

Rev. Brian Barlow, with over 20 plus years ministering to the sexually and relationally broken, addresses the necessity of keeping a clear gospel when walking alongside individuals who identify as LGBTQ+ and those who desire freedom in Christ. His personal journey out of a disfigured life is a testimony to Ephesians 3:20. God in His mercy continues to do more than Brian and this world could imagine. He married his bride, Nichole, in 2012, and together they are raising their four sons ages 10, 8, 4, and 2.5 months. In addition to pastoring, Rev. Barlow serves with many local and national ministries, including Lutherans For Life, Y4Life, and LINC-LA. Pastor Barlow is invited often to share his story and give hope to both large and small venues across the United States.



Michelle Bauman joined the Lutherans For Life team on June 1, 2019. She earned her Lutheran teaching degree in secondary education from Concordia Nebraska in 1998 and a master's degree in English from the University of Indianapolis in 2011. Before joining Lutherans For Life, Michelle taught middle school English from 1998 to 2002 at Holy Cross Lutheran School in Fort Wayne, Indiana, and English, Drama, and Speech at Trinity Lutheran High School in Seymour, Indiana, from 2002 to 2019. Michelle also served as Trinity's Recruitment Director from 2004 to 2017. She lives in Columbus, Indiana, with her husband, Pastor Doug Bauman, and two sons, Nathaniel and Simeon, and attends St. Paul Lutheran Church, Clifty, where her husband serves as pastor.



Rev. Mark Chavez is passionate about proclaiming the Gospel of Jesus Christ. There is no life apart from Jesus. His ministry is all about focusing on Jesus so everyone, including him, is drawn to Jesus in love, faith, and obedience. He thoroughly enjoys preaching and leading worship and Bible studies. Since all who are baptized into Christ are called to be His disciples, Mark is also passionate about nurturing discipling relationships. He began serving Reformation Lutheran Church in Lancaster, Pennsylvania, in May 2021. He served 21 years outside the parish, ten years most recently as General Secretary of the North American Lutheran Church (NALC), and prior to that as director for Lutheran renewing and confessing movements. He served congregations in Maryland and Pennsylvania for 12 years at the start of his ministry. He tried, unsuccessfully, running away from the call to ordained ministry by attending the USAF Academy in 1972. After graduation and commissioning in 1976, he studied for two years at Queen's College, Oxford University, UK. He then served on a briefing team that made presentations on the Soviet Union at Air Force bases worldwide. God had his way with Mark, so he resigned his Air Force commission in 1983 to attend Luther

Northwestern Theological Seminary in St. Paul, Minnesota. He was ordained on All Saints Day in 1987. While in the Air Force, he met his wife, Jocelyn, and they married in September 1980. They were blessed with six children. Their youngest child, Kevin, was killed in 2013. Jocelyn was diagnosed with a rare, progressive neurological condition in 2012 and died peacefully in Jesus in March 2017. Mark has eleven grandchildren. Eight of his grandchildren live within five minutes of his home. Being a grandpa is one of his most important and joyful vocations. Mark grew up in Colorado and California. Most of his family now lives near Spokane, Washington. In the winter he skis with his family out west. The rest of the year he enjoys playing golf with his sons and sons-in-law and tending to his vegetable garden.



Sheryl W. DeWitt is the co-founder and Executive Director of Redeeming Life Outreach Ministries, which operates residential maternity homes and a transitional living home for single pregnant and post-partum women in crisis. With a professional background in the insurance and TPA industry, founding Redeeming Life was more about her life passion than her career development. Sheryl, along with her husband, Rev. Edward DeWitt, dreamed for over 25 years of opening a home for women in crisis pregnancies who were at risk of aborting their unborn child. That dream became a reality in November 2013 with the opening of The Southward House, a comprehensive

program and residential option for women who want to choose life for their child but lack the resources necessary to do so. In August 2018 Redeeming Life celebrated the opening of phase two of ministry, a transitional home, which offers graduates of the maternity home program continued stabilization and residential services. In late 2023 the first major expansion of the ministry is the scheduled opening of a maternity home in Chicagoland, specifically East Dundee, Illinois. Sheryl is passionate about offering positive, life-saving options to at-risk women and children. Sheryl and Rev. DeWitt have been married for 42 years and together raised three children. In addition to finding great joy in serving the women and babies of Redeeming Life, Sheryl is a dedicated and doting grandmother of three.



