WEEKLY MILESTONES

Take a moment to tell or think about a recent mountain high and/or valley low in your life.

CARING CONVERSATIONS



Discuss in your home, small group, or use for personal reflections:

- What are things you learned during your childhood that have helped you?
- Who taught you about the Christian faith and what do you remember about them?

DEVOTIONS



Read: 2 Timothy 3:14-4:5.

In this reading, Paul mentors Timothy and reminds him of the people who taught him the faith. Timothy's faith began during his childhood. Earlier in the book of 2 Timothy 1:5, Paul affirmed Timothy's "sincere faith, a faith that lived first in your grandmother Lois and your mother Eunice." Timothy's faith was nurtured through personal, trusted relationships. The faith is inspired by God through scripture, holy words used as a guide "for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness" (3:16). The motivation for this review of the Christian faith is that Paul notes that there will be a time when the basics of the faith will be misused, and people will seek out messages that suit their own passions. There is a need for courage to speak and to correct with patient endurance rather than take the easier route of being silent. The confidence to speak out and confront a false message comes from the God-given inspiration of scripture and the confirmation of the faith that Timothy has received from Paul, Lois, Eunice, and other trusted voices.

Discuss: When do you have or do not have confidence to speak of the Christian faith?

Pray: O God, our guide and teacher, strengthen our faith with patient endurance so that our lives may be comforted, and others may know the love of Christ, our Savior and Lord. Amen.

SERVICE



Jesus calls us to serve our neighbor in love. Based on the Daily Bible Readings and theme for this week, who do you know that you could talk to about the Christian faith?

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS



In Genesis 32:28 God changes Jacob's name to Israel which means, "you have striven with God and with humans and have prevailed." We don't often see our lives of faith as wrestling with God, yet that is exactly what God honors and expects from us. Question God in your prayers, asking, "Lord, how come . . . ?" Let this questioning of God's intent be an example of building a strong and trusting relationship with God.

Pray: God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, thank you for honoring our wrestling with you as faithful followers, through Christ our Lord, amen.

WEEKLY MILESTONES

CARING CONVERSATIONS



Discuss in your home, small group, or use for personal reflections:

- When is a time you or someone you know felt that life was in turmoil?
- How does a relationship with God strengthen us?

DEVOTIONS



Read: Psalm 46.

During the Reformation, Luther used this psalm for his famous hymn A Mighty Fortress Is Our God. The Psalm and that hymn remind us that when church, society, and our lives are in turmoil, God is still our security and strength. Our lives are more fragile than we would often like to admit. A structurally sound home is flattened by a storm. A loved one dies suddenly. A pandemic turns our world upside down. One nation invades another nation and shatters global security. These are the kinds of issues at the heart of Psalm 46. When stability is gone, God is still present and working for good. When we feel anxiety during the storms of life, we can be assured as we hear, "Be still and know that I am God" (v. 10a). In the end, God alone stands triumphant and glorious. We live confident that we are secure in God's almighty presence through Christ Jesus our Lord.

Discuss: What challenges in your life help you find comfort through Psalm 46?

Pray: Almighty and merciful God, while storms and strife surround us, give us peace and confidence in your power and glory through Christ Jesus our Savior and Lord. Amen.

SERVICE



Jesus calls us to serve our neighbor in love. Based on the Daily Bible Readings and theme for this week, how can you reach out to someone who feels their life is in turmoil?

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS



Martin Luther wrote the Small Catechism for the head of the household to teach to the members of the household. There is a daily morning and evening blessing that includes making the physical sign of the cross. As a reminder of the Reformation, add this ritual to your mornings and evenings. As you make the sign of the cross on your chest or forehead, say:

God the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit watch over me. Amen. (Luther's Small Catechism)

CARING CONVERSATIONS



Discuss in your home, small group, or use for personal reflections:

- What brings you comfort when you are sad or grieving?
- How does faith in God comfort those who are sad or grieving?

DEVOTIONS



Read: Luke 6:20-31.

In this reading, Jesus says, "Blessed are you who weep now, for you will laugh." (v.21) Jesus' promise that laughter will come to those who weep and grieve puts our lives into perspective. It can be hard to laugh when a loved one has died. And yet, even at funerals, we can share laughter while at the same time expressing deep grief. Telling personal stories of triumphs and human shortcomings and everything in between can remind us of our common humanity, our mortality, and our need for faith and hope. All Saints Sunday reminds us of our faith that gives us hope that our joy will be restored. It frees us to see opportunities in our lives not only to laugh but to love, to do good to others, even our enemies (v. 27). The final verse for the reading is the golden rule: "Do to others as you would have them do to you" (v. 31). Remembering loved ones in faith reminds us that our lives are meant for joy and laughter and love that will not end.

Discuss: What memory of a loved one who has died brings you laughter and joy?

Pray: Almighty God, you know our sense of loss and grief is real; let us hear again and again your promise of life everlasting that we may have laughter and joy through Christ Jesus.

