MINISTERIAL SEARCH TEAM

Reflections on our Journey – Part 2

Over the years in my career I've participated in numerous search and interview teams - but none so satisfying to me as our 2020-2021 UUCGT Ministerial Search Team. We had a big job to do and we did it. It wasn't chance that our members bonded, became productive, and came to respect each other for our different backgrounds, talents, and perspectives. We worked at it. We set a covenant to guide us, elected two cracker-jack co-chairs, opened each meeting with a round-robin check-in, lit our chalice and went to work. And over the course of eight or nine months and too many Zoom meetings, interviews, and reference calls to count something special happened.

I got to know a whole lot more about what our congregation values in a minister and about our shared mission and history as a congregation. I developed a deeper empathy for the seeking, questioning process each candidate revealed to us. As an education geek, I loved learning more about Starr-King and Meadville Lombard Seminaries and Harvard Divinity School, and I developed a new appreciation for the total job of a UU minister - far beyond preaching. And despite the obstacles of the pandemic, I believe the search process has left us all better prepared to contribute to UUCGT as we embark on a new chapter. **Jim Linsell**

Being a part of the Ministerial Search Team has been a meaningful and valuable experience for me. This is undoubtedly the closest teamwork project I have ever been a part of and it has taught me a lot. But perhaps the biggest part of the experience for me was two-fold: first, the meaning of being in a covenantal working group where we each pledged to work by a written set of agreed upon principles and goals. The meaning of such a covenant became important as we got to the task of sorting our priorities and narrowing down our choices. We learned from each other points of view that we had not held going into the process, and that turned out to be essential. We listened to each other and to the applicants, learning from them as well. The term Covenantal Relationship came up over and over again and it was a large measure in our successful completion.

The second part of great value was learning about aspects of our own congregation's history and people that I was not totally familiar with before. The workings of this UUCGT congregation depend on the contributions of so many people and we have such a talented and committed set of congregants that I have found truly impressive. I am proud to be a part of this group, and of the Ministerial Search Team.

There is more, however, especially with regard to the challenges we face in this world to define and live according to the UU Seven Principles; to really live our lives with those principles as the basis for our lives and relationships with others and the earth. **Charles Brackett**

Alex, we welcome you and your generous heart!





OUR HEALTHY CONGREGATION

UUCGT will be undergoing two significant transitions very close together in the coming months: a new minister and in-person services! Realizing this, the HCT has been planning a series of three Sunday services to help us strengthen our toolbox for addressing the anxiety we humans naturally experience around life changes.

- April 11: The Care and Feeding of a Minister
- May 23: Transitions: Working Through Our Anxiety
- June 6: Collaboration: Working Together Well

A healthy congregation is one that actively and responsibly addresses its anxious disturbances, rather than a congregation with an absence of troubles. Thinking of our congregation as a system, we realize that a change in one part affects other parts of the group--similar to an ecosystem in nature. Thus working on one's own ability to be a self in the presence of others--to decide to respond thoughtfully vs. reacting automatically--can be your contribution to the health of the family, group, congregation or community!

In other words, when you feel anxious: Notice, Reflect, Respond directly with the other person.

Here are some examples we've learned from studying the book "Growing Yourself Up" to help us distinguish

Unhealthy Behaviors	Healthy Behaviors
<u>Triangles</u> - secrets, gossiping, offloading tension about one person to a sympathetic other.	<u>Conduct 1-1 Relationships</u> - communicate directly with others about oneself vs. about others.
<u>Conflict</u> - when people insist that their way is the only way and clash with an opposing viewpoint	<u>Use the Energy of Disagreement to Spur Creativity</u> - conflicts can be thought of as two ideas trying to occupy the same space. The emphasis is on taking responsibility for creating a solution while staying emotionally in contact with the other person.
<u>Over or Under Functioning Reciprocity</u> - taking on more or less responsibilities than rightfully belong. <u>Distance/Fusion Reciprocity</u> - cutoffs from or fusing with others that gives up individuality.	<u>Strive for Awareness and Balance</u> - being a student of yourself in the midst of tension can go a long way toward choosing how much to do for others and how much of yourself is maintained within the group.

We're the first to say we're not perfect at this! We're on a journey with a shared goal of healthy relationships that will enable us to navigate the coming changes with greater ease--a journey that will ultimately help us create more positive impact in our community and at home. We shared examples from our own experiences with you at the May 23rd service, and are planning some fun ways to amplify our collaboration skills in the June 6th service!





Congregational Priorities





The Sunday Services Committee has decided to include a statement to be read before our chalice lighting that acknowledges that the land on which we live was once the home of Native Americans from the Anishinaabek tribe. Here is that statement:



“We honor and acknowledge that the land on which we gather is the original homeland of the Anishinaabek, who are the Ojibwe and Odawa in our region.

We raise the birch bark basket holding the four sacred medicines to remind us to hold space for the Anishinaabek as we work to reconcile the harm of colonization.”



Program Council met via Zoom May 14th with 16 members in attendance. Minutes from the 4/9/21 meeting were approved and sent to board. Alex Jensen, (prospective minister at that time) was visiting and was interested in how we operate, report to the board and communicate to the congregation.

Our monthly meetings are open to all, but mainly attended by chairpersons of various UUCGGT teams and committees. Information on recent and planned activities are shared and minutes are submitted to the board after they have been approved. This leads to somewhat of a lag in getting information to the board, thus any items of critical importance are communicated to the board in a more timely manner by committee chairs.

If you find you are missing interactions during this time of Covid separation, several committees (Sunday Services, the Congregational Care Team, and Religious Education could all use additional members.