Patricia Engler is a Christian apologetics speaker, author, and podcast host for Answers in Genesis (AiG). After 12 years of homeschool and a B.Sc. degree, she backpacked 360° around the world in 180 days, documenting how Christian students keep their faith at university. The top takeaways from this research are available in Patricia's book, *Prepare to Thrive: A Survival Guide for Christian Students*. A series of "God stories" resulted in Patricia joining AiG-Canada as a speaker, writer, and youth outreach coordinator before transferring to AiG-US in 2022. The same year, she also embarked on a second backpacking journey,

this time to research Marxism's history and consequences in Europe. Both backpacking trips formed the basis for separate teaching series available on Patricia's blog (answersingenesis.org/blogs/patricia-engler). Along with blogging and speaking, Patricia serves as an *Answers News* panelist, co-hosts AiG's new podcast for young adults, *Zero Compromise*, and is pursuing

an MA in Bioethics to help Christians think biblically about sanctity of life issues and emerging technologies. In her spare time, Patricia can often be found adventuring outdoors, exploring back roads, sketching, reading, or playing the ukulele.



Virginia Flo joined Lutherans For Life in September 2013 and currently resides in Eagan, Minnesota, where she is a member of Trinity Lone Oak Lutheran Church and School. She has spent her life in a dual career, both in business management, working for several major corporations in the Twin Cities area, as well as making a career in church work. She has worked extensively in the areas of Christian education, stewardship, and evangelism, while also serving as a choir director, where she is able to share her love of Christian music with both adults and children. In her business experience, she has worked in management, marketing, technology, and the graphic and visual arts. Her strong conviction For Life has given her the opportunity to speak on

all the life issues, with a particular emphasis in the area of physician-assisted suicide, which is being addressed in many states today. She grew up in a family that welcomed foster children who found a safe home with them in the country. She has authored a Christian fiction novel capturing some of those foster care experiences. Virginia has served as an LFL Life Chapter president and is now working across the United States helping equip Lutherans to be Gospel-motivated voices For Life.



Deaconess Chrissie Gillet, PsyD is married to her best friend, Steph Gillet, who is a pastor at St. Paul Lutheran Church in Tomahawk, Wisconsin. They enjoy working side by side in the ministry as a husband-wife and pastor-deaconess team. Together they have seven children, but only their youngest still resides at home, along with Phoebe, their Labradoodle in therapy dog training. Chrissie earned a doctorate in clinical psychology from Spalding University and completed her psychology residency as an officer in the United States Air Force. She served four years active duty and another four as inactive reserve. God blessed her with a range of counseling experiences in settings such as: a domestic violence shelter, the suicide crisis hotline, military mental health clinics, and a Christian counseling agency. Transitioning from an emphasis on psychology to theology,

Chrissie attended the Distance Deaconess Program at Concordia Theological Seminary, Fort Wayne. She graduated in October 2018 and was commissioned as a deaconess with Lutherans For Life. In her position as the **Word of Hope** Director, Chrissie answers the hotline calls and emails. Understanding both the secular worldview and the Christ-centered perspective, she listens without personal judgment while also responding in Christian truth and love. Motivated by compassion, she often goes above and beyond to connect people with local services and natural supports.

