For the Living of These Days

Dear Friends,

For many of us, this verse of Fosdick's hymn feels painfully apt right now. It is hard to live as Christians when the powers that be would have us believe that our neighbors are now our enemies. Closer to home, UPC—long a source of stability and permanence for us—is grappling with how to maintain an old building, grow its congregation, and keep its missions relevant to the community around it. We sense that this time is different, that this moment is critical, but it's hard to articulate why. And yet, the hymn reminds us that God stays by our side, even in the chaos. As Matt recently preached, God is still with us and isn't letting go.

So, what is the wisdom we need for "the living of these days"? How do we muster the courage to keep doing the work Christ calls us to do, both today and in the months ahead? How do we meet this moment, even when the future seems uncertain? For the five weeks of this devotional, we'll be asking ourselves that question: how do we—as disciples, as friends and family, as neighbors, and even as a whole church—how do we recommit ourselves to building-up the Kingdom of Heaven, even here and now? And we'll ask ourselves how we should commit our time and gifts to God so that the ministries of UPC can meet this strange and beautiful moment with the fullness of God's grace and glory.

To do that, we need you. We need your commitment to the life of this congregation, especially for this time. Obviously, we need your financial support to make our ministries possible: to sustain our staff, to grow our programs, to provide runway for the broad imagination of our Property Vision Team. But we also need your involvement and participation in our church ministries. If you can cook, clean, answer the phone, greet a stranger, organize a classroom, hold a note, or swing a hammer: we need you. If you've ever thought "I can help with that," know that now is a critical time to commit to UPC's mission.

So as you read and pray, be open to the ways you might be called. After five weeks of reflection, we'll publicly commit to discipleship and stewardship on November 23 and celebrate those commitments by sharing a meal with each other. Until then, may God's word and our own meditations serve us well for the facing of this hour.

Week of October 19: Living as disciples of Christ



He established a decree in Jacob, and appointed a law in Israel, which he commanded our ancestors to teach to their children; that the next generation might know them, the children yet unborn, and rise up and tell them to their children, so that they should set their hope in God, and not forget the works of God, but keep his commandments.

- What do these verses from scripture reveal about what discipleship?
- How should we prepare ourselves to follow Christ and preach his word?
- Scripture states that we should pass God's teachings on to future generations. How will we teach the next generation? What will we do to make God's word relevant to contemporary audiences?

Consider a commitment to . . .

- attend or teach Sunday School, Bible study, or Vacation Bible School
- serve on the Christian Formation committee
- sponsor a confirmand or help lead the youth

Commit your financial resources to help us . . .

- fund a part- or full-time Christian Formation director
- train our college students to lead and grow their ministry and outreach in West Campus

God, you made the world and ordained us to live as stewards of the earth. Yet our pride and vanity distract us, and our hatred and rancor threaten your precious creation. Call us again to be your disciples, to set the captives free, to end war and cultivate the earth instead, so that we can feed the hungry, serve the poor, and house the homeless rather than feed our own desires. Call us to serve You, to act out the faith we profess, and to proclaim your love to a world that desperately needs to hear it. As stewards of that faith, equip us for the mission of restoring peace and harmony to the world that You created. Amen.

Week of October 26: Living as Friends and Family



Therefore encourage one another and build each other up, just as in fact you are doing.

- How will we support each other, even when we disagree?
- How will we make amends when we hurt each other?

Consider a commitment to . . .

- pray daily for our congregation and the larger world
- introduce yourself to people in the congregation you don't know or contact someone whom you haven't seen in a while
- "adopt" a college student
- attend a church retreat or fellowship opportunity
- serve as a deacon or join one of the church's support groups

Commit your financial resources to help us . . .

- fund staff support to track Covenant Care Partners needs
- fund a part-time Communications and Social Media position

As you console me in times of need, teach me to likewise console others;

As you forgive my wrongdoing, give me grace to forgive those who've wronged me,

Week of November 2: Living in Community

Consider a commitment to . . .

- get to know and work more closely with UKirk students (provide dinner, help with planning for UKirk Sunday)
- assist our staff in reaching out and connecting with the West Campus neighborhood and identifying new areas of need or service
- volunteer for UPLift, Micah 6, Habitat for Humanity, or the Border Mission Trip

Commit your financial resources to help us . . .

support new and existing ministries that serve our neighbors such as UPLift, Micah 6,
 the Border Mission Trip, Habitat for Humanity, and pastoral care for students

Prayer: (Adapted from "Come! Live in the Light!" by David Haas) Dear God.

You call us to act with justice and walk humbly with you. You call us to love tenderly and serve one another. You call us to be hope for the hopeless and light for the kingdom. Teach us to open our hearts and to live in the light. Equip us to shine with joy and shower our love upon our neighbors. Amen.

Week of November 9: Living into the Church



Pay careful attention to yourselves and to all the flock, in which the Holy Spirit has made you overseers, to care for the church of God, which he obtained with his own blood.

- How do we think God wants us to reimagine our ministry and mission to keep them relevant?

Consider a commitment to . . .

- attend Property Vision Team events to discern the church's long-term vision and mission
- volunteer to help maintain the church building and grounds
- serve on the Finance, Staff and Strategy, or Stewardship committees

Commit your financial resources to help us . . .

 cover the staff and operational expenses of the church to provide cost-of-living increases for full-time staff, extend Allen's contract, and defray the costs of the Property Vision expenses

Prayer: "Jesus, With Thy Church Abide" by Thomas Benson Pollock

- participate in worship as a lay leader (set up/serve/clean up communion, lead the congregation in music)
- be active in this church's efforts to address social injustice

Commit your financial resources to help us . . .

- support new and ongoing social outreach and programming at UPC
- celebrate Juneteenth with our neighbors in West Campus
- add banned books to our church library
- provide honorariums to speakers who educate the congregation on Christian Nationalism and other social justice topics
