

Using Data to Improve Quality: A Bootcamp for Early Education Leaders

At the Zaentz Professional Learning Academy, we recognize the power of collaborative learning. We understand that when people come together to gain and act upon new knowledge related to their professional work and challenges, effective solutions can emerge. This approach has exciting implications for the work of early education teams.

What will the institute cover?

During this one-day, job-embedded professional learning opportunity, participants will learn about today's data landscape as well as the ways in which they can improve the links between data collection and children's early learning and development.

Program learning objectives:

- Explore the data collection landscape in settings serving young learners.
- Review key types of information to gather in the domains of behavior management, social-emotional learning, and language and literacy.
- Learn effective data analysis and data-use practices related to behavior management, social-emotional, and language and literacy domains.
- Explore practices that foster data-use mindsets among educators and improve leadership and learning communities.

Who should apply?

This professional learning opportunity is designed for working professionals in early education settings across the United States. We encourage individuals serving as principals, coaches, teacher leaders, and in other leadership or educator support roles to apply.

What constitutes a team?

Teams are made up of early education leaders and the professionals who support early education in their setting. For example, a district team may include several principals, early education coaches, teacher leaders, and the district's mental health consultants. What is the cost?

Special team pricing is offered for teams made up of 10 or more individuals. For single participants who wish to register for the institute on an individual basis – or for those who are registering in a team with fewer than ten members – the fee is \$149 per person.
