# Rabbi's Reflection

## **Covenantal and Committed Community**

"The genius of our faith, the lifeblood of our faith, is that we honor the bonds of community more than the bonds of intellectual assent. We hold our relationships as more sacred than any system of belief. We make promises to one another about the ways we will be in relationship and the ways in which we will pursue our religious journey together. This is covenant."

Beloveds, in November we will explore what it means to live in committed and covenantal community. We are delighted that this will include opening the doors of our UUCGT home to our neighbors from Safe Harbor. If you haven't already signed up to help - if you can share anything from an hour to staying overnight - please come and live your commitment to our community by being part of this moment in our congregation's history - it is a first. Many thanks to Mike and Sandra McDonald for initiating this effort.

This month, as our Sunday Services explore committed and covenantal community, I invite you to consider what it means to live a covenantal life. Where are your promises and commitments? One of the root meanings of the word from which we derive the idea of covenant is "a friendly bond."

Our Buddhist cousins often speak of cultivating unconditional friendliness. My teacher, Pema Chodron, writes, "Developing unconditional friendship means taking the very scary step of getting to know yourself. It means being willing to look at yourself clearly and to stay with yourself when you want to shut down. It means keeping your heart open when you feel that what you see in yourself is just too embarrassing, too painful, too unpleasant, too hateful. The hallmark of this training in ... the bodhisattva path, is cultivating bravery."

It takes courage to live with ourselves in an open and honest way, and it takes great courage to do this in community. This month we will explore deeply what it means to live in community: by welcoming new members, by learning together, by launching two new small group ministries, by sharing food and by welcoming the larger community into our spiritual home.

As this month unfolds we give thanks - let us look around in awareness at our UUCGT home and praise what is good, what is working; let us praise our growth and friendships. And let us be brave enough to open our circles to new friends. Please surround our visitors with your love and warm welcome, and welcome our new members into your circles of caring.

One great way to do this is to come our annual Thanksgiving Feast. We are deeply grateful to Mary Kiner for her years of commitment to lead the effort to make this gathering happen, and we are deeply grateful to Victoria Gallup and Carol Ritter for stepping up and saying "YES! We will continue this beloved tradition." You see friends, there is much to celebrate and many opportunities to cultivate friendliness with friends old and new. That is committed community. **Join us in this good, emerging energy** - be part of the new energy of UUCGT and let us be blessed in it together.

# Wednesday, November 9

On November 9th, Wednesday Supper will be followed by a showing of the Ken Burns and Artemis Joukowsky documentary, *Defying the Nazis: The Sharps' War*, about Waitstill and Martha Sharp, husband and wife UUs, who risked their lives to rescue people from the Holocaust.

The film's showing will take place on Kristallnacht, which according to the U.S. Holocaust Museum literally means, "Night of Crystal," or the "Night of Broken Glass." The name refers to the wave of violent anti-Jewish pogroms which took place on November 9 and 10, 1938. This wave of violence took place throughout Germany, annexed Austria, and in areas of the Sudetenland in Czechoslovakia, recently occupied by German troops.

#### Sunday, February 12

The Rev. Dr. William Barber's Moral Mondays movement is growing nationwide. Learn more about its history and future in *The Third Reconstruction: Moral Mondays, Fusion Politics, and the Rise of a New Justice Movement*, which was just selected as the 2016-2017 UUA Common Read.

A Common Read invites participants to read and discuss the same book over a given period of time. A Common Read can build community in our congregations and our movement by giving diverse people a shared experience, shared language, and a basis for deep, meaningful conversations. Each year's Common Read is chosen by a committee including both headquarters and field staff of the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA). Anyone may nominate a book.

Drawing on the prophetic traditions of the Jewish and Christian scriptures, while making room for other sources of truth, the book challenges us to ground our justice work in moral dissent, even when there is no reasonable expectation of political success, and to do the hard work of coalition building in a society that is fractured and polarized."

## A Message from the Board...

I am happy to announce that we have appointed a new Trustee to occupy the vacancy on our Board. Donna Stein-Harris has accepted the appointment which was effective as of the Board vote on October 17th. Donna's brief resume is posted below:

Prior to that, she worked for and with a number of healthcare organizations, including her own company, on health and safety issues using a variety of public education and multimedia vehicles.

