I attended the Synod meeting in Farmington, Minn., and wouldn't you know, the workshop and worship were about trauma, grief and hurt! But it was OK because I was surrounded by this group of believers to lift me up. And I learned a lot about being a trauma-informed congregation and pastoral care provider. If you want to know more, contact me for resources.

I also gave a Synod PW report and am pleased to say the commissioners were impressed with all we do.

I am speaking at two Presbytery Spring Gatherings. If your PW is planning a retreat or gathering this year, I would love to be invited. It is a great way for me to meet your members.

The Synod Gathering committee is underway and starting to make plans. Look for updates in the coming months.

May 5 was National Day of Awareness for Missing & Murdered Indigenous Women, Girls, & Two-Spirit People. The 225th General Assembly [2022] passed a resolution on MMIWG2S directing the Presbyterian Mission Agency to advocate boldly for those who are missing and murdered and to equip Presbyterians to advocate for them as well. This is a huge problem in South Dakota and although law enforcement across the state claims we have very few cold cases, the reality is those missing women are written off as run aways and the cases closed. No one except family is even looking for them. Learn about what is happening in your state, write to your legislators, find out what you can do to work for justice for these people.

I invite you to assume a posture of prayer.

Mother God, we give you thanks for another day. We are grateful for a time set aside to honor motherhood. Earth's history has been formed by mothers like Mother Mary and Mother Theresa, surrogate and foster mothers, godmothers and fairy godmothers. We even acknowledge motherhood in nature with mother hens under the care of Mother Earth. Today we ask your acute attention upon all current, trying, and future mothers gathered here, one by one and name by name. You know their stories. You know their needs. Remove all sources of sorrow, scars and fear that they may live more fully into your promises.

For all current mothers, we pray that you surround them with abundant support. We pray for attentive partners and spouses, faithful worshiping communities and prompt support services.

We pray that each one would be equipped to expose the pain they carry, knowing that silent suffering is not a virtue. Help each to know that motherhood is a call and not only a result. Help us to call out abuse for them and with them for the enslavement that it is in all their forms, psychological, verbal, physical and otherwise.

For all trying mothers, we pray that each would embrace agency over their bodies. We pray against any person, situation or thought that would prevent the freedom to make decisions regarding their own bodies. We pray for mothers who have experienced miscarriages and other losses while waiting.

Finally, we pray for future mothers in our midst and everywhere. We pray your protection against violations to their bodies at parks, in churches, schools, homes, and places of work. We pray against any unhealthy notion that abuse is God's will.

We now call out the names of abused women aloud and in our hearts whose healing we seek from you... Amen.

Luverne, Minnesota: An Ecumenical Coffee was held on Wednesday, May 3, at the First Presbyterian Church in Luverne. There



were approximately 100 guests in attendance. The theme was **LET THERE BE PEACE**. Our program included lunch, prayer, scripture, music, a display of items from Ukraine, and our guest speaker, Pastor Jacob Danilko, with his emphasis on People of the Ukraine.

Pastor Jacob Danilko is currently the Administrative Pastor and Director of Sunday School at Light to the World Ukrainian Church of Sioux Falls. Pastor Jacob and his family have been in the United States now 23 years and together they have nine children. His son Kosta Danilko was Pastor Jacob's interpreter. The

topic for the breakfast was **Wounded Healers** and the scripture was **Matthew 11: 28**-

30. He spoke of the emotional toll on the soldiers, the widows and the medical personnel in Ukraine since the beginning of the war. His plea was for counselors and pastors to assist with the behavioral health issues. There was a freewill offering that will be sent to the Ukraine people through Pastor Jacob's contacts there.

Bdecan Presbyterian Church in partnership with the Bdecan Ministry Team has hired Chandra Anderson for the Ministries and Outreach Coordinator position. Chandra shared with the search committee that she felt called by Jesus, her Savior, to apply for this position. Chandra will start this position on May 1st. Rosie and Bob Helland will stay on till May 31st to help with training and transition.

Chandra, her fiancé, and 2 sons presently live in Grand Forks. They will not move to the manse until end of May when her sons finish the school year, but will work remotely and commute as needed to the church.

Chandra has helped out at Bdecan Food Pantry over the last 3 years and has occasionally attended Bdecan Church. Her children attended VBS last year at Bdecan. Chandra has developed a relationship with the people at Bdecan so is no stranger.

We are excited to have Chandra in this position and looking forward to her telling the Bdecan story and continuing the ministry and outreach that the Church and Ministry Team have built over the years. 

SCT COORDINATOR POSITIONS OPEN TO ALL PWP MODERATORS AND REPRESENTATIVES



In Chinese, the word for America, Mei Guo, translates directly to “beautiful country.” Yet when seven-year-old Qian arrives in New York City in 1994 full of curiosity, she is overwhelmed by crushing fear and scarcity. In China, Qian’s parents were professors; in America, her family is “illegal” and it will require all the determination and small joys they can muster to survive. 2023 Birthday Offering of Presbyterian Women recipients are:

Making Miracles Group Home, Tallahassee, Florida received \$150,000 to purchase a second group home to serve an additional five families who are at risk of experiencing homelessness. This one-year, live-in program is designed to support young mothers and help them develop skills to live independently and care for their children.

Berhane Yesus Elementary School, Dembi Dollo, Ethiopia received \$99,400 for the construction of a classroom for kindergarten students. The number of kindergarten students in this rural community has grown and the government requires separate space for these students in order to remain open.