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Emily Jashinsky is culture editor at *The Federalist* and host of *Federalist Radio Hour*. She previously covered politics as a commentary writer for the *Washington Examiner*. Prior to joining the *Examiner*, Emily was the spokeswoman for Young America's Foundation. She's interviewed leading politicians and entertainers and appeared regularly as a guest on major television news programs, including *Fox News Sunday*, *Media Buzz*, and *The McLaughlin Group*. Her work has been featured in the *Wall Street Journal*, the *New York Post*, *Real Clear Politics*, and more. Emily also serves as director of the National Journalism Center, co-host of the weekly news show *Counter Points: Friday* and a visiting fellow at Independent Women's Forum. Originally from Wisconsin, she is a graduate of George Washington University.



Rebecca Kiessling has been an international pro-life speaker and adoption speaker since 1995, speaking for various pro-life organizations throughout North America and Europe. Politically influential, she changed the heart of Gov. Rick Perry during his presidential campaign, as well as Newt Gingrich, and many other legislators across the United States, Canada, and Europe. She's helped pregnant rape victims all around the world to choose life for their children. She's also an attorney and mother of five (the two oldest of whom are adopted), she lost two additional babies to miscarriage, and her 33-day-old adopted daughter, Cassie, who was born with special needs. She's also

the poster child for Feminists for Life's ad, "Did I Deserve the Death Penalty," author of the Heritage House '76 pamphlet "Conceived in Rape: A Story of Hope," and the writer of, and subject of, numerous articles and blogs on LifeNews, LifeSiteNews, and Live Action. She is the Founder and President of Save The 1 and co-founder of Embryo Defense.



Rev. Scott Licht grew up in New Ulm, Minnesota, and was raised in the Wisconsin Synod. He graduated from Martin Luther Preparatory School, Northwestern College (the WELS pastor-training college), and attended Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary for a short time. In 2005, he earned an MBA and a Master of Science in Information Systems from Iowa State University. Scott worked in the corporate world for 30 years before combining his business and theological education and experience at Lutherans For Life beginning in 2012. Scott satisfied the requirements and was ordained in the Lutheran Congregations in Mission

to Christ (LCMC) in 2014. In addition to his service at Lutherans For Life, he serves as pastor of Shepherd of the Prairie Lutheran Church in Huxley, Iowa – a congregation rostered with the LCMC and the North American Lutheran Church (NALC). Scott has an adult daughter in the Des Moines area and a daughter, son-in-law, and two grandsons near Colfax, Iowa. He and his

LFL National Essay Contest

Each year the LFL Council of Federation Presidents sponsors a national essay contest for students in two categories. One category includes students in grades 6-8 and the other in grades 9-12. Students in the Federation states and all other Non-Federation states are eligible to participate. After all of the states have submitted their winners, a national committee selects one winner to be the National Essay winner in each category. The essay contest rules for 2024 are available on the LFL website. For a student to qualify, they must either belong to a Lutheran church or attend a Lutheran school.

2023 LFL National Essay Contest Winners

The annual Lutherans For Life National Essay Contest, sponsored by the Council of Federation Presidents, continues to afford our Lutheran students the opportunity to affirm and express their belief in the sanctity of life each year, and 2023 was no different! The theme this year was “Just As ... I Am,” based on Ephesians 2:10.

Our first place winners from each participating state advanced to the national level contest, and we are now very pleased to announce the four national winners. We received some wonderful essays, so these students should be commended for this achievement!

National Essay Contest: 9-12 Grade Category

First Place: Samuel Jopp, Mayer, Minnesota, won first place at the national level in the 9-12 grade category. Sam won his award while in the tenth grade at Mayer Lutheran High School in Mayer, Minnesota, and is a member of Zion Lutheran Church in Mayer. He has three older siblings—one sister and two brothers. Samuel enjoys participating in football, basketball, and golf. When not participating in extracurricular activities at school, Sam enjoys going to the lake, helping his friends on their farms, and hanging out with his family.

Sam's essay is titled “Perfect—Just As I Am.”



