






Child Care Aware of NH will be offering participants an **option to purchase a bag lunch for \$5.00**. Check out the lunch section of the brochure on page 13 for more details.


No Small Matter: Film Screening and Discussion

Our future depends on our youngest children - on the words they hear in their first months of life, on the loving arms that hold them, on the kinds of experiences they have. But even with widespread support for high-quality, affordable, accessible early childhood education, millions of American children are still not getting the care they need to thrive and succeed. **“No Small Matter” is a documentary film that brings public attention to this vital question by sharing powerful stories and stunning truths about the human capacity for early learning and the potential for quality early care and education to benefit America’s social and economic future.** Lynette M. Teaching from the Child's Perspective is an interactive workshop that provides basic information about the uses of ongoing observation as part of enhancing and developing an approach to formative assessment in the classroom. When we understand what children are thinking, feeling and experiencing, we can develop intentional teaching strategies that enhance classroom practice and learning environments. Breathe New Hampshire's Asthma Care for Kids™ program is helping child care providers, teachers, parents and coaches to better understand asthma. This workshop is an "Asthma 101" presentation for adults who work with children or young people. The program helps participants learn about the basics of asthma, such as what it is and what causes it, asthma triggers and how to avoid or reduce them, how indoor air affects our breathing, common myths about asthma, how to recognize asthma warning signs, how best to manage the disease, asthma medicines and what they do. The program also provides practical tips, handouts, education materials and resources for maintaining a healthy breathing environment for all children - in a child care setting, at school, or in the home.

Childhood Lead Poisoning in NH: What Early Childhood Educators Need to Know

Each year close to 1,000 children in New Hampshire are poisoned by lead and experience blood levels known to impair cognitive development. Lead poisoning in New Hampshire and the effects that even low-level lead exposure have on the brain's learning systems will be provided from numerous studies. Early Childhood Educators will develop an understanding of lead's "neurobehavioral signature" which can create significant negative impact on: cognitive ability, speech and language, hearing, visual-spatial skills, attention, impulse control, social behaviors, emotional regulation and motor skills. The impact of lead poisoning is irreversible and can cause a life-time of consequences. The training will provide information about educational interventions for young children affected by lead and the importance of having results of required lead screening documented on school health forms.

Learn more about the Period of PURPLE Crying so that you can support the parents of infants with whom you interact. This presentation will increase your awareness about this developmental stage of increased crying, ways to cope with it and the dangers of reacting to the crying in frustration. Parents of 96% of the babies born in NH are learning about PURPLE Crying when they give birth. If you work with these families you need to know about it too! New Hampshire Children's Trust leads the effort to bring information about the Period of PURPLE Crying to parents by providing technical assistance to hospitals to implement the program, supporting community based providers in reinforcing the program's message and spreading the word through coordinating public awareness. The program employs a triple dose strategy to introduce, reinforce and promote the messages of the program. A question and answer period has been added for informational purposes.




Empowering Infants and Toddlers with the Gift of Sign


