# MINISTER'S MESSAGE from REV. ALEX



#### Dear Ones:

UUCGT is entering an exciting time in this turn of the new year! Not only are we seeing a rise in attendance, but also a deepening in engagement within and beyond our community. The feeling across our congregation is infectious; it's clear that I'm not the only one sharing in this excitement!

It seems that our excitement is having a "snowball" effect; I hope you won't mind this reference in the midst of the heavy snow as of late! An emerging desire, from your elected Board and from many in the congregation, is to spend some time thinking about who it is we are yet becoming. Not just *thinking* about it, but actually *dreaming* of what is on the horizon. After an invigorating Board Retreat last Fall, the Board identified a clear desire to intentionally approach these questions: "Who are we now?" and "Who do we want to be as a community?". With additional excitement, it seems that our congregation is wishing to breathe new life and renewed energy into our Vision, Mission, and Covenant statements to reflect where we're at in this next stage.

The overwhelming message I received was that finding a sense of our shared *Mission* for who we are now—not just with the desires and wishes we've inherited, but also with new input and insights especially from those who are newer to us—is crucial for discerning our next steps together. Our congregation was born out of many dreams and desires from our early founders and forbearers: a place for children to flourish, thrive, and ask questions about the world around them; a presence in our area that stands for social justice and promoting the greater good; a community that unequivocally and recklessly welcomes the stranger, especially those who are marginalized or seen as "other" in wider society. Such powerful dreams and visions for who we are when we are best living out our shared values.

All of this dreaming has already cast a grand vision; a vision that called me to you. The enticing opportunity of a fresh shared ministry and a new partnership together, knowing that there is much we can and must do in this world of so much pain and strife. Your imaginations and dreamings have brought us to this next moment, where we ask ourselves these questions once again of who we are now and where we're going.

In the next year, some of your fellow congregants, leaders, and I will embark on designing a process that will allow us to tackle these questions. Building on this Vision for who we are, this emergent Task Force will attempt to craft new statements for our Mission and Covenant together that reflect the times we now find ourselves in. As we enter this fresh new year, we are given a chance to begin again; to examine the opportunity of this next year and to refresh and rekindle our commitments. I hope you'll join in as we set out in this next chapter of our community.

# **Our Next Chapter**



Welcome to 2023, a year in which our board and our minister propose to lead a flowering of UUCGT with the help of our congregation. We will continue the work started while preparing for and calling Rev. Alex as our settled minister. Hereafter, we will call this process VMC, for Vision, Mission, and finally Covenant.

We have now entered our second year of Rev. Alex's ministry. We have settled in and gotten to know each other. We have endured administrative challenges. We have broadened and enhanced our ability to deliver our Sunday service message. We have recruited and preserved a talented staff. We have weathered the Covid pandemic. We are once again able to look beyond survival. Our board and minister are preparing to lead this next chapter with all of you being engaged in that process.

A helpful framework for understanding how our congregation works is to think about our vision, our mission and our covenant. A very short definition of each would be:

**V**ision: Where we want to go; **M**ission: How we get there;

Covenant: The energy that moves us forward and holds us together,

Hence VMC.

Let's look back to the UUCGT board meeting in February of 2019. During that meeting, our board was in conversations with Rabbi Chava Bahle and Rev. Beth Marshall, wrapping up our time with the former and beginning our time with the latter. At that meeting, we began a chapter in our journey together, a chapter focused on recruiting, calling and settling a new minister. That chapter concluded at our November, 2022, Board meeting when our settled minister presented a plan to lead the congregation in an in-depth review over the next several months of our Vision, our Mission and our Covenant, our VMC. Our next chapter begins.

In the fall of 2020, the entire congregation was busy preparing to recruit and call a new settled minister. As part of that work, the October 2020 Board members formulated a Vision of a 5-year look ahead. Additionally, in the Fall of 2020 the Ministerial Search Team conducted an extensive Congregational Survey along with hosting numerous Cottage Conversations and Focus Groups. The Survey results were published in an 8-page Summary Report, along with a 1-page Summary of the Conversations.

Here is an amalgamated version of a Vision that incorporates work accomplished in 2020 by the Board, input from over 100 UUCGT Members and Friends during the Ministerial Search Team work, and current thinking:

In 2028, we are a congregation growing in spirit, in numbers, in diversity, and in greater influence in the Grand Traverse region. We have a beloved settled minister. We are a congregation that includes diversity of ages, genders, abilities, racial and ethnic backgrounds and a number of young families. Our RE programs for children, youth and adults are thriving and contributions from our wonderful music program fill our sanctuary with beautiful music every Sunday. With all of this and enhanced Sunday Services, we are the spiritual home for our members and friends.