Have you ever been told you are a mistake and that you will never amount to anything? I was told that many times in my young life, but I am here to tell you that you are not a mistake, even with all your imperfections, and that God has a tremendous plan for your life. The Bible says, “**For (you) are God’s handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for (you) to do**” (Ephesians 2:10). I am a living example of how I am God’s handiwork, and I am loved by Christ just as I am.

When I was born, it was discovered that I was deaf/hard of hearing. After many doctor appointments and tests, I was diagnosed with bilateral conductive hearing loss. I

could not hear from either ear and there was no cure. I didn't qualify for hearing aids because of all the fluid in my ears. I had nine surgeries to put tubes in my ears to help with drainage and one surgery to reconstruct my right eardrum all before I was eight years old. I looked normal and spoke like other kids my age, so people thought I was "normal," but I am not normal. I am extraordinary!

I didn't know what I was missing in school from lack of hearing, and I appeared to be like my classmates, so teachers thought I was lazy or unmotivated to do the school work. My classmates teased me because I couldn't hear and because of my poor grades, but I was told every day at home that I was loved by my parents, three siblings, and extended family. They accepted me just as I am and helped me to say words correctly and to speak clearly. They worked hard to help me be successful.


When I was in fourth grade, the fluid in my ears decreased, and I received hearing aids. There were so many sounds I was experiencing for the first time. Cars driving on the street, coffee dripping in the coffee maker, and the refrigerator humming were all the sounds I was hearing for the first time as a ten-year-old. I had no idea the world was full of so many sounds! I could now hear my teachers with my new hearing aids, but it also made all the other noises around me louder. No one understood what a struggle it was to be hard of hearing, and I was still teased and told I needed to pay attention in class. I had to learn how to focus on the speaker and block out all the background noises. It was very difficult to do all this and try to focus on what was being said. God knew all the obstacles I would have to overcome to succeed in life, but He placed people in my life to help me be successful in school and with my peers just as I am.

I am God's workmanship created with His hands to be perfectly made. He hears all the hurtful words and sees all the cruel acts others do to make fun of me, but He makes it all right because I belong to Him. He has my life planned out to do good works for Him. I get up every day and face the obstacles placed before me knowing Jesus is right there experiencing them with me. He will do a good work in me as I follow His command to love others and be forgiving.

I still struggle in school and fitting in with my peers is a daily challenge, but I know I will be successful. God has blessed me with a wonderful family. I am privileged to play high school sports with my peers. My family supports me just as I am, hearing aids and all. They know God has big plans for my life and they believe in me. That is all that matters. I am living proof that God made me to be exactly like I am and He loves me just as I am. I do not see myself with a disability, but as a child of God, His handiwork, His perfection!

Thank you, Sam, for your eloquent and moving reminder that "God doesn't make mistakes!" It is often those around us that see our disabilities as "shortcomings" when God sees no such thing! Sam's essay should give all of us the courage to face whatever life brings as we walk with our Savior and live the abundant life found in Him.

Second Place: Annika Peterson, Arlington, Texas, was in grade 11 when she won second place at the national level in the 9-12 grade category. She attends the Grand Prairie Fine Arts Academy, where she is working to establish a Students for Life chapter on her campus. Because of the loss of her newborn brother to Trisomy 18 in 2008 and the adoption of her little sister some years later, Annika is very passionate about helping families and mothers feel empowered to choose life. She is active in her home church, St. John Lutheran Church in Mansfield, Texas, and enjoys the youth, children, and music ministries. Every summer, she works as an assistant counselor at Camp Thurman in Pantego, where she is able to show God's love to these little ones all summer long. Last summer she was given permission to write a devotion for her campers and described how God fearfully and wonderfully created them in His image. This message lights up Annika's life whenever she shares it, and praise God, she lights up our lives with this message as well!