Gather the Children Home (Emergency Foster Care)

Pine Ridge Reservation, Porcupine, South Dakota

Gather the Children Home is a culturally appropriate emergency foster care home for children ages birth through age 12. It provides a caring and immediate safe environment for children removed from their homes due to abuse or neglect, while a suitable foster or relatives home becomes available.

Items needed include: baby layettes, twin sheets and mattress pads, twin-sized tied-fleece blankets, crib sheets, towels and wash cloths. Also, ongoing financial support paying for monthly internet and phone expense or some other monthly expense. 


Dr. Susan LaFlesche Picotte Hospital Renovation Project

Working sewing machines, fabric, thread, scissors, quilting and sewing supplies can be used by Presbyterian Women at the various Dakota Presbytery churches.



Bdecan Presbyterian Church, the only Native American Presbyterian Church in North Dakota, is located on the Spirit Lake Reservation. An important way to “keep Christ’s love at our center” for the children is to host 6-12 member mission teams who would lead Vacation Bible School for a week during the summer. The 15-30 children in the community love VBS and never tire of learning about and experiencing God’s love, as well as participating in positive activities when few other activities exist for the children. The CSW is instrumental in promoting women's rights, documenting the reality of women's lives throughout the world, and shaping global standards on gender equality and the empowerment of women.

The PC(USA) has been engaged with gender justice at the United Nations since the early 1990s. In 2006, PW began mobilizing contingents of women from across the church to participate in CSW as part of a PC(USA) delegation, furthering our shared work for gender justice in the international community. Presbyterian Women received accreditation to the United Nations Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC) in 2018, thus strengthening the partnership between PW and the PC(USA) and enhancing Presbyterian visibility at the UN.

As UN Women explains, “The Commission on the Status of Women (CSW) is the principal global intergovernmental body exclusively dedicated to the promotion of gender equality and the empowerment of women.” Each annual session of the Commission focuses on a specific priority theme and a review theme. The focus of the 67th session of the Commission was: “Innovation and technological change, and education in the digital age for achieving gender equality and the empowerment of all women and girls.” The review theme was: “Challenge and opportunities in achieving gender equality and the empowerment of rural women and girls” (from the UN CSW website <https://www.unwomen.org/en/csw/csw67-2023>).

New York City — The 67th session of the Commission on the Status of Women (CSW67)— the UN’s largest annual gathering on gender equality, the empowerment of all women and girls and their human rights—successfully closed its two-week long session

today (6 to 17 March) with the acknowledgment of the critical role of technology and innovation in achieving gender equality. The agreed conclusions adopted by Member States provide a blueprint for all stakeholders, including governments, the private sector, civil society and youth to promote the full and equal participation and leadership of women and girls in the design, transformation and integration of digital technologies and innovation processes that fulfill the human rights and needs of women and girls.

At the conclusion of the negotiations, UN Women Executive Director, Sima Bahous, said: "This year's Agreed Conclusions are game-changing and bring forward our vision of a more equal and connected world for women and girls in all their diversity. It is our job, as we leave here today, to translate them into reality. The ultimate success of these Agreed Conclusions lies beyond their finalization today, in how we will collectively take them forward. They bring us a vision of a more equal world. Let us translate them into reality for all women and girls."

CSW67 reaffirmed the importance of women and girls' full, equal and meaningful participation and leadership in science, technology and innovation, and expressed concern on the limited progress in closing the gender gap in access to and use of technologies, connectivity, digital literacy and education. It also expressed grave concern about the continuity and interrelation between offline and online violence, harassment and discrimination against women and girls and condemned the increase of such acts.

The Commission called for significantly increased public and private sector investments to bridge the gender digital divide, more inclusive innovation eco-systems, and the promotion of safe and gender-responsive technology and innovation. It also called for inclusive and equitable quality education in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics, information and communications technology and digital literacy to ensure that all women and girls can thrive in a rapidly changing world.

Initiatives to promote innovation and technological change, and education in the digital age for achieving gender equality must consider the following:

- **Develop digital tools and services to address the needs of all women and girls**, across sectors and geographies, especially for their education, health, economic empowerment and engagement in public life, and ensure women and girls have access to digital literacy and skills throughout their life course.
- **Mainstream gender in digital policies to remove barriers to equal access** for all women and girls, including those living in poverty, in rural, maritime or remote areas, with disabilities, Indigenous women and girls, migrant women and girls, and older women.
- **Foster a policy of zero tolerance for gender-based violence that occurs through or is amplified by the use of technology** and ensure that public and private sector entities prioritize its prevention and elimination.
- **Mainstream a gender perspective in the design of emerging technologies** and adopt regulations to ensure they are subject to adequate safeguards to combat new risks, gender stereotypes and negative social norms, data privacy breaches and improve transparency and accountability.
- **Promote policies and programmes to achieve gender parity in emerging scientific and technological fields** and create supportive workplaces and education settings, including through gender-responsive education, distance learning solutions and interdisciplinary approaches combining the teaching of social sciences and scientific fields.
- **Develop gender-responsive innovation that challenges gender stereotypes and negative social norms**, including through the development of digital content, awareness campaigns and teaching competencies for positive engagement on digital technologies that engage, educate, encourage and empowers youth, including young men and boys, to become agents of change for gender equality.