Amen.



CARING CONVERSATIONS



Discuss in your home, small group, or use for personal reflections:

- When is a time someone defended you when you were being treated unfairly?
- How can the God of justice and mercy help you during unfair experiences?

DEVOTIONS



Read: Job 19:23-27a.

This reading can be difficult to understand without some background information. The first two chapters of the book of Job describe Job as patient. For the rest of the book, Job enters a defiant stance claiming his innocence and wanting to argue his innocence before God. Job challenges the typical understandings of God that claim he must have done something wrong to suffer as he does. God acknowledges that Job is justified for challenging God, even if Job as a human being cannot grasp the ways of God. In the end he accepts this. The beauty of chapter 19 is Job's unwillingness to give up or give in to accusations of his guilt. Thank God for Job's willingness to challenge established wisdom about God. It is in that spirit that the church over the centuries has sung the words, "I know that my Redeemer lives" (v. 25). We see in Jesus the champion that Job longed for and the one who would take up Job's defense.

Discuss: When you experience suffering, what questions do you have about God? Pray: God of justice and mercy, thank you for accepting our questions and doubts and giving us the confidence of the resurrection through Jesus Christ, our Redeemer and Lord. Amen.

SERVICE



Jesus calls us to serve our neighbor in love. Based on the Daily Bible Readings and theme for this week, how can you help someone who is suffering?

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS



Jesus tells the Sadducees that life after death is different. Think or talk about this difference through the lens of a caterpillar when it changes into a butterfly. They are the same animal even though the stages of life are different. We do not know what life will be like after death. Jesus tells us it will be different, and we will be with God. Read this verse and then take a moment to think what the words mean to you: "Now he is God not of the dead, but of the living; for to him all of them are alive" (Luke 20:38).

- How can faith in Jesus get you through tough times?

DEVOTIONS



Read: Luke 21:5-19.

This reading in Luke uses apocalyptic language, meaning it has a focus on the end times and worldwide struggles. Jesus tells his followers not to guess when the end times will come. Disasters and tragedies have happened and continue to happen around the world. When such times come and people experience major crises in their lives, it is good to know that "not a hair of your head will perish" (v. 18). For those who witness to their faith during times of crisis, it is also helpful to know that Jesus will provide the words and the wisdom. While we may anticipate difficult times, we are not to be led astray and worship that which is not eternal, even a beautiful temple like the one in Jerusalem. We are not to speculate about when the end will come or to follow false saviors. Life can be scary and difficult. We need to hold on to Jesus and his promise to hold on to us to the end.

Discuss: What are some disasters or tragedies happening in today's world? How can faith in Jesus help us endure such times?

Pray: Almighty God, when wars, earthquakes, and other scary things happen, help us to lean on you alone and trust your eternal care through Jesus Christ our Savior. Amen.

SERVICE



Jesus calls us to serve our neighbor in love. Based on the Daily Bible Readings and theme for this week, how can you support those who are facing a natural disaster?

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS



Psalm 98 calls on all the earth to make a joyful noise. Take a walk outside and look at God's creation around you. When you return home, draw a picture or write a list of things you saw. Then make up your own tune to use as you sing these words: *O sing to the Lord a new song, for he has done marvelous things.*

DEVOTIONS



Read: Jeremiah 22:3-17 and 23:1-6.

In the Old Testament, kings were referred to as shepherds because of their task to care for the sheep, the people. To understand how the kings (the shepherds) had failed God's task for them, it is helpful to read Jeremiah 22:3-17. The kings had not protected those most prone to abuse in society, that is, foreigners, widows, and orphans. The kings had gained extreme wealth by underpaying the poor and they had blood on their hands for not showing compassion for the needy and the poor. The reading from Jeremiah 23:1-6 announces God's rule on earth. On Christ the King Sunday, we are reminded that Jesus is the "righteous Branch" raised up by God to rule all the earth wisely and to "execute justice and righteousness in the land" (23:5). Jesus' reign is seen from the cross where injustice, pain, and death are overcome by God's eternal reign of justice, mercy, and life forevermore.

Discuss: What is the difference between an earthly king and Christ the King?

Pray: Almighty God, you who expect care for widows and orphans, give us courage and faith to trust in your heavenly powers and serve others through Christ, our Lord and King. Amen.

SERVICE



Jesus calls us to serve our neighbor in love. Based on the Daily Bible Readings and theme for this week, how can you support someone who is struggling?

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS



Christ the King Sunday is the last Sunday in the church year. Advent, the next Sunday, is the beginning of the new church year. Think about or make a list of how you were involved in the congregation's ministries in the last year. What were some highlights? How did you grow in your faith? Who did you get to know better? Think or talk about how you might be involved in the coming church year.

Pray: Dear God, we ask that you work in and through our faith community as together we continue to grow in our faith. Through our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Amen.