Annika's essay is titled **"For Such a Time as This."** On June 24, 2022, the Supreme Court of the United States overturned *Roe v. Wade* and returned the authority to regulate abortion to the states. Annika firmly states, "As children of God, it is our duty, our privilege, to relentlessly love on mothers and babies ... I am ready to do the work God prepared in advance for me to do, which is standing up for the lives of all the others He created to do His work ... Perhaps I was born for such a time as this"

All of us now living were born for such a time as this! God intentionally made us His children, now, in this place, for His work. Like Annika, let us recognize our importance to the Lord's plan and His ministry at such a time as this.

National Essay Contest: 6-8 Grade Category

First Place: Jace Latham, from St. Charles, Missouri, won first place at the national level in the 6-8 grade category. Jace was in seventh grade at Immanuel Lutheran School in St. Charles when he won his award. He plays a variety of sports, including basketball, soccer, and track and field. He enjoys spending time outdoors fishing, hunting, and mountain biking. His favorite subjects include math and his STEM curriculum. (STEM is an abbreviation for science, technology, engineering, and mathematics.) When he's not playing sports or spending time outdoors, he can be found working out or hanging out with his friends.

Jace's essay is titled **"Life's Puzzle."**



God's creation is a beautiful puzzle. When one decides to end his life, God's puzzle is incomplete. Everyone is part of God's creation and adds a special piece to the overall puzzle. Our lives add value and have a relevant place in the

world God designed. When someone commits suicide, it takes one amazing piece away from God's puzzle.

The Bible discusses the value and purpose of life in great detail. Jeremiah 29:11 says, "**“For I know the plans I have for you,’ declares the Lord, ‘plans for welfare and not for evil, to give you a future and hope”** (ESV). It is important to understand life can and will be difficult. God has a wonderful plan for each and every one of us; people must not lose hope. Unfortunate events can happen, and one must figure out how to work through them. When individuals keep God in their lives and listen to what He says, they have a better chance of realizing they have a purpose, just as they are. When one commits suicide, a puzzle piece is lost forever. Suicide is the twelfth leading cause of death, affecting every ethnic group and all ages. 1 Corinthians 6:20 says, "**“For you were bought with a price, so glorify God in your body.”** God did not give people a life for it to end early. Every person has value and is brought into the world for a reason.

All people should understand and say to themselves: I am loved, just as I am. Ephesians 2:10 says, "**“For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them.”**" The importance of life goes beyond our daily lifestyle and tasks. There can also be a stronger purpose in situations not always seen and heard. While 275,000 people are saved every year from suicide, about 800,000 die worldwide from suicide alone. Mental health is important, as well as helping people feel like they belong and are part of God's puzzle.

God's puzzle becomes incomplete when someone commits suicide. The Bible tells every person they have value and a purpose as a human being. If people follow God's Word throughout their lives, everyone will feel connected. In the end, each piece of the puzzle will fit exactly how God intended.


We truly appreciate and value Jace's essay on suicide. Because suicide is the second leading cause of death among teens, Jace's words send an urgent message to his peers: Follow God's Word. Believe that you are created by God for a purpose. Keep God in your life and listen to what He says. This is great advice for all of us, right? Right!

Second Place: Madison Ford, from Frankenmuth, Michigan, won second place at the national level in the 6-8 grade category. Madison was 14 and in eighth grade at St. Lorenz Lutheran School in Frankenmuth, Michigan, when she won her award. She enjoys dancing and participates in the Girls of Grace Dance Ministry at her school. She likes shopping, traveling, and spending time with her friends and family. Madison's favorite Bible verse is Matthew 28:19-20, "**“Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold I am with you always to the end of the age.”**



Madison's essay is titled "**Physician-Assisted Suicide: Killing the Living.**" Madison's essay affirms the role of Christians in the lives of hurting people. We have to learn about PAS: why it is a problem, why people choose it, how to prevent it, and most importantly, how to offer the love and grace of Jesus to those hurting people.

Suicide of any kind grieves our Father in heaven, and our desire should be to show love, hope, and kindness to those we know who are facing difficult times. We may never know how sharing the love and hope of Jesus may impact a friend's life, but Madison's words should encourage us to do just that.
