

Welcome to the 2021-2022 school year!

This newsletter is the first of three editions that will be distributed throughout the school year to our Elk Rapids Schools families and community Successmembers. ful school districts are rooted in strong community-school relationships, and Elk Rapids Schools values the communities that make up the school district. The primary goal of the newsletter is to open a line of communication that reaches all stakehold-

ers of Elk Rapids Schools. Great things happen each school year. We want our communities to share in the celebration of our schools, students, and staff.

Nine months ago, voters approved a \$50 million bond to upgrade school facilities. Updates on the progress of the bond work will be shared in each publication. The work in the first bond series includes the construction of the high school performance gymnasium, relocation of the high school administrative offices, and the demolition and reconstruction of Cherryland Middle School. Over the past seven months, various stakeholder groups have worked with architects and construction managers to create, and edit, various design schemes. Drafts of the most recent design work are included in later pages of the newsletter. More recent bond work includes the drafting of mechanical systems, electrical runs,

and tracking of budgets. With the volatile status of the construction industry, budget work has proven to be challenging. Bids for phase one of construction will be posted late fall, and construction will begin in the spring of 2022. Look for more updates during the year!

We look forward to reconnecting with our families and community members this fall. Board of Education meetings are held on the first and third Monday of each month. The meetings are open to the public and will be streamed on-line for viewing from virtually anywhere. Fall athletics begin with boys soccer on August 20th, and boys tennis, volleyball, and football games beginning the following week. Come out and support your Elks athletics! The first day of school is a half day for students on September 7th. Be sure to mark Homecoming on your calendars - September 17!

District Updatewith Superintendent Julie Brown



Summertime in Northern Michigan is spectacular! This summer, with the height of the COVID-19 pandemic in the recent past, was, perhaps, especially appreciated. Each day I was able to spend time with family and friends and travel around our beautiful state, I found myself smiling just a little bigger. With August here, I find

myself extremely anxious to begin the 2021-2022 school year and welcome our families, students, staff and community members back to our schools!

Unique to this summer, the district ran an eight-week summer school program for students in kindergarten through eighth grades. Along with academic programming, meals and transportation to and from summer school was provided. About 125 students participated. The goal of the extended summer program was to not only support improved student learning, but it was also to provide students and families with stability and social/emotional support much needed after the pandemic school year. Thank you is not enough to recognize our administrative team, teachers, and support staff who gave their time and support to our students!

The 2021-2022 school year is shaping up to be a much more "normal" school year! Our athletic teams begin practices, and in some cases games, in mid-August. The annual Homecoming football game is slated for Friday, September 17 against Charlevoix. While COVID-19 restrictions have been lifted, we continue partnering with the local health departments to monitor case rates and stay current on safety and mitigation strategies for schools.

As a reminder, in November of 2020, voters approved a two phase bond for Elk Rapids Schools facility upgrades. Phase one bonds were sold in the winter of 2021, and, due to the low interest rates, there was a \$6 million dollar savings for voters! Phase one of the bond includes the demolition and reconstruction of Cherryland Middle School, construction of the Elk Rapids High School performance gymnasium, and relocation of the ERHS administrative offices. Design work for phase one is nearing completion. We anticipate construction bid packages being posted in the late fall, and construction will begin in the spring of 2022. Plans for phase two of the bond work will be shared when we have a better handle of timelines.

We wish all of our staff, families and community members a very fun last few weeks of summer! Nothing beats Northern Michigan's final weeks of August!



Elk Rapids High School & Sunrise High School Update

With the start of school just around the corner, let us take a moment to recap the 2020-2021 school year and celebrate our ability to work together through the pandemic challenges. Students, staff, and families employed new technologies and established new ways to learn, teach, meet, collaborate, and conduct business. Although we lost some things this past year, as we look forward to a new year, we will have opportunities to leverage the technical skills we gained and employ the strengthened relational skills of patience, flexibility, and kindness.

- AP Computer Science students, Shane Pilate, Brett Brunner, Gabby Krakow and Josh Doctor won the Michigan 1st District 2020 Congressional App Challenge with their application Space Hop.
- Senior, Sydney Standerfer won 2nd place in the Traverse City Economics Club essay contest.
- With direction and assistance from Rob Stow, Blair Misico, and Erica Daly, the ERHS Drama Students successfully filmed the first-ever movie musical production (Into the Woods) at ERHS.
- Junior Stock Market student, Jillian Acker won the Invest-Write National Essay Competition for the State of Michigan.
- All Sunrise Academy seniors earned high school diplomas.

