Remembrance of Ruling Elder Ernest E. Cutting past Synod Stated Clerk

During the Synod Executive report, Ruling Elder Elona Street-Stewart remembered the service of Ruling Elder Ernie Cutting to the Synod as the Synod Stated Clerk, serving in that role from 1993 – 2003. He passed away on March 26, 2023, at the age of 81. His memorial service was held on April 29, 2023, at his home congregation, Macalester Plymouth United Church, St. Paul, Minn. Ernie was active in the leadership of the PC(USA), on many levels, for more than 40 years. He was Moderator of the Presbytery of St. Paul during the merger of the St. Paul and Minneapolis Presbyteries.

Trauma Informed Ministry

Carrie Burke from LeaderWise spent Monday morning and Monday afternoon with us talking about “Trauma Informed Ministry.” She began by asking “What do we need to feel safe in a place?” and “What are signs/clues that a place is safe or unsafe?” She noted there is no hierarchy of trauma and people process it in very different ways. Trauma re-wires a person’s brain around issues of safety, which is the key to healing trauma. Recognizing that people who have experienced trauma will “seek safety all the time forever” is a key to trauma-informed ministry. **The Transforming Communities/Vital Leaders Committee will be sponsoring three follow up sessions with LeaderWise for the Synod to attend via Zoom on Thursdays, May 25, June 1, and June 15 from 1:30-3:30 p.m. (CDT). Reports

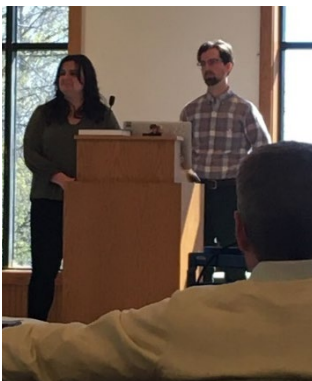
Commissioners heard reports from Ken Green of the [Board of Pensions](#). Ken noted that there will be news from the Board of Pensions in June about changes for January 2024 and that they were holding two conferences with mid-council leaders to discuss how to rebuild the plan to serve more congregations.

Standing Committee Reports

All five of the Synod Standing Committees reported.

Transforming Communities/Vital Leaders (TCVL) reported:

Synod School 2023 – July 23-28, registration is open. [Click here to view the PowerPoint](#).

Leadership Summit 2023 met in April in person and some virtual. 63 people from 15 of our presbyteries participated. The theme was Becoming a Trauma-Informed Church.

Art of Transitional Ministry training Week 2 was held online April 17-21.

Art of Transitional Ministry Week 1 training will be held online in October.

In partnership with the Communications Committee, scholarships are available for individuals and groups to attend the Stewardship Kaleidoscope Conference, September 25- 27 in Minneapolis, [click here for more information and to apply](#).

The Academy is a Commissioned Pastor training program sponsored by eight presbyteries. In July of 2022 five people completed the program; there are 19 in the current cohort.

The **Committee on Racial Ethnic Ministry (CREM)** reported on the annual Racial Ethnic Student Scholarships selected at the Fall meeting. The Racial Ethnic Student Scholarship Fund is an educational assistance program designed to encourage American Indian and students of color in their preparation for academic success in higher education. Application awards are based on personal achievement, financial need and recommendations from teachers and pastors. Funds for this program are provided by the Committee on Racial Ethnic Ministry.

Profile:

- 10 students were eligible for consideration and were awarded scholarships ranging from \$1000 to \$4000.
- Half are new students. One of these is our first to attend an HBCU - Morehouse College.
- The students identified as African American, Korean American, Sudanese, Black, Puerto Rican, Hispanic, and multiracial.
- They come from Des Moines, East Iowa, Missouri River Valley, and Twin Cities Area presbyteries and are enrolled in 6 colleges and universities, and 3 seminaries, across 6 states.

During the year, CREM corresponds with the students and provides devotional and other study materials.

CREM also approved institutional awards to 13 tribal colleges within the boundaries of the Synod.

CREM was a sponsor of the 2022 Overcoming Racism event, “The Power of Truth Telling.” This event draws a large audience of people from across our region.

The **Finance Committee** shared that the Synod had an operating surplus in 2022, but a deficit after value decreases in the investment portfolio. The goal of providing services and ministries to presbyteries and communities in equal measure to congregation and presbytery receipts was achieved for the year. Programs, services and ministries of \$745,000 were provided compared to \$731,000 in receipts for the year.

In November 2022, the **Communications Committee** offered a three-part webinar series led by Mark Sundby and Mary Kay DuChene of LeaderWise on the book *Pathways to Belonging* and the topic of loneliness.

The committee is partnering with the Transforming Communities/Vital Leaders Committee to offer scholarships to individuals and groups to attend the Stewardship Kaleidoscope Conference in September.

Plans are underway to offer an online face-to face event in the fall.

The **Personnel Committee** held annual conversations with individual synod staff in November and December 2022. The committee is developing resources and workshops for presbyteries and their personnel committees, with a focus on best practices, clarification of roles, and safe and equitable work environments.

Ernie practiced law focusing on family law, matters relating to non-profit organizations, and guardianships and conservatorships. Over the course of his career, as something of a personal ministry, he supported the quality of life and financial well-being of some 130 individuals entrusted to his care by Ramsey County Court. Ernie was known for his down-to-earth nature and dry sense of humor. He approached life with open congeniality and interest in people. He was unfailingly kind. Ernie is survived by his wife, their children, grandchildren, siblings, and extended family.

Presbyterian Women reported that The Justice & Peace Committee sponsored the book study “What Kind of Christianity” with the author Dr. Yoo. This book group began in our Synod and is offered Churchwide. The Native American Concerns Committee hosts a Native American book study open to anyone in the Synod. Two women from our Synod have been selected to attend the USA Mission Experience to the southern border in Arizona next October. Representatives will be available to speak throughout the Synod about their trip after their return. These women will be great resources to use as congregations and Presbyteries delve into immigration and border issues.
