Reflection from Rev. Cathy



Whether we are celebrating Solstice, Hanukkah or Christmas, December is a season of hope. Advent is a time of expectation, of waiting for something to happen that will change the grim and gloomy status quo, a light of hope for a time when joy replaces despair, when peace reins over war, forgiveness replaces hurt and anger, when all people begin again in love. We are waiting for the coming of love.

The holiday season can be overwhelmingly stressful with preparations and parties that we can forget to do the real work of advent, waiting. As my mentor Davidson Loehr used to say, "Holidays are easy, but preparing for the possibility of a holy day is an achievement."

Waiting is not passive. Henri Nouwen wrote, "Active waiting means to be present fully to the moment in the conviction that something is happening where you are and that you want to be present to it. A waiting person is someone who is present to the moment, who believes that this moment is the moment." (from *Watch for the Light: Readings for Advent and Christmas*).

Another way to say it is, "To wait in hope is to have what we hope for already come true in us through our hoping." (NPR, Advent, a Season for Hope from Darkness).

Every year during this season of hope, we are given a choice to fall into the distraction trap of busyness, or to use this season of darkness and hope to go deep within, to listen and wait. Ask yourself, what are your deepest yearnings for yourself . . . for those around you . . . for your community . . . for the world? Listen . . . for something holy wants to be born within us and among us.

Take some time this holiday season to tend to your inner life with a joyful attitude of hope and expectation. Old Testament scholar, Walter Brueggemann explains it this way: "Advent is an abrupt disruption in our 'ordinary time'... utterly new year, new time, new life." Everything begins again.

I have asked the teachers to list their needs - read to a student, have the student read to you, help with math, help older kids write a sensible paragraph, learn percentages, etc. There is also a need to put away the books in the library. Volunteering is a commitment. That would mean you pick a few hours or an afternoon, a morning, a certain day of the week, whatever fits your schedule, and you come each time as you say. Of course there are emergencies and please don't come if you are sick, but call in and let them know. When you are out of town or have to cancel, try to notify ahead so the teachers can plan.

And when you are volunteering, we will meet about once a month over a brown bag lunch after UUCGT Sunday services and share our experiences. What is working, where do we need support, understanding or help, how do we deal with whatever it is? We will share and learn more together.

If we do it all together, we learn and help the kids, teachers, school, and ourselves! It is an honor to go there and be a part of such a grand place.

S o c i a l J u s t i c e

Christmas is the time of giving

“Giving of your time

truest gifts to give.”

What would be appropriate and appreciated by family members of different ages? A glance at some of the available social justice books is a good starting place. Try a book for a 4 to 8, 9 year old: *I Dissent: Ruth Bader Ginsberg Makes her Mark* by E. Baddeley.

For an advanced 9 year old, her history told like presenting a case before the courts, but in comic strip form, is *Becoming RBG, Journey to Justice* by D. Levy. There are several excellent books about RBG for kids!

For children's book about refugee families try: *Stepping Stones: a Refugee Family's Journey* written by a Canadian and illustrated by a Syrian artist. Quite astonishing and intriguing!

For high school and all of us, learning about the racial errors and the systemic racism in our society is very important. Try some of these: *Just Peace*, a true account of the flaws of the justice system in Alabama, by a dedicated attorney, Bryan Stevenson. *The New Jim Crow: Mass Incarceration in the Age of Colorblindness* by Michelle Alexander. For a beautiful and poignant letter advising his son to be acutely aware, read: *Between the World and Me* by Ta-Nehisi Coates. *Walking with the Wind: A Memoir of the Movement* by John Lewis.

The Lesson of the Lark by L.K. Cobb about ratifying the 19th amendment, the women's right to vote, is good for older young readers through teens and adults. There are many books on Women's Rights including abortion. *Shrill: Notes from a Loud Woman* by Lindy West, is a thought provoking book, honestly written about a woman and how the world judges, and then of course, how that feels! And *Bad Feminist* by Roxane Gay.

One of my favorites because it is so clearly stated and includes chapters by family members and friends, is this one about Trans: *He's Always Been my Son* by Janna Barkin. It is complete with references and best for understanding, including the new language.

About the conflict in Syria is: *We Crossed a Bridge and it Trembled: Voices from Syria* by Wendy Pearlman. There is also *the Beekeeper of Aleppo* by Christy Lefteri about how wars and displacement affects family and personal life.

More for some of the teenagers, but also for adults, try *The Book Thief* by Markus Zusak, about war and prejudice. This was his first novel and is excellent. Also about books, learn how the librarian saved books in the Iraq war, *The Librarian of Basra: A True Story from Iraq* by J. Winter, appropriate for younger readers, too. About books again but for older readers, is another true story: *The Bad Ass Librarian of Timbuktu* by Joshua Hammer. This book depicts the love and respect that the Muslims in Africa had for their acquired knowledge in all areas of science and religion and the need to protect the manuscripts from the 1500's and earlier from destruction during war and roaming terrorists today.

Don't forget *The Sunflower: on the Possibilities and Limits of Forgiveness* by Simon Wiesenthal written from his experience in Auschwitz. And a direct book about anti-Semitism: *How to Fight Anti-Semitism* by Beri Weiss.

I know I have left out lots of social justice issues as well as books about those issues. They can't all be named here. I am sure we could all name a thousand good books that all need to be read. But most of all -- read, enjoy, learn, share your learning, feelings and compassion with the next generation so they know and want to learn more, too. Giving of your time and sharing your thoughts - these are the truest gifts to give.

Board Report

UU Board Meeting Summary for November



The UUCGT Board of Trustees met on Wednesday, November 20.

Following are key items from the meeting:

- Accepted a report from Emmy Lou Cholak, representing the Social Justice Action Committee.
- Supported SJA activities to support legal immigrants.
- Approved directing the Christmas Eve offering to support SJA activities supporting legal immigrants
- Gave approval of SJA request to recruit additional volunteers to work at Blair Elementary and inform the school that volunteers were from UUCGT
- Facilities Committee is looking into adding burglary and fire reporting to our new security system. Will report back in January.
- Approved a policy change allowing non-members to serve as Committee Chairs with Board Approval. Board Committees (Finance, Staff Resources and Leadership Development) cannot be chaired by non-members.
- Received updates from the Healthy Congregations Committee and the Safe Congregations Team.
- Discussed the proposed “Weapons Free Policy”. Agreed that we needed input from the Congregation prior to approving this policy.
- Agreed to renew Interim Minister Covenant paperwork from the UUA. Both the Board and the Interim Minister are required to submit this paperwork.
- Heard a report from Rev. Cathy and discussed plans to involve the Congregation in required Interim Ministry activities beginning in January.

We plan to share highlights from our monthly Board meetings throughout the year. You can also find the minutes of Board meetings on our website. Our Board meetings are open meetings and you are welcome to attend. Our next meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, December 18 at 7:00 pm in the sanctuary.

We continue to be off to a good start financially due to a number of prepaid pledges for the 2019-2020 fiscal year. Prepaid pledges are a normal annual occurrence.

Budgeted income includes the total of all pledged and unpledged donations and miscellaneous income including building rent, etc. “For Those in Need” collections are in addition to Budgeted Income Received and are disbursed quarterly to worthy causes, including Congregational Care, Tuesday Community Lunch and other Community needs outside our congregation.

The percentage reflects the portion of the total amount of income or expense budgeted for the fiscal year.
