

What is it?

Tending the Soul is a program designed to train individuals in Spiritual Direction and Congregational Formation. "We define Christian spiritual direction as help given by one Christian to another which enables that person to pay attention to God's personal communication to him or her, to respond to this personally communicating God, to grow in intimacy with this God, and to live out the consequences of the relationship."—William

The two-year training program offers learning and formational experiences in classroom and small group settings. The training includes home-based reading and reflection, experiential learning, and attention to the practice of spiritual disciplines. Along with learning one-on-one soul care in a more formal spiritual direction setting, this training program moves participants toward a posture of spiritual direction within the wider context of the neighborhood of one's work, travel, and life in community.

Where and When?

All six training retreats will be held at Sky Lake Camp and Retreat Center in Windsor, NY (campsandretreats.org). Attendance is required at all six retreats. Retreats will be held on:

- November 11-14, 2019
- March 23-26, 2020
- April 17-20, 2020
- November 13-16, 2020
- March 15-18, 2021
- April 16-19, 2021

Why Tending the Soul?

In a world that seems driven by division and enmity, a world that seems busy, chaotic, distracted, do you seek to live your life in a closer relationship with God? Have you wondered lately...

- *"How do I listen deeply for God's invitation for my life, my ministry?"*
- *"How do I companion others as they seek to hear God's invitation for their lives?"*
- *"How do I find sacred spaces where I can hear God, where I can invite others to hear God?"*

Tending the Soul is designed to offer tools and space for discerning God's invitation for your life, to offer tools and practices for weaving an awareness of God's presence into all the ministries of a congregation. It teaches you to listen deeply, to be the non-anxious presence who can gently and prayerfully hold sacred space for others. It invites you into a ministry of healing and wholeness.

Who Can Apply?

Both lay and clergy persons from the Upper New York Conference as well as other United Methodist conferences are welcome to apply. There are no specific educational requirements, but those who apply should have an active, growing spiritual life, a deep love for all of God's people, an ability to embrace diversity, and strength in deep, purposeful listening. Participants should also be grounded in their own understanding of Jesus, God, and the Holy Spirit, and be able to allow space for others to come to their own relationship with the Divine. Spiritual direction with a trained director is required of all who enroll in the program. Applicants are expected to commit themselves to participation in all retreats, home-based work, and personal spiritual formation.

What Does It Cost?

The cost of the program is \$2400. A deposit of \$100 is due upon acceptance to the program. The first payment of \$700 is due November 1, 2019. The remaining two payments of \$800 each are due May 1, 2020 and February 1, 2021. Tuition covers six training retreats, food, and lodging. Books and other incidental costs are not included. Upper New York Conference clergy can access their Ministerial Education Funds to pay for tuition costs. Dr. Heidi Miller

Through her teaching, scholarship, and ministry, Dr. Heidi Miller focuses on bridge-building between academia and the church, and the church and the world. Her emphasis is in the area of missional spirituality and embodied worship practice. A graduate of Goshen College, Eastern Mennonite Seminary, and The Catholic University of America, she served as assistant professor of Christian Worship at Perkins School of Theology. She has taught at Duke Divinity School and is co-founder of the Neighborhood Seminary, a two-year program to empower laity for contextual mission. She is currently on the faculty at Pfeiffer University and serves as its director of the Master's in Practical Theology. She is a licensed minister of the Virginia Mennonite Conference and has served as a spiritual director and supervisor for more than 20 years. She and her husband live in intentional community in North Carolina.