We know that the Grand Traverse area is a special place that needs and deserves special care, and our congregation is at the forefront of sustaining a diverse, vibrant and growing community. We serve as a beacon of hope for preserving the climate. Our Green Sanctuary inspires those who visit us and inspires environmental ministries at other area congregations.

Our membership is active and highly visible across the moral, social, racial and environmental justice activities of the Grand Traverse region. We are a source of guidance and healing for the larger community.


Not to be confused with a "vision statement," which would be much briefer, this proposed "Vision" has received little attention as we have gone about the process of recruiting, calling and settling a minister in the midst of a Pandemic. Over the next several months, through a coordinated series of services, workshops and conversations, Rev. Alex and a VMC Task Force will lead us though a spiraling process reviewing, developing and recommitting to our Vision, Mission and Covenant. Our goal is to complete this cycle with a covenant ritual at our 2023 Thanksgiving Gratefulness Gathering Sunday, November 19, 2023 at Gilbert Lodge.

### **GREEN SANCTUARY**



"It will be the actions of each of us that will determine the fate of the world's ecosystems."

In Douglas Tallamy's book "Nature's Best Hope" he proclaims that it will be the actions of each of us that determines that fate of the world's ecosystems. As an entomologist, he has studied the relationships between the plants and insects that form the base of the terrestrial food web.

Since insects and plants evolved together they have formed mutually dependent relationships. The consequence of this is that as we remove native plants from the landscape, the insects that depend on those plants die out and then all of the animals higher up in the food web are put in peril too.

Similarly the plants that rely on specific insects for pollination produce fewer seeds and smaller fruit further jeopardizing other species.

He concludes that we can dramatically stem species loss by incorporating native plants into our landscapes, reducing the amount of land devoted to turf grass and changing how we approach caring for our yards. In short our yards need to be part of the natural ecosystem rather than separate, non contributing entities.

In January we will be reading and discussing the book "Braiding Sweetgrass" by Robin Wall Kimmerer. This book weaves together indigenous teaching, stories and science in order to help us "imagine a different relationship, in which people and the land are good medicine for each other". As the weather warms we are planning to bring in Cheryl Gross, master gardener and president of "Plant It Wild", to share with us and members for the larger community, how we can begin to incorporate native plants into our yards.

We also plan to work with our Landscaping Committee to identify opportunities to add native plants and remove invasive species from UU property. We plan to get RE involved in this effort by helping the youth create a pollinator garden.

# **BOARD REPORT**



The UUCGT Board of Trustees met on December 15. Many issues were discussed and acted on.

**Funds approved**. The Finance committee approved the Facilities Committee request for funds to pay for the black mold removal in the music closet.

**IT Task Force Update** - Rick Walter gave a report about the new hard drive, the Wi-Fi wiring problem, the update on the phone line/alarm problem. We are thinking about trying out a new phone system.

A Shared Ministry Review has been scheduled with Alex Feb 7 or Feb 14.

**The Facilities committee** proposed the new part-time hire of a Building Superintendent or Sexton to take care of daily upkeep and chores. That committee will research the necessary details for a formal proposal that will be reviewed by the Finance Committee before being presented to the Board.

A New shelf has been installed in entry vestibule, to keep vestibule tidy, created by Gordon Friese and Bill Edmondson who crafted the carpentry and installation. It is a beautiful reflection of the bench on the other glass wall that was crafted by Marvin Howe.

The Shoveling Team currently has 7 members, just shy of our goal of 8. A schedule is drafted for the winter. Responsibilities include: shoveling and/or salting front walks and assuring 3 exit doors in rear are clear for exit. Each shift-week begins on Monday and ends Sunday night. The person responsible will act alone unless there are larger snowfalls when the rest of the team is alerted to join the effort if they are available.

**Rust Floor stains in Social Hall** from stacked chairs: options to remedy this included placing a rug under the stacked chairs or move the chairs away from the glass windows to where the sofa is now. Then change the floor tile color in that area to dark brown, thereby masking the stains. The Board will discuss this further in January.

**Voices from the Congregation.** This month Barb Termaat from Healthy Congregation gave the history of this committee and their progress up to now. The committee would like guidance as to future goals for this committee. This committee should continue to educate the congregation on healthy communication and behavior. We all want this group to continue to educate the congregation on healthy communication and behavior through Sunday Service snippets. Workshops for Adult RE etc. All agreed this is an important aspect of ou ministry.

