Rabbi's Reflection

A Study Bardo, or "Where's [Rabbi] Waldo?"

Friends –

As you know I will be spending July on my study days, what I am calling a Study Bardo – a time of devotion to reflection – between Independence Day (when we are called to explore healthy self-differentiation) and my birthday (a day when we get to think about just what that "Self" is, and feed it cake). Bardo is a Tibetan Buddhist term for the time between incarnations, the time before rebirth.

I want to express my gratitude to the staff, volunteers, and Staff Resources Committee for figuring out how to make this work smoothly for the community. I bow to the wisdom of the UU Ministers' Association which encourages all our congregations to provide annual study time (not the same as vacation or sabbatical), so that Spiritual Leaders can recharge, reflect and learn.

My time will start with a week at the Abbey of Lady of Gethsemani, the Trappist abbey that was home to Fr. Thomas Merton, a place that has been my spiritual home away from home annually for several years. While there I (try to) maintain the monastic prayer schedule:

3:15 am Vigils – Okay I am little iffy on this one, but I will try. Two years ago, I nodded off and got sent back to rest by a friendly monk.
5:45 am Lauds – which one of the monks calls, "Laudy Laudy!"
6:15 am Eucharist – I can't participate in communion but can support those who can
7:30 am Terce
12:15 pm Sext
2:15 pm None
5:30 pm Vespers
7:00 pm Rosary
7:30 pm Compline

In between, I will hike the hills, which the Kentuckians call "knobs," of the monks' 2000 acres and spend some time with the Merton collection of papers, including his correspondence on interreligious dialogue. He exchanged some letters with my Rabbi, and I am hoping to explore those in particular. I zip from there to Dayton to do the naming of my great niece, Jocelyn, and spend time with my Ohio family.

I will be here with you and the family of Mercedes Kimling on July 16 for her memorial service. I hope you can join us to hear the story of this extraordinary woman.

Later, I travel for three days to Milwaukee, to the School Sisters of Saint Francis, who are hosting an intensive weekend of interreligious dialogue between Judaism, Catholic Christianity and Islam. I have several presentations and am very excited about how

they are putting this program together. They are especially interested to hear about how a "rabbi enjoys working for a Unitarian Universalist congregation!"

Finally, at the end of month, Karl and I will go to Chicago for a few days. He has a big clothing buying trip at the Merchandise Mart (it sounds like fun shopping for three days, but he puts on about 8 miles a day!), and I will travel down to school in Hyde Park to get ready for Fall semester.

So what do I hope to bring back from all of this to benefit our community?

First and foremost, some physical rest will do me some good. We have an exciting lineup for Sunday services in August, and I am eager to be ready to go!

Second, time spent in silence and solitude for extended periods (like at Gethsemani, where they somehow magically block all cell service – maybe it's the bourbon fruitcake?) is healing for the introverted part of my soul.

Third, I bring a new and different experience to these events in being able to reflect from "the inside" on Unitarian Universalism and how we have mutually influenced each other. Above all, I hope to come home with some good stories to share, a healthy, rested physical self and a peaceful soul amidst the busyness of all we do here at UUCGT.

Again my thanks to the congregation and the UUMA for creating and valuing study time. I cannot think of a greater gift for a book worm like me.

Election of a New UUA President

Susan Frederick-Gray was elected UUA president. Rev. Frederick-Gray is a minister of a Phoenix, Arizona, congregation and won a three-way race to become UUA's ninth elected president and the first woman elected to the office.

Congregational Study/Action Issue (CSAI) 2014 - 2018: Escalating Inequality

After about an hour of debate Saturday morning, onsite and offsite General Assembly delegates overwhelmingly supported passage of the UUA Statement of Conscience Escalating Economic Inequality. The UUA writes, "Challenging extreme inequality is a moral imperative. The escalation of inequality undergirds so many injustices which our faith movement is committed to addressing: from economic injustice to mass incarceration; from migrant injustice to climate change; from sexual and gender injustice to attacks on voting rights."

Important UUA Board of Trustee Actions

The UUA board approved a funding plan for Black Lives of Unitarian Universalism, and appointed six people to lead a two-year Commission on Institutional Change. The Commission on Institutional Change will examine the impact of white supremacy on Unitarian Universalism. The commission has been created in response to the hiring practices controversy at the UUA.

BASIC INTERCULTURAL HOSPITALITY

SAY THIS

Q: They don't look like you--are they adopted? Are they your real children? Did you use a sperm donor?

Q: What college did/do you go to? What do you do for a living?

Q: I see you have a disability, here let me help you.

SOME MORE TIPS ON WELCOMING

Reflect on what calls you to be welcoming to all who enter your congregation. What faith value are you practicing?

Greet everyone who comes though the doorway, not just new people.

Enjoy the gifts found in inviting and listening.

Notice when you make an assumption and intentionally set that assumption aside.

Remember everyone has multiple identities and refrain from focusing on any one identity you notice or assume.

Ask open ended questions and respect people choosing not to answer.

Refrain from asking personal questions, including theology. People will reveal what they are ready to reveal.

Let the guest take the lead!

Start a conversation from a shared experience-like the morning's worship.

Find language that is inclusive including language that doesn't assume all children have a mother and a father or live with their parents, or everyone is either a man or a woman, etc.

Forgive yourself for any blunders or awkwardness. Apologize if needed and accept being human.

Help spread these practices-inviting, listening, rejecting assumptions-throughout the congregation.

This is just a step. There is always more ways we can become more welcoming and inclusive.

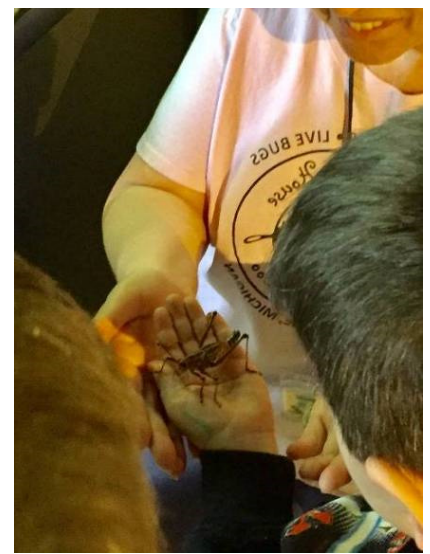
