice to improve communication and alignment during the search process. We also made nominations for the negotiating team which will be announced once verified they accept the position.
- We shared favorable responses to the Beyond Categorical Thinking workshops and recognized the need for us to intentionally have more opportunities to practice having “good” difficult conversations with each other. Learning circles and community circles are some options.
- We are planning our annual Board Retreat in mid-October to deepen our understanding of the Board’s role in a successful ministerial search process and our congregation in general, which will help us to be more effective leaders. One example will be how to incorporate dedicated time for the visioning process focused on how we are serving our congregation, future congregation, community, and self.
- In the Committee Reports, we were thrilled that Misty Sheehan has offered to revive and lead our Green Sanctuary team. We also agreed there is a need for a more coordinated Community Outreach function, and will take steps to explore what that might look like. *Ideas welcome!*
- Rev Cathy’s report focused on clarifying the Transition Team’s important role in her time with us as Interim minister.
- We will also personally each dedicate some time to take the UUA Congregational Board training.
- Lastly, in addition to an article on an important topic each month in the Beacon that we started in July, we will reinstate this Board summary to be included in the Beacon and include more information about the Board on our website.