The Reopening Task force is adjusting to changing Local, State, Federal and UUA guidelines and working diligently to get UUCGT ready to reopen safely with dual in-person and virtual services as soon as possible.

The postal service is important. I personally have a long history with them from early childhood. As a toddler, the story goes, I would go off with the mailman every day I was outside and he came along. I would take his hand and he mine, and we would walk up the hill together. He would do some of his route and eventually return me home before he left. His name was Walter, and he was kindly and his hand warm. I knew he was black but that had no meaning to me, only kindness.

So I was surprised when a new person on my route for delivering Meals on Wheels, said, "You know my son." Really? I was just meeting her, and who was her son? Well, she was right. I had moved, and it was my previous mailman, Mark. What a delight! How did she know? He had told her so. How did he know I would deliver to her? She did not know. Was it just coincidence?

But life cannot thrive on coincidences or clairvoyance. In a complicated society life needs a plan and follow thru to get things accomplished. In today's world it also needs money and communication to go with the planning. The postal service is essential. Many people get their life-saving medication thru the mail. Others get their life-saving support and love thru receiving the letters and presents sent by those who remember and care for them. Many years ago people used the postal service for banking. They lived so far remotely; it was the only choice available.

Our previous national administration did not want voting by mail, believing it was easy for fraud. He seemed to think that those not voting for him would use the mails to vote. Well, voting by mail has been a resource for many, older, younger, disabled, from all political parties. Due to the pandemic, many states made voting by mail more accessible to all. This increased the volume of mail. He lost the vote and wrongly felt the mail service was at fault, fraudulent, and therefore needed dismantling. But the postal service does tons more than deliver votes!

He put in charge one of his friends as Post Master General. That man, Louis DeJoy, has done lots to dismantle the postal service and change delivery to private companies, many of which he apparently has private interest. For example he now wants to stop airmail delivery by airplanes and have that mail go by truck across our nation. He has removed many of those blue and red postal boxes and wants now to close post offices. He has destroyed postal sorting machines, slowing the time needed to sort mail, and costing more money. He wants to cut hours and times postal persons deliver mail and much more.

The postal service is essential for many, for their medical health, their family and worldly communication. The PMG wants to cut that reliable, safe, efficient service our country has relied on for decades. Benjamin Franklin was the first Post Master General starting the service for the 13 colonies in 1775.

Delivering Meals one snowing wintery day, I stopped in front of a house where there was a large pile of snow left by the street plow. I had to throw the food and milk up on the pile. My plan was to walk to the corner and back down on the sidewalk to the food on the snow pile. From there I could move it to the house. Suddenly a man got out of a white truck with red and blue stripes around it. I looked up to see a smiling post man offering me a hand as he commented; your car sticker says, "Postal Service is Essential." I smiled back and thanked him! Postal service IS essential. Please comment here. It IS essential we let the PMG know how we feel. Thanks!

He said measures were attempted supposedly to be more efficient, but that they quickly learned that those changes were impossible to enforce due to development of extreme backlog.

The primary topics discussed at the May Board meeting were financial and policy updates and the plans for re-opening of our building. As part of candidacy week, we welcomed Alex Jensen to our May Board Meeting. Our **annual meeting is set for Sunday, June 6** after our service.

Financial Updates

We approved our 2021-22 budget, which will go to congregational vote at the annual meeting. Thank you to each and every one of you for financially supporting our beloved community!

Our PPP loan forgiveness process has been approved by the bank, who submitted it to the SBA for their approval. We will be changing our financial software applications for easier management and have an external accounting service conduct a financial review as recommended by the UUA.

Candidacy Week

We finalized voting process details to complete candidacy week. Thank you to the MST for your tremendous job in finding and hosting Alex!

Congregational Outreach Policy

The Board approved our Outreach policy as submitted by Judy Myers, reflective of priorities resulting from our congregational survey. In brief, the policy states that our minister shall gauge how our congregation can best impact our community and shall determine how best to interact with other like-minded churches or congregations to reach more people and do the most good. Our intention is always to help where help is needed, and we hope that these efforts will encourage others to join our congregation. The full text will be posted soon within our Policy Handbook on our website.

Committee on Ministry Policy

We discussed the formation of a Committee on Ministry to keep our new minister accountable, gauge on how ministry is received, balance healthy boundaries and professional responsibilities, and provide feedback. A draft policy will be developed based on UUA and other congregation samples for approval in August.

Re-opening Task Force

The Board approved the task force recommendation. Our Board President is forming a Re-Opening Implementation team and is seeking two additional people to join her.

UUCGT Website Refresh

Our new website will be launched soon! It will support streaming live video for our hybrid services and be much easier to navigate, especially with mobile devices.

We also finalized a few outstanding items on our Annual Meeting Preparation Checklist.

*Income for 2020-2021 is less than 2019-2020 due to an accounting change that recognized prepaid pledges for 2020-2021 in the 2019-2020 fiscal year. Approximately \$32,000 in excess income for 2019-2020 is on the balance sheet in our operating account and can be used to offset future losses, should they occur.

Budgeted income includes the total of all pledged and unpledged donations and miscellaneous income including building rent, etc. “For Those in Need” collections are in addition to Budgeted Income Received and are disbursed quarterly to worthy causes, including Congregational Care, Tuesday Community Lunch and other Community needs outside our congregation. The percentage reflects the portion of the total amount of income or expense budgeted for the fiscal year.

Please note that we have had a slight fall off of current year pledge payments and a significant fall off of rental income for the past year due primarily to the Coronavirus pandemic. We need your continued help. If you can, send your pledge payments and “for those in need” contributions to the office or contribute on-line at uucgt.org.
