Lion Charles became a Lion in 1966 joining the Lancaster Lions Club. He transferred to the Greer Club in 1979. Lion Charles took up a hobby of making furniture for his wife and family. One day he was looking through a magazine and saw a wooden train. He told his wife I think I can make a better train. So the story begins, Charles has been making trains for family and friends for years. He has never sold one, these works of love are to only be given away as acts of kindness.

Each of the 12 to 15 sets Lion Charles makes contain an engine and 5 cars as an average set, but his wife has many more cars in her set. While living in the Lancaster area he made a larger set and it was donated to the Children Hospital in Rock Hill, S. C. Now Lion Charles donate these sets to Greer Community Ministries, Greer Relief, and The Greer Soup Kitchen.

A set of trains takes approximately 15 to 20 hours each to make with a value of \$75 to \$100 each. Lion Charles at 84 years young is hard at work in his workshop making this year's batch for 2019 Christmas. **The Greer Lion Club** is honored to recognize one of our hard working unsung heroes with the spirit of Christmas flowing through him during each month of the year.

Restructuring of the GAT format

Dear Global Action Team,

After accepting the role of GAT chairperson, I initiated a thorough review of the GAT in its current framework, and I have proposed several recommendations to the international board of directors. I believe that these recommendations will better position the GAT to support the goals of our districts. And if districts are successful in reaching their goals, this will have a positive effect on our clubs as well. These recommendations were taken up at the most recent meeting of the board in April, and I am happy to report that the 2019-2020 GAT operational plan and recommended changes were approved and will be effective July 1, 2019.

With that being said, this plan has a few significant changes for next fiscal year that I would like to go over with you now.

1. It was approved to discontinue the current three-year term and positions for vice chairpersons, CA leaders, vice CA leaders, and area leaders. I appreciate the current leaders in these positions and hope their support will continue.

2. Additionally, the board approved the creation of the following new positions: GAT constitutional area leader, GAT regional area leader (OSEAL), and GAT area leaders, all of which will be annual appointments. To emphasize the one-team approach, GST, GMT and GLT positions will no longer exist at the CA and area level. Instead, there will be one GAT leader in this role.

In consultation with the executive officers, GAT constitutional and regional area leaders were identified, and appointments were made in April. These Lion leaders have demonstrated the ability to empower Lions to achieve personal and collective goals. [Link to the leaders who have accepted these roles for the 2019-2020 year](#):

Since their appointments, I have been working directly with each leader as they envision and plan out their action plans and goals for the coming year. A major part of these plans were the selection and appointment of the GAT area leaders for their CAs. GAT area leaders will work closely with the multiple district and district coordinators in providing support and resources to support the goals set forth by the districts.

GAT Focus and Approach for 2019-2020

We will all work as one and focus on empowering the district governors in achieving their goals. We will accomplish this by creating a unified approach to all key areas of Lions. With the governors' goals at the forefront, the GAT is uniquely positioned from constitutional area to club level to help foster positive membership growth in clubs, increase Lions' visibility in the community through impactful service, and build strong and innovative leaders in the districts. The GAT network of leaders directly supports district governors in inspiring action at the club level. We will achieve this by focusing on the following four areas:

1. Support our districts in an effort to achieve their annual goals and monitor progress towards these goals. The district governor is the chairperson of the GAT. And the district GAT coordinators will work closely with their chairperson to ensure that these annual goals are reached.

2. Reinforce club-level communications through the zone chairs. Zone chairs will provide initiatives, resources and suggested activities for clubs to grow in membership to serve more people in their communities. The zone chairs are our direct connections to the clubs. Time to empower them!

3. Inform LCI divisions by providing information to and from Lions in the field. We have a real opportunity to support the development and roll out of effective tools and resources.

4. Collect and share club and district success stories. The Global Action Team message is best shared through storytelling—stories that focus on a one-team approach and highlight how each pillar of the team contributes to the others. These stories will inform and inspire Lions to engage their local Global Action Team as they plan and implement activities.

As I told the district governor-elects when I addressed them in February, and will be reinforcing when I speak to them again at convention in Milan, the GAT exists when the clubs are in motion. And like gears in a machine, clubs that are active and in motion turn the gears of our districts. And active districts drive our organization.

Speaking of convention, I hope to see you there. Make sure to attend the GAT Seminar on July 8, 2019 at 1:30 p.m., and stop by the GAT Booth. I will be spending time there meeting with Lions to discuss how they can get involved with their local GAT, and help clubs activate the gears that turn our great organization!

Keep up the outstanding work and let's finish this year strong!

Council Chair's Update

And the system he inherited and built on from a long list of dynamic and highly dedicated Council Chairs. The pressure exists to keep up the progress; such appears to be an uphill challenge.

How do we as a statewide team meet this challenge and again post a spectacular South Carolina Lions fiscal year? To me the answer is simple. Our team continues to work together to advance our cause---serving others in our community and world.

Will there be tough challenges? Sure. They always are. But, together, as a cohesive team of dedicated volunteers, we have the potential to meet any challenge, be it leadership, membership, service, fundraising, or whatever pops up to impede our growth and development and overall successes. You know we are the world's largest (and, in my opinion, best) volunteer service organization.

Already there are multiple training opportunities on the drawing board. And we have a strong slate of proven leaders and innovators for our coaches and key players this year. But, in my again humble opinion, every Lion in MD 32 is a key player, you included.

So, the question is, how can you serve our team? That service starts at the club level where competent and committed leaders are tantamount to building a successful, service-oriented club. That's where our new leaders emerge and progress to zone, district, multiple district, and even international roles. But it all begins at the club level, where, actually, we all are. It has been pointed out that we are not members of Lions International—there is no such thing. We are all members of a local Lions club. That is where the action begins.

As we jump start a new Lions year, with many new club leaders and new team members on every level, there are some changes I want to point out.

This year we are embellishing club development—building new clubs and revitalizing older and too often struggling clubs. PDG Edwina Otto has graciously accepted an invitation to serve as our **Multiple District Club Development Team Coordinator** this year. As such, she and her team will focus on identifying unserved or underserved areas in our state where it would be ideal to found a new club. Her team will also interface with District C First Vice District Governor Bill Hahn as he and his team develop an ambassador program to provide leadership assistance to struggling clubs, especially clubs with declining membership which have dropped to less than 15 to 20 active members. **Lion Bill has dubbed this developing idea as THUD**, an acronym for his highly potential concept of club development. Stay tuned for more on this as it progresses over the next year or two. Also, PCC Joe Pitts and VCC Rhett Hair recently conducted a useful session on club development which was well-attended and well-received.

This is all to illustrate that we have ongoing opportunities to address the challenges we face. And we certainly have the resources to help us remedy our needs. Furthermore, we have plans in place to continue the myriad services our MD 32 Lions Clubs have fostered since our Columbia Lions Club was chartered in 1922.

What's your job? Serve where you are. Seek out new opportunities to grow as a Lion, as an integral member of the world's largest volunteer service organization. Follow Lion Bill Hahn's example and think outside the box. Or follow Lion Edwina's example to step up to a new challenge. Identify an area which needs a Lions Club, and contact Lion Edwina so our team can assist. Follow THUD developments and see where you might collaborate. Bring a friend, relative, colleague to your next local Lions Club's meeting or, better yet, next service activity. That's how we build our clubs.

Thanks for all you are doing and will be doing. **We have giant footprints to follow.**