Early Childhood Update with Joann Miracle



Elk Rapids Schools offers tuition-based, year round programming for children ages 3-12 years old. Our school year programs include preschool programming for three and four year olds and before/after school "Kids Club" at Mill Creek and Lakeland Elementary.

The pre-school classrooms provide playbased learning and teaching to the whole

child while allowing the children's interests to help guide their learning.

The before/after school "Kids Club" program for preschool-5th grade students at each elementary provides working parents an extended care option to the child's school day. Kids Club runs with the district's school year schedule.

In November 2020, "Kids Club" continued care when schools went on a three-week pause to help working families provide a place for their children during the day. "Extended Day Kids Club" assisted each child enrolled to get school work help, guidance on their daily activities and also gave families the security to connect with their teachers virtually with no worries of internet issues.

Lastly, the district offers tuition-based care for school aged, in and out of district families, during the summer months. This program operates five (5) days a week, operating 7:00 am - 6:00 pm daily. "Summer Kids Club" provides opportunities for field trips, participation in the ER District Library Summer reading program and lots of fun activities weekly.



Food Service with Rob Payne

What a great 2020-21 school year that food service had! While the pandemic changes were trying at times, there were many positives. Last year, under the USDA's Summer Food Service Program (SFSP), all students, kindergarten through 12th grade, received free breakfast and lunch. We served over 157,000 meals to students!

The biggest challenge we have is serving food to students that they want combined with what they need. The requirements school food service must follow can be challenging. In our efforts to improve the quality of the meals we serve, we have incorporated more made-from-scratch items. Some of the items we served last year were meatloaf, fresh salads, pizza, yogurt parfaits, and special holiday meals. We also have made a commitment to serving Michigan grown produce and vegetables. Some of the Michigan made items we serve include preserves for the peanut butter and jelly sandwiches, carrots, green beans, peaches, apples, pears, dried blueberries, dried cherries, and asparagus.



Transportation, Maintenance, Technology or Food Update

Safety at the Bus stop



- When waiting for the bus, stay away from traffic.
- Line up at least five giant steps away from the curb or the roadway to wait for the bus.
- Always wait for the bus in a single line.
- When getting on the bus, stay away from the danger zone, make eye contact with the bus driver, and wait for the driver's signal. Board the bus one at a time. Always walk 10 feet in front of the bus when crossing in the front so the drivers can see you.
- Don't push or shove to get on or off the bus.
- Arrive at the assigned stop ten (10) minutes before bus pickup.
- Stay off private property.
- Do not stand on the traveled part of the road.
- Be respectful and watchful of traffic.
- Wait in a quiet and orderly manner.
- Remain seated until the bus comes to a complete stop.
- Leave the bus in an orderly manner.
- Exit only at your assigned bus stop.
- Never run after the school bus if it has already left the bus stop.
- If you leave something on the bus or drop something outside of the bus, never go back for it. The driver may not see you and begin moving the bus.

As a contestant, Allie devoted time and energy into growing her knowledge of the local cherry industry. Visiting farms, Allie learned the ins and outs of the industry, from planting and growing orchards to harvesting and selling the product. Allie shared, "The cherry community has been so welcoming! I feel so humbled representing their interests. Seventy-five percent of the world's tart cherry production comes from the farms in Northern Michigan! On average, it takes seven thousand tart cherries make to 28 pies!" While Allie wears the National Cherry Festival sash and crown, her focus to give back to the festival organization and communities is a testament to who Allie is at her core.

The desire to encourage people to dream and inspire others to dream drives Allie. Never giving up on dreams, no matter how "out there" they may be, is a credit to her parents. "My parents never asked me why I wanted to do anything," Allie starts. "They always supported my dreams, asking how they could help me reach them." From an early age, Allie has been inspired by others.

Even today, Mill Creek teacher, Jane (Brusso) Krzywosinski, continues to inspire Allie as she recalls, "We called her 'Beautiful Basketball Brusso,' and she inspired me to play basketball. Her students are not allowed to say, 'I can't.' She truly cares for students, and I will be reading to her class next school year."

Allie is in the final year of the Baker College nursing program. When asked why she is choosing to be a neonatal (NICU) nurse, her answer goes back to her core beliefs. "During the rotation in the NICU, I knew that was my calling. I love working with kids, caring for others is important to me, and the families of the children also need the support of the NICU nurses."

In closing, Queen Allie encourages others to set goals, do not allow fear to get in the way, and never put a time limit on dreams.