# **December 2022 Program Council Repor**

Fourteen individuals met December 9, 2022 via Zoom to review current status of various UUCGT programs and committees and to continue creative plans for the rest of the 2022 - 2023 fiscal year.

The Program Council sponsored FUNdraiser held at UUCGT on November 26 was a fantastic success. Fun was had by all, music was great, snacks provided sustenance, we got to see old friends and meet new individuals AND we raised nearly \$10,000 to help boost our general fund! Other Fundraisers will be contemplated for the future.

As this is being written, many are preparing for the Winter Solstice event tonight (12/21/22) at UUCGT. We hope this event is as exciting as last year and that you all were able to attend.

Program Council will sponsor a **Thanksgiving Gratefulness Gathering** at Twin Lakes Gilbert Lodge on Sunday November 19, 2023. Remember to put this community gathering on your calendar now. You won't want to miss it.

Chris Walter announced the Annual Budget Drive for pledging will be launched February 5th with the theme "Rising With Abundance; Pledging with Our Hearts".

David Hassing reported the **Facilities Team** has reinstated monthly meetings on the 1st Monday of every month (Will reschedule Jan to Jan 9), to discuss current issues and address them. Professional remediation of the black mold issue in the Music closet will be obtained. A new shelf designed by Richard Miller and created by Gordon Friese and Bill Edmondson was installed in entry vestibule. This is a beautiful reflection of the bench on the other glass wall, that was crafted by Marvin Howe. A Shoveling team has been organized to keep the walks and exit doors clear of snow and ice this winter. If you would like to help, contact David Hassing. The team is also addressing fixing some missing shingle problems on the roof and issues with rust stains from the chairs stacked in the social hall.

During Committee/Team Check Ins, the 14 people attending reported for 23 committees or groups. This increased level of participation compared to recent months was invigorating. With more people involved, fewer items will fall through the cracks.

Renee, Music Director discussed future all music services, problems caused by copyright issues on YouTube, and possible Coffee House / Open Mike after Wednesday Night Supper. Charles Brackett informed us the Art Exhibit of Barb Culton's quilts has been hung and we discussed the possibility of additional temporary art being added to the Sanctuary that would fit with Sunday Services themes. Chris Lautz reported 10 individuals attended a Discover UUCGT Orientation Dec 4. Three new members joined December 18th and several more are interested in joining UUCGT soon. Chris Lautz also reported the website is being updated as regularly as possible and notices of address changes for members and friends are regularly published in the Flash. If any one notices an error, please inform Chris Lautz. Mary Van Valin reported Green Sanctuary is sponsoring a Braiding Sweet Grass discussion in the new year and will investigate possibility of availability of Inflation Reduction Act funds for upgrading our building renewal energy usage. The Small Group Ministry facilitators are meeting monthly and sharing best practices for their various Soul Matters and Creativity Matters groups. Memorial Garden and Landscaping are generally in hibernation for the winter but will be planning for activities come spring. Endowment has prepared some new Contribution cards which are on the credenza pin the front hallway. Chris Walter reported on Board activities and that a Bldg Use Task Force is working on revising rental structure and policy language. She also reported that Katie Short is now coordinating the Kitchen Crew for weekly tidying up of the kitchen.

# FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

October 2022 YTD Income; \$91,814 October 2022 YTD Expenses: \$98,614 For Those in Need YTD \$ 4.485

Our income improved this month. We had strong figures for donations for which we thank all of you who give to the General Fund. Our Auction and Dinner Fun Fundraiser was a success and we expect our final figures will come in December and will be over \$10,000.

Thank you Mary Van Valin and her team, John Hoffman and all the folks donating dinners and all who have helped. We had Solstice festivities that generous congregants have given to and we thank those folks. I just want to remind everyone to continue to make sure you make your 2022-2023 pledge payments, we are running behind our budget in that category about \$10,000.

Our expenses did increase and we still have issues with making gains on our deficit. We are running lower than expected on expenses but not yet showing a significant decrease in our deficit. Our cash flow figures still indicate possible issues with funding in March and April of 2023. Much will depend on the final December figures and how well we do in January and February.

Thank you for your generosity, please be sure that you continue to make your pledge and donation gifts. Consider making use of Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCD) in meeting your RMD Tax obligations. You may want to review that with your advisor around your charitable giving.

Remember this holiday season, the ways UUCGT impacts your lives. Ultimately, we will meet this deficit with less spending on/cutting programs or increasing our revenue or both.
