

Abraham Lincoln Hat Book

Directions

1. Cut two hats from black construction paper. These will be the book's cover.
2. Print story pages. Cut each page apart into three stories.
3. Print page of Lincoln's photo. Cut out individual photos.
4. Glue Lincoln's photo onto one hat. This will be the front of the book.
5. Place the stories between two black hats, the front and back covers of the book.
6. Staple the top of the hat making sure to catch the top of the story pages.

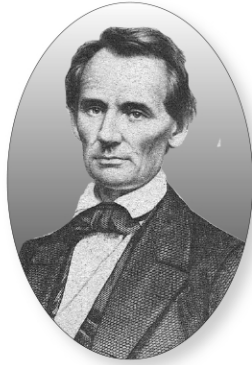

Abraham Lincoln was born on February 12, 1809. He lived in a log house. Abraham Lincoln wanted to learn. He read at home. He read while he worked. He read by the fire at night.



Abraham Lincoln wore a very tall hat. He put important papers in his hat. Abraham Lincoln wore a tall hat when he visited Kansas.

Abraham Lincoln was the first American president to wear a beard. And his beard had ties to Kansas. When Lincoln was campaigning for president he received a letter from 11-year-old Grace Bedell. "I have got four brothers and part of them will vote for you anyway and if you will let your whiskers grow I will try and get the rest of them to vote for you."



Grace wrote. "You would look a great deal better for your face is so thin ... All the ladies like whiskers and they would tease their husbands to vote for you and then you would be President."

Abraham Lincoln grew a beard and later was elected president. Grace went to watch President Lincoln give a speech and he asked to meet his "little correspondent." Lincoln gave Grace a kiss on the cheek and the crowd cheered.



At age 19, Grace married and moved with her husband to Osborne County, Kansas. Today, Grace's letter to Lincoln and his return letter to her are engraved on a monument in Delphos.

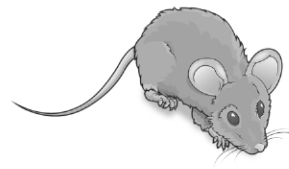