Originally from Chicago, Donna is enjoying her retirement in Traverse City with her husband, Gary. "I can't imagine living anywhere else right now," Donna said, and "What an extraordinary bonus to find the UU congregation. I am honored to serve on the Board of Trustees."

A hearty welcome to you, Donna! I look forward to working with you in serving this extraordinary congregation.

On another note, I would like to post some reflections on Rabbi Chava's teaching from the pulpit on October 16th.

Her focus was on the acceptance of diversity and her words were profound. She spoke not only of the importance of accepting diversity, but of how growth emanates from doing so. She also addressed the importance of accepting divergences in opinion under our own roof.

Budgeted income includes the total of all pledged and unpledged donations and miscellaneous income including building rent, etc. "For Those in Need" collections are in addition to Budgeted Income Received and are disbursed quarterly to worthy causes, including Congregational Care, Tuesday Community Lunch and other Community needs outside our congregation. The percentage reflects the portion of the total amount of income or expense budgeted for the fiscal year.

We are continuing to do well year-to-date, which is normal in that some of our pledges are paid in full for the year in July (or before). If you want more detailed information, you can look at our website, click on Board, then on Board Packet, then on Statement of Financial Activity.

# Social Justice and Action

We all know the Ten Commandments even though many of us do not consider them every day. But we are all aware, I am sure. Are there any candidates who fill the bill of following them? Of course, we must ask, do any of us? Do I? Do you? Who follows them? Let's consider them, one by one, with their modern interpretations. Please accept my shortened version of the Commandments. Thanks.

- 1- Thou shall not have any other God before thee, because I am your God. Are we humble, accepting suggestions, ideas from others, knowing that we alone cannot know or do everything? Do we respect a higher power, listen carefully with our ears and feelings for assistance, help, or guidance? Do we respect that being with true feeling and submission?
- 2- Thou shall not make any idols. There is only one and are we it or are there others that represent *him* today on earth? Do we judge other peoples and their revelations of *God* and his true meaning for them? Can we accept them as pure and true as our own?
- 3- Thou shall not take his name in vain. That means we cannot impersonate him in any way by name, actions, or feelings of power. Are we submissive and admitting a higher power than ourselves?
- 4- We shall remember the Sabbath and make it Holy.

Do we respect any day, time, custom, ritual that represents the beauty and everlasting nature of our universe and the peoples and customs inhabiting it?

5- Honor thy Father and thy Mother? Do we honor all the representations of our own father and mother as we respect and honor others' parents, using kind words, assistance and help in daily needs and wants, as well as their spiritual reflections and memories?

6- Thou shall not murder.

This means murder not just by sword or gunfire, but also the slow tortuous murder that today seems so prevalent. Murder by depriving the feelings of self worth through constant degradation of the spirit, namecalling and ridicule. Murder by deprivation of necessary food, clothing, substantial shelter, equal and various quality educational opportunities, worthwhile employment, safety from harm, affordable and quality health care, respect for privacy and the individual variations of all peoples. Murder by constant harassment and threats of deportation. Who strives for these hallmarks of our humanity?

- 7- Thou shall not commit adultery. This refers not just to the sexual act, but the thoughts and sometimes not so private looks, words and insinuations.
- 8- Thou shall not steal.

Do we give adherence to the fact that all desire some things to hold dear and to have possessions without our judging them? Do we encourage others to keep and to hold what belongs to them, fairly earned in our societies' acceptable methods and not steal them with over taxation? Do we vow to pay our fair share of taxes so our country can protect us all, and no one has a free ride, but all paying according to their real ability

without taking advantage of being in power and setting rules that favor one group over another?

9- Thou shall not bear false witness. Do we all tell the truth to the best of our ability or do we distort the truth so as to lay blame and falsely accuse in order to instigate distrust and unnecessary conflict? Do we do this purposely for self-gain?

10- Thou shall not covet.

Do we accept, honor, and even admire the gifts and abilities of others, realizing that if we all work together, we can raise the quality of our culture and the livelihood of all in our country and better the world? Or, do we fall back on jealousy and self-hate because we realize at some point that we alone cannot do it all, as maybe we had promised, and that revelation makes us angry and hate-
