

ATELIER CAFE | Biophilia

Located inside the art and design building, the Atelier Cafe provides a conducive gathering environment for students and faculty to unwind and connect without the need to travel all the way across to the campus cafeteria. Food has always been one of the central elements that promotes gathering of people. The presence of a cafe in the Art and Design building acts as a meeting point for students and faculty and provides opportunity for interdisciplinary conversations that is currently lacking between individuals of different expertise. Biophilic elements including natural features, materials, and daylighting are incorporated to promote human-nature connection and regulation of circadian rhythm.




CA 210 INTERIOR DESIGN STUDIO


Inspired by the issues faced by current students, the studio is reconfigured into three primary areas including the computer lab, conference room, resource room. The studio is designed to incorporate state-of-the-art technologies to accommodate for the evolving technological advancement of the design industry. Acoustic ceiling treatment is installed to reduce noises produced by existing exposed HVAC systems. Conference room within the studio is designed to allow for collaboration and group discussions among peers and conducting of class project presentations.



MAKERSPACE

Acknowledging the technological development the art and design industry, the Art & Design makerspace is programmed with sophisticated technologies and equipments such as interactive virtual reality room, hologram projection tables, and CNC machines to extend the possibilities of art and design beyond traditional means, elevate the experience of 3-dimensional visualization, and better equip students with the essential knowledge to bring ideas to life as future creators of the industry.

1 ADMIN OFFICES & SUPPORT SPACES

Private offices and copy/filing area in a U-configuration that cradles the Flex Space. Steelcase VIA panels provide acoustic privacy, and mid-height window panes allow veterans to maintain sight lines outside of the space while inside.

2 FLEX SPACE

Private space for individual and small-group counseling; is flanked by 3 walls with the option of being open or closed with a privacy screen, supporting the needs of veterans' and those with PTSD for situational awareness of their surroundings.

3 ACCESSIBLE RESTROOMS

This space is provided with 2 gender neutral and one and 1 family restroom.

4 LACTATION ROOM

Private space for new mothers to relax and have all the supplies necessary to carry out a pumping session.

5 PUBLIC SPACE

Collaborative space for residents and visitors. Curved sofa arrangement around the columns encourages a supportive place for people to talk and interact. Other varied seating offers one-on-one space for private conversations.

6 MULTIPURPOSE SPACE

This space serves for group activities as well as a space for guest speakers, classes, and workshops.

7 JANITOR'S CLOSET

For maintenance of the public spaces.

8 DINING AREA

This area incorporates a warm color scheme to help improve appetite. Roll-up door with clear glazing allows greater flexibility for indoor and outdoor dining options, as well as bringing natural ventilation indoors.

9 RECEPTION

Reception, waiting area, and lounge area.

10 PATIO

The curving design of the patio is made to look like a tree to symbolize life and growth.

11 EXERCISE


Within this space veterans will have a direct and positive impact on their health into the future when exercising.

12 INTERIOR FACADE

Designed as a corridor of integrated activities.

DESIGN STATEMENT

Located in the Cultural Arts District of downtown Fresno, FRNTR (Frontier) is a residential community for veterans that is designed to cultivate cathartic experiences through bonding with others who have shared histories, as well as encouraging veterans to reconnect with friends, family, and the surrounding community. Interior finishes reflect earthy tones and textures, while also integrating lasting infectious-control materials considering the COVID-19 pandemic. Natural light streaming in through the warehouse windows and skylights illuminate the open floor plan and corridors, which attunes to veterans' needs for openness for maintaining sight lines and orientation. Organic forms are a recurring theme throughout the design, from the suspended acoustical installations to the curvilinear lines delineating spaces. FRNTR is designed to support veterans' needs and experiences, as well as improving social cohesion and forming lasting relationships.



ADMIN OFFICES & FLEX SPACE

In the spirit of fostering social sustainability, the space incorporates multiple public spaces spread evenly throughout the building programmed to help build neighborhood connections, encourage social interactions and community cohesion in the veterans community. A wide variety of amenities are available to individuals living in the veteran residential building on the foundation of recreational therapy and creative therapy. Adopting the notion of creative art therapies as part of the Veterans Health Administration (VHA) Recreation Therapy Service, the Frontier Veterans Residence aims to promote wellness and rehabilitation through exercise, art, dance and movement, drama, and music therapies. Recreation and the creative arts offer a holistic approach to physical, mental, and emotional well-being, improve physical rehabilitation and skill development.

LIVING AREA

DESIGN STATEMENT

Located at Lake Tahoe, the Luna is a 5-suites guesthouse that welcomes visitors to relax from formal roles of life. Inspired by the five elements of **earth, water, fire, wind, and air** as five essential elements of life, the villa incorporates a reflecting pool in a courtyard, a fireplace, and ample amount of fenestrations that welcome natural daylight and ventilation. The villa is designed in a continuous u-shaped spatial configuration resembling the trails of forest with an open floor plan to promote social interactions and human connections vital in the era of digitalization. The bedroom opens itself to the boundless view of Lake Tahoe amidst the surrounding forest. Natural materials and neutral palette are utilized throughout the design as it invites visitors to reflect and reconnect with nature.



- Increases the possibility of Internet bypasses






- Advocate **simultaneous growth** of both genders towards the same direction and goal.
