Ghostbusting: A Christian Case for the Supernatural Instances of Demons and Ghosts *Kaiya Knodel**

This paper explores the enduring questions about the existence of ghosts and examines the appropriate Christian response. From ancient civilizations to the modern era, there are countless reports of encounters with the paranormal. From the earliest accounts of communication with the dead and the Catholic Church's use of exorcism in the Middle Ages to the Victorian era's fascination with séances, the postmodern rise of professional ghost hunting, and the development of specialized tools in today's investigations, each era reflects humanity's ongoing attempt to understand supernatural encounters. Drawing from both Scripture and a wealth of credible historical accounts, this thesis argues that these ghostly encounters are not with the souls of the dead, but, rather, they are manifestations of deceptive demons who seek to tempt people to sin against God's commands and lead them away from His truth. The Bible teaches that God alone determines the destiny of human souls after death—there are no wandering spirits trapped between worlds—and forbids any attempt at communication with them. Christians are called to reject all paranormal engagement—they are not harmless curiosities; rather they are real and are dangerous manifestations of demons. Christians must completely abstain from all paranormal activity, whether ghost hunting, spirit communication, or participation in games that call upon the dead. These activities are not innocent fun; they are spiritual gateways that defy God's commands and invite danger into one's life.
